### Dear Friends,

They came to Jesus sniggering. They were sure that they were going to catch him in his words. And they had found the example of the poor lady who for seven times in succession embraced a dying husband in her bed to see him part before any fruit had set. And they laughed already knowing that the answer would not come. It did not come. He even overlooked their question. He asked them another one. He asked them about four people who went before them: Abraham, Isaac, Jacob and Moses, and he asked them: "Do you really think that those men of God died, do you really think that God made them disappear into clouds of nothingness, into the dark of oblivion? Do you really think that God who loved them so much, who influenced their lives so much, would have forgotten those even you remember? Do you really think God is a God of dead people, of some lifemoments only, of some green wood that dried up to be thrown away and burned in a fire, to turn into dust and ashes? Do you really think that God will disavow them, overlook them, or forget them? You must be joking!".

But brothers and sisters listen carefully to the names he mentions: Abraham, Isaac, Jacob and Moses. Listen carefully to what he says: "Those who are judged worthy!" Let us not deceive ourselves about Jesus, let us not deceive ourselves about ourselves: the life that awaits us hereafter is our own life: the consequence of what we did here on earth who.

And we will live forever and ever.

### Plenary Council 2020: National Theme for Discernment November: Inclusive, Participatory and Synodal:

How is God calling us to be a Christ-centred Church that is Inclusive, Participatory and Synodal This National Theme for Discernment is inspired by the voices of the People of God who expressed a deep and faith-filled trust in God and a need for lament and healing within the Church, acknowledging the sexual abuse crisis as a turning point for the Church in Australia.

"Our parish clergy are overworked, stressed and stretched beyond reasonable limits. Moving beyond strategies of parish amalgamation and closure, what other options will we explore? By that I mean the non-ordaineds' role in making pastoral decisions?"

"How can a more synodal approach to leadership in the Church at parish and diocesan levels be exercised as a shared responsibility, by virtue of Baptism, between both lay and clergy?"

"How does the Church law allow for inclusion of all peoples? Do we need to adapt these laws to a changing world?"

"How is the Church able to respond to the diversity of our community to be inclusive of all – Indigenous/First Nations, environmental protection, gay rights?"

"Why has the hierarchy failed to publicise the good works undertaken by our schools, hospitals, refugee support, etc?"

"How can we better nourish and support the spiritual life of adult lay people?

### LITURGY OF THE WORD

### First Reading: 2 Mc 7:1-2, 9-14

A reading from the second book of Maccabees

The king of the world will receive us into life eternal at the resurrection.

There were seven brothers who were arrested with their mother. The king tried to force them to taste pig's flesh, which the Law forbids, by torturing them with whips and scourges. One of them, acting as spokesman for the others, said, 'What are you trying to find out from us? We are prepared to die rather than break the Law of our ancestors.'

With his last breath the second brother exclaimed, 'Inhuman fiend, you may discharge us from this present life, but the King of the world will raise us up, since it is for his laws that we die, to live again for ever.'

After him, they amused themselves with the third, who on being asked for his tongue promptly thrust it out and held out his hands, with these honourable words, 'It was heaven that gave me these limbs; for the sake of his laws I disdain them; from him I hope to receive them again.' The king and his attendants were astounded at the young man's courage and his utter indifference to suffering.

When this one was dead they subjected the fourth to the same savage torture. When he neared his end he cried, 'Ours is the better choice, to meet death at men's hands, yet relying on God's promise that we shall be raised up by him; whereas for you there can be no resurrection, no new life.'

### Gospel Lk 20:27-38

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

He is not a God of the dead but of the living.

Some Sadducees – those who say that there is no resurrection – approached Jesus and they put this question to him, 'Master, we have it from Moses in writing, that if a man's married brother dies childless, the man must marry the widow to raise up children for his brother. Well, then, there were seven brothers. The first, having married a wife, died childless. The second and then the third married the widow. And the same with all seven, they died leaving no children. Finally the woman herself died. Now, at the resurrection, to which of them will she be wife since she had been married to all seven?'

Jesus replied, 'The children of this world take wives and husbands, but those who are judged worthy of a place in the other world and in the resurrection from the dead do not marry because they can no longer die, for they are the same as the angels, and being children of the resurrection they are sons of God. And Moses himself implies that the dead rise again, in the passage about the bush where he calls the Lord the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac and the God of Jacob. Now he is God, not of the dead, but of the living; for to him all men are in fact alive.'

### Reflection by Michael Tate: Billy Elliott and the Resurrection

Billy Elliott was a boy brought up in a strife-torn mining town in the north of England. He discovered a passion for dancing. At an interview at the Royal Ballet School which was going badly, he was asked: 'What do you feel when you're dancing?'

'I've got fire in my body.' And he got the scholarship because the panel realised that when Billy danced, he became 'fully alive': body, mind, spirit fully integrated. When Billy danced, everything that Billy was, was dancing.

That is what our Resurrection is all about. Our whole personality will be dancing with the radiance of Divine Fire coursing through our body, mind, spirit. The Sadducees' small-minded sarcasm could not grasp that we will be bodies transfigured, translucent to divine light and energy. We could take a moment to pray that, by the grace of God, our bodies will dance, enflamed by Divine Love.
