




Breaking Open the Word

THE SAVING WORD

TWENTY-NINTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME / B

GREATNESS THROUGH SERVICE FIR

James and John were two especially privileged disciples. Called on the first day of Jesus' ministry with Peter and Andrew, they were special witnesses to the raising of Jairus' daughter and to the Transfiguration. While the other disciples knew this, they were not prepared for their audacious and ambitious request to share in Jesus' reign. Jesus had no sooner predicted, for the second time, the fate that awaited him in Jerusalem than they revealed their complete failure to comprehend Jesus' message. Their request unmasked their ambition and desire for power. Service and giving oneself for others are to be the hallmark of the Christian community, and the manner in which greatness is to be expressed. Like the suffering servant of Isaiah who takes on the punishment which is due to others Jesus will give his life so that others might live. This is what is required of those who would be leaders in the Christian community.

In speaking of Jesus as the great and eternal high priest there was the danger that early Christians would then feel in some way distant from the one who had saved them. The letter to the Hebrews makes the point that even though Jesus' death and resurrection have brought him into the highest heaven he has not lost sight of the people. That Jesus was without sin does not mean that he does not understand our human situation. He has shared our human experience and is therefore able to mediate on our behalf with mercy and grace.



Cry of the Earth Cry of the Poor Listening, learning... change

The Bishops Social Justice Statement 2021-22: *Cry of the Earth Cry of the Poor* affirms that "we human beings need a change of heart, mind, and behaviour."

It draws from Scripture, from the theological tradition, from Catholic Social Teaching, and from the wisdom of the world, including the insights of the First Nations.

The Bishops invite us to take up Pope Francis' invitation to a seven-year journey towards total ecological sustainability, guided by seven Laudato Si' Goals. These Goals are:

- Response to the cry of the earth;
- Response to the cry of the poor;
- Ecological economics;
- Sustainable lifestyles;
- Ecological spirituality;
- Ecological education; and
- Community engagement and participatory action.

Dr Mark Diesendorf

Dr Mark Diesendorf is Honorary Associate Professor in Environment & Governance at UNSW Sydney. Previously, he was a Principal Research Scientist in CSIRO, Professor of Environmental Science and Founding Director of the Institute for Sustainable Futures at University of Technology Sydney, and Education Program Leader of the Australian Cooperative Research Centre for Low



Carbon Living. His most recent book is Sustainable Energy Solutions for Climate Change (UNSW Press & Routledge-Earthscan). He also enjoys bushwalking, kayaking and tending to his native garden.

Dr Sandie Cornish

Dr Sandie Cornish is a practitioner in the field of Catholic Social Teaching. She leads the Office for Justice, Ecology and Peace of the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference, and is a sessional lecturer with the Australian Catholic University, and with BBI-TAITE. Sandie is a member of the Dicastery for the Promotion of Integral Human Development and is one of the periti for the Fifth Plenary Council of the Catholic Church in Australia.



Sandie holds a PhD in Practical Theology, a Licentiate in Catholic Social Doctrine and Ethics from the Pontifical Gregorian University, a Master of Public Policy, and a Bachelor of Economics.

Vicki Clark

Vicki Clark OAM is a proud Mutti Mutti/Wemba Wamba woman who lives in Nyah. Vicki's contribution to the Australian Catholic Church, Catholic Education and Australian Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Communities has been profound. For 25 years she



was the coordinator of Aboriginal Catholic Ministry Victoria. Vicki is involved in the national Reconciliation process, Opening the Doors Foundation and Yingadi Aboriginal Corporation which nurtures Indigenous spirituality and works at preserving culture. Vicki is a member of numerous boards in Victoria and across Australia. Vicki will offer challenges to us from an Indigenous perspective.

Jacqui Rémond

Jacqui Rémond is Co-Coordinator of the Vatican Ecology Taskforce at the Dicastery for Integral Human Development and Co-Founder of the Global Catholic Climate/ Laudato Si' Movement. Jacqui is the Former National Director of Catholic Earthcare Australia, the ecological agency of the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference (2007-2017) and Laudato Si' Consultant at the Australian Catholic University. With a long history in environmental advocacy,

Jacqui previously worked as the Coordinator of the Northern Australia Environment Alliance. and served as Chair of Environs Kimberley. In 2006, Jacqui undertook training with Al Gore to become a 'Climate Change Leader.
