Catholic Social Teaching Professional Development Day planned for 2018



The in-service is named “Sharing the Story” and it is hoped that it can be offered to schools in 2018. The Commission experienced the first session of this training called ‘Sharing the Story – Self’.

Social Justice Statement: “Everyone’s Business – Developing an inclusive and sustainable economy”

The Commission Chairperson, Tony Haintz, recently attended the Australian Catholic Social Justice Council Diocese Gathering in Sydney, where the 2017 Australian Bishops’ Social Justice Statement was reviewed. This year the Social Justice statement follows-up on the publication of “Common Wealth for Common Good”, released 25 years ago. This statement, “Everyone’s Business – Developing an inclusive and sustainable economy”, will be launched this month and should be available in all parishes and online for Social Justice Sunday on September 24. It is a very challenging and powerful statement. The statement aligns what it has to say with the United Nations Sustainable Goals and is recommended reading for parish and school communities.
