GOSPEL REFLECTION

Not too many of us commit murder or adultery. Not too many kidnap or take hostages or give false testimony in a court of law. Most are ready to honour and care for their parents in their old age. In other words, most of us are basically decent and honest and could make the same claim as does the wealthy man who runs up to Jesus, namely that we have kept the commandments from our youth.



The man's question is actually a strange one. He wants to know what he must *do* in order to inherit eternal life. He seems unaware that inheritance depends, not on what one does, but on who one is. Jesus responds to his greeting, "Good Teacher", with a reminder that God is the source of all goodness, and then lets him know that keeping the commandments is not enough. Interestingly, Jesus adds a commandment that is not actually numbered among the "ten" but is to be found in an Essene document from Qumran: "You shall not defraud". This prepares the way for what follows.

First-century Mediterranean societies were "limited goods" societies. If a person acquired wealth, it was invariably understood to be at the expense of others. The wealthy were therefore looked upon with suspicion. Although Jesus looks at the man lovingly, he may nonetheless be hinting that his wealth has been acquired fraudulently. Jesus offers a challenge that the man is unable to meet: to sell what he has, give the proceeds to the poor, have "treasure in heaven", and "follow" him. The man retains his possessions and acquires a burden, the burden of sorrow. To share one's goods with those in need is too hard for some, Jesus admits, but not for those who are open to the power of God at work in their lives.

The concluding verses are puzzling. In declaring that those who have left everything and followed him are to have an abundance of this world's goods as well as eternal life, is Jesus modifying his earlier position? Is he reverting to a tradition that saw wealth as God's reward for righteous living? Is he suggesting that those who share their goods find they have more than enough? It is hard to know. The twist in the tale is that they will do it hard: "not without persecution". It is likely that Mark is describing his own experience within a persecuted community of believers some forty years after the death of Jesus. The happy ones were doubtless those who took the risk of sharing their goods with those in need. Our lucky country has still to learn that lesson. Welcoming the stranger and sharing our wealth with the dispossessed may demand of us a simpler way of life. Who knows what blessings it will bring if we dare to take up the challenge?



CHURCH AND SOCIETY MUST LEARN FROM FAMILIES, SAYS POPE

Society and the Church have much to learn from the family and, in fact, the bond between the church and the family is "indissoluble," Pope Francis said at his general audience on Wednesday, reports the *Catholic News Service*.

Families bring needed values and a humanising spirit to society and, when they mirror God's love for all, they teach the church how it should relate to all people, including the "imperfect," the Pope said during his weekly general audience.

While members of the Synod of Bishops on the family were meeting in small groups, Pope Francis held his audience with an estimated 30,000 people in St Peter's Square. He asked them to accompany the Synod with their prayers.

While the Catholic Church insists that governments and the economy need families and have an obligation to give them greater support, Pope Francis said, the church itself recognises that it, too, must have a "family spirit."

Using the Gospel story of Jesus telling the disciples he would make them "fishers of men," Pope Francis said, "a new kind of net is needed for this. We can say that today families are the most important net for the mission of Peter and the church."

"It is not a net that imprisons," he said. "On the contrary, it frees people from the polluted waters of abandonment and indifference that drown many human beings in the sea of solitude."

Families are the place where individuals learn that they are "sons and daughters, not slaves or foreigners or just a number on an identity card," the pope said. "The church must be the family of God."

Pope Francis asked people to join him in praying that "the enthusiasm of the Synod fathers, animated by the Holy Spirit, would energise the impulse of the church to abandon its old nets and start fishing again, trusting in the word of its Lord. Let us pray intensely for this!"


Mercy Professional Development Day

On Friday September 11, St. Joseph's College teaching and non-teaching staff attended a professional development day presented by Sr. Veronica Lawson rsm. Sr. Veronica is a member of the Institute of Sisters of Mercy of Australia and Papua New Guinea (ISMAPNG). She is a biblical scholar who wrote a Masters thesis on the Letter to the Colossians at the Ecole Biblique in Jerusalem and a doctoral thesis on The Acts of the Apostles at the School of Hebrew, Theological and Biblical Studies at Trinity College, Dublin. The theme of the day was "Biblical Perspectives on Mercy" with a focus the Mercy values of Compassion, Hospitality, Justice, Courage, Service and Respect. Staff were introduced to the language of mercy in the bible, in particular the Hebrew and Greek concepts that inform Mercy stories in the gospel.

Sr. Veronica also spoke about a whole range of other issues with a focus on the current crisis in Syria and the need to show compassion for the refugees. The day was a great start to Mercy week. On Wednesday September 16 we celebrated our Mercy Mass. We give thanks to the Sisters of Mercy that started St. Joseph's College 109 years ago.
