

Among other things, this Mass celebrates 30 years' service of staff in our diocese.

ACKNOWLEDGING 150 YEARS OF THE BALLARAT DIOCESE



Across the Diocese this weekend, parishes will acknowledge 150 years since the Diocese of Ballarat (and Sandhurst) were created on March 30th 1874. In 1844 the first Mass had been celebrated in Port Fairy, the first in what would become the Diocese of Ballarat. Archbishop Polding (Sydney) visited Portland in November 1844.

In 1848, James Alipius Goold was appointed Bishop of Melbourne - the Diocese had two churches, Melbourne and Geelong and a Chapel at Portland. In October 1851 the first Mass in the Ballarat district was celebrated by Fr Patrick Dunne at Brown Hill in a borrowed tent. In 1872 the Sisters of Mercy made a foundation in Warrnambool. In March 1874 when the Diocese of Ballarat was created, Michael O'Connor, a Parish Priest in Rathfarnham (Dublin) was appointed the First Bishop. With the creation of the Diocese, the following 11 parishes, established as parishes of Melbourne, were transferred to the Ballarat Diocese: Portland (est. 1847), Port Fairy (est. 1849), Warrnambool (est. 1853), Colac (est. 1853), Ballarat St Alipius (est. 1852), Hamilton (est. 1856), Ararat (est. 1858), Maryborough (originally Carisbrook est. 1859), Creswick (est. 1861), Inglewood (est. 1865), Mortlake (est. 1869).

Since 1874, many churches, parishes and schools were opened and many religious orders arrived. Across our Ministry District this included the arrival of the Sisters of Mercy to Ballarat East (from Warrnambool) in 1881, the creation of the Parish of Bungaree in 1890 and the arrival of the Diocesan Sisters of St Joseph to Bungaree in 1891. In 1980, the Parish of Gordon with the communities of Ballan, Mt Egerton and Springbank) was transferred from the Archdiocese of Melbourne to Ballarat. The foundation stone for St Patrick's Church Gordon was blessed by Bishop Goold on March 23rd 1872, with Gordon becoming a parish in December 1875. Catholic Schools have been a feature of the Church in Australia with 2nd Catholic school in Victoria opened in Portland in May 1849.

The early Catholic schools were all staffed by lay people. St Alipius Primary School first opened its doors to the children of the Ballarat East goldfields on April 1st 1853 – the 13th non-government school formally registered in the state of Victoria. There had also been a Catholic school at Buninyong in the early 1850's. St Agnes School at Ballan opened in 1858 until 1863 when it was destroyed by fire. At Springbank (Ormond) a Catholic school was built in 1865.

150 years since the creation of the Diocese of Ballarat, from the Murray to the Sea, we acknowledge the strengths and weaknesses of our history.

The One Vine or Vineyard

Fifth Sunday of Easter: John 15:1-8

Life's experiences teach us that, as members of the Earth community, we cannot make it on our own. We need one another, other living beings, the sun, the soil, the water, and everything else that formed from exploding stars in the distant past.

The gospel reading reminds us that as baptised Christians we are not just intimately interlinked but that the source of our unity is the Risen Christ. As limbs and leaves and sap of the same vine, we simply cannot survive in isolation.

The vine image picks up one of the most potent biblical images for God's relationship to the people of Israel. It is an image of life and growth, of colour and vibrancy. It holds the promise of a life-sustaining grape harvest that is ultimately transformed into wine, the biblical symbol for joy.

Our gardener God brought Israel "the vine" out of Egypt (Psalm 80:9). For the prophet Isaiah, Israel is also a vineyard planted and nurtured by God (5:1-7; 27:3). For Jeremiah, Israel is the choice vine "of fully tested stock" planted by God (2:21).

The Johannine Jesus makes the claim: "I am the true vine/vineyard" and God is the "vinegrower".

Jesus wants to distance himself from the ostentatious artificial golden vine

that adorned the entrance to the sanctuary. He goes further: "I am the vine/vineyard and you are the branches".

The potency of this image resides in the fact that a vine without branches is inconceivable. It draws us into the mystery of the mutual interchange of life between us and the risen Christ, into the mystery of God. It also invites us to acknowledge our interconnection with the whole of the Earth community, to nurture the wonderful biodiversity of our planet, and to accept the inevitability of "pruning" if we are to "bear fruit" and "become disciples".

I am the vine, and you are the branches

"Pruning" can take various forms. A chance encounter, a sudden inspiration, a word from a friend, an unexpected illness, a confronting story: any such experience can bring us to our senses and serve as a "pruning" device.

The first reading for today recounts the story of Saul of Tarsus who is "pruned" quite dramatically through his encounter with the Risen Christ on the road to Damascus.



He is transformed from persecutor to defender of Christ and Christ's followers. Saul becomes a disciple and "bears much fruit". The Greekspeaking

Christian Jews are suspicious, even murderous when he tries to preach the gospel among them. Peace ensues, however, and the movement takes hold in the regions where Jesus had first preached the gospel.

It is worth reflecting on the cultural diversity that characterised earliest Christianity and the tensions that had to be resolved between different language groups or groups of different ethnic origin for the gospel to flourish and bear fruit.

John's gospel is written against the backdrop of such "pruning" within the early communities. Sometimes the requisite "pruning" is hearing respectfully a point of view that differs from one's own.
