Gospel <u>Lk 10:1-12. 17-20</u>

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke The Lord appointed seventy-two others and sent them out ahead of him, in pairs, to all the towns and places he himself was to visit. He said to them, 'The harvest is rich but the labourers are few, so ask the Lord of the harvest to send labourers to his harvest. Start off now, but remember, I am sending you out like lambs among wolves. Carry no purse, no haversack, no sandals. Salute no one on the road. Whatever house you go into, let your first words be, "Peace to this house!" And if a man of peace lives there, your peace will go and rest on him; if not, it will come back to you. Stay in the same house, taking what food and drink they have to offer, for the labourer deserves his wages; do not move from house to house. Whenever you go into a town where they make you welcome, eat what is set before you. Cure those in it who are sick, and say, "The kingdom of God is very near to you." But whenever you enter a town and they do not make you welcome, go out into its streets and say, "We wipe off the very dust of your town that clings to our feet, and leave it with you. Yet be sure of this: the kingdom of God is very near." I tell you, that on that day it will not go as hard with Sodom as with that town.' The seventy-two came back rejoicing. 'Lord,' they said, 'even the devils submit to us when we use your name.' He said to them, 'I watched Satan fall like lightning from heaven. Yes, I have given you power to tread underfoot serpents and scorpions and the whole strength of the enemy; nothing shall ever hurt you. Yet do not rejoice that the spirits submit to you; rejoice rather that your names are written in heaven.'

New Testament Commentary by Mary Coloe PBVM Galatians 6:14-18; Luke 10:1-12, 17-20

The reign of god is very near you.

The passage from Galatians bring Paul's letter to a conclusion. This is the only letter of Paul that does not begin with a greeting of thanksgiving; in fact, the entire tone of this letter has been one of frustration and anger. This is a community that began to follow Paul's teaching with joy and enthusiasm. They accepted that salvation now came through Jesus and was being offered to Gentiles as well as Jews, and that Gentiles joined the community through baptism. But then, doubt set in. Some Jews came who disagreed with Paul's teaching and insisted that salvation only came through first accepting circumcision, in other words, a person first had to accept Jewish teaching before they could be a follower of Jesus. Paul strenuously objected to this false message. The entire letter has been one argument following another that faith in Jesus brought freedom from following the Jewish Law. Paul had written, 'You were running well; who prevented you from obeying the truth?' The willingness of the Galatians to abandon Paul's teaching has been a real suffering for Paul; it has been his cross. As a teacher of theology, I sometimes find people so wanting security, that they accept horrid images of God as some type of policemen. Their security then comes by meticulously following rules and regulation. Their faith has become one of fear rather than joy and gratitude. Following rules can be easier than living attentive to the one command to love God and neighbour. Living mindfully of this command and its implications in all areas of life calls for a real discipline of thoughtfulness or mindfulness. Such adult, responsible faith is what Paul requires of the Galatians. The Gospel of last Sunday is the turning point in Luke's narrative. In 9:51, Jesus begins his journey to Jerusalem, and as Jesus begins his journey, we see also the disciples being sent on their journeys. In this way Luke is teaching that the journey of Jesus is continued and mirrored in the later journeys of the Christian churches. While the Gospel passage reads as a mission within the lifetime of Jesus, the passage reflects also the missionary situation of disciples at the time of Luke's Gospel, fifty years after Jesus' death. The advice is clear and very practical. Travel lightly, accept hospitality where it is offered, and be gracious in eating what you are given. Disciples are to trust that they will find the resources for their mission. Jesus also adds a warning that disciples will not always be well received. By the time of the Gospel, Christians had begun to experience persecution from Rome and some have been martyred for their faith. Mention of Sodom recalls the incident in Genesis when God's messengers were refused hospitality and this possibility lies before the disciples, as it will also come to Jesus when he visits Jerusalem. The pattern of Jesus' ministry, which includes rejection, will be the pattern also for the ministry of the disciples. News of the disciples' success is given a cosmic significance in the image of Satan falling from heaven. As the power of God's reign spreads, the power of Satan's reign decreases until finally heaven itself can be home for disciples. This is what is meant by the image of the disciples having their names registered on the roll of heaven – much as we have our names registered on electoral rolls showing where we live. As disciples of Jesus today, may we bring a message of peace to the homes we enter, and take heart that even in the face of rejection, God's reign is near.

Although the gospel is a report of ministerial commissioning, it contains elements of discipleship in general. Most obvious is the disciples' dependence on Jesus. They are not independent missionaries; they are followers. Furthermore, there is a communal dimension of discipleship. While there is certainly a personal relationship between Jesus and each disciple, discipleship itself is not a singular privilege that one hugs to oneself to the exclusion of others. Disciples minister to the needs of others, whatever those needs may be and with whatever abilities the disciple may possess. There are various kinds of healing: a friendly smile, a word of gratitude, a soothing touch. We can teach the lessons of life in classrooms, in playrooms, in kitchens, in boardrooms. There are many ways that we can cast out the demons that hold our world by the throat; demons of poverty and oppression, demons of addiction and slavery, demons of disdain and neglect, demons of hatred and violence. If they are not cast out by us, then by whom? The life of discipleship is not an unmixed blessing. Because disciples are marked by the sign of the cross, they must expect suffering. Because they do not live according to the standards of the world, disciples will be judged as fools. Some of them will be subjected to even greater suffering. Still, the disciple proclaims that true fulfilment is only found in God! In reality, it is the world that is upside down, not the life of discipleship. And it is the cross that sets things right.



Australian Catholic University Online Lecture

On 18 July 2022 (10-11:30am AEST) the ACU Centre for Liturgy will have the pleasure of hosting the Rev Dr Paul Turner who will give our next <u>online</u> public lecture (via Zoom) entitled ""Celebrating Catholic funerals in the face of secularism, COVID and other challenges"".

Our presenter, Fr Paul Turner, is Pastor of the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception in Kansas City, Missouri US and Director of the Office of Divine Worship for the Catholic Diocese of Kansas City-St Joseph. He holds a doctorate in sacred theology from Sant' Anselmo in Rome. He serves as a facilitator for the International Commission on English in the Liturgy and his publications include *Ars Celebrandi: Celebrating and Concelebrating Mass* (Liturgical, 2021), *New Church, New Altar A Commentary on the Order of Dedication of a Church and an Altar* (Liturgical, 2021), *Light in the Darkness: Preparing Better Catholic Funerals* (Liturgical, 2017) and dozens of other titles.
