Dear Friends, Ten lepers came out of the village, a conspiracy of the sick looking for health. They remained standing at a distance. They did as foreseen by the law. They hailed him and shouted through their hands as foreseen by the law: "Jesus, Master, take pity on us". He stopped and looked at them keeping his distance, as foreseen by the law. He did not touch them, he did not approach them. He too, that day, stuck to the law. Even when he ordered them: "Go and show yourself to the priests" as was stipulated for anyone who claimed to be healed from his skin disease. They did what he said, though they were not healed as yet. They walked away full of hope, full of faith. Suddenly their skins started to work, the shape of the fingers and toes, of their noses and lips, of their ears and their eyelids started to readjust. The sick colours disappeared, their bodies started to glow and to shine in a newly-acquired tautness. They were healed. They started to run faster and faster in the direction of the temple to get through all the rights and observances as soon as possible and return home. But during the race one had turned around running in the opposite direction, running toward Jesus, forgetting about all those observances and regulations. He ran back to Jesus praising God at the top of his voice, throwing himself at his feet and thanking him for his salvation. And it was to him alone, the disobedient one, the one who had not done what he had been told to, the one who broke through the obligation of the law, that Jesus said "Stand up and go, your faith has saved you". The others were healed, this one was saved. The others found their families, this one found his Redeemer. It is Jesus' love for human life that will reign and nothing else. Fr Donders

A reading from the second book of the Kings

Naaman returned to Elisha, the prophet, and acknowledged the Lord.

Naaman the leper went down and immersed himself seven times in the Jordan, as Elisha had told him to do. And his flesh became clean once more like the flesh of a little child.

Returning to Elisha with his whole escort, he went in and stood before him. 'Now I know' he said, 'that there is no God in all the earth except in Israel. Now, please, accept a present from your servant.' But Elisha replied, 'As the Lord lives, whom I serve, I will accept nothing.' Naaman pressed him to accept, but he refused. Gospel Reading: Lk 17:11-19

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

It seems that no one has returned to give thanks to God except this foreigner.

On the way to Jerusalem Jesus travelled along the border between Samaria and Galilee. As he entered one of the villages, ten lepers came to meet him. They stood some way off and called to him, 'Jesus! Master! Take pity on us.' When he saw them he said, 'Go and show yourselves to the priests.' Now as they were going away they were cleansed. Finding himself cured, one of them turned back praising God at the top of his voice and threw himself at the feet of Jesus and thanked him. The man was a Samaritan. This made Jesus say, 'Were not all ten made clean? The other nine, where are they? It seems that no one has come back to give praise to God, except this foreigner.' And he said to the man, 'Stand up and go on your way. Your faith has saved you.'

This is the Gospel of the Lord...Praise to You Lord Jesus Christ

Reflection by Greg Sunter Today's gospel is one of the stories unique to the gospel of Luke. At the same time, it is a commonly known story that is often cited to demonstrate the value of saying thank you. However, as usual, there's more to this story than initially meets the eye. One of the recurrent themes of the gospel is at play here: the message of salvation that Jesus brings is available to all, not just the Jews.

The first reading is an interesting link with the gospel of Luke. In chapter 4 of the gospel, when Jesus visits Nazareth and preaches in the synagogue, he later tells a story about the prophets Elijah and Elisha responding to the needs of Gentiles rather than Jews. He tells the story to make the point that the message of salvation is not reserved exclusively for the Jews. The incident involving Elisha that Jesus refers to in chapter 4 is the one we hear in today's first reading.

Whilst both the first reading and the gospel tell stories about the healing of those with skin diseases, the common factor is actually about their expressions of gratitude and conversion of heart. In the gospel, all ten men are healed but it is only the stranger; the foreigner; the Samaritan, who comes back to give thanks and to praise God. The others – Jewish men, presumably – are only concerned about themselves and have no time to acknowledge the graciousness of God that they have experienced. The gospel writer has Jesus emphasise the point that it is the Samaritan – the outsider – who has recognised God's activity in his cure and come back to give praise and thanks. It is only he who has experienced the change of heart; the conversion of faith.
