Message from Fr Marcello

No doubt the news we had been waiting for last Sunday was not what we were anticipating. We were hoping for better. Our expectations were focussed on something a little more optimistic in terms of an easing of the restrictions that have been imposed upon us. It would be fair to say that each one us is feeling the effects of COVID fatigue by what we are hearing and what we are seeing in terms of a statistical litany of daily infections, numbers hospitalised, numbers who have died not to mention the decimation of people's lives and livelihoods. The reality is that behind each statistic there is a human being, someone who has made a tangible contribution to the world in which they live, someone who is loved and loved others in return, a family and intricate network of relationships where support is generously offered and gratefully received.

Yet the reality is that we are powerless because what is happening is beyond our control. Yet we get up each day and look to the future with hope for one day this will pass. One small thing that we can do is to switch off from the endless clamour of commentary which effectively desensitises us to the trauma that humanity is going through and remember the word of scripture, "Be still and know that I am God". Hope can emerge in the most unlikely places as I discovered whilst perusing last Sunday's Sun.

Last Sunday being Fathers Day, I came across an article that mentioned a very successful and very wealthy businessman. He had sold his business for \$300M, owns a resort and socialises with all kinds of dignitaries, yet when he reviewed his life his most cherished memory was reading Harry Potter to his children every night. Not the mega deals. Not the mega mansions. Not the pointy end of the plane. Reading a \$20 book to his kids. Whilst in some ways it is insignificant, it is a powerful reminder at a time like this what really matters most in life.

For this very successful businessman, who without doubt worked hard to achieve what he did it was nurturing his relationship with his children in their most formative years. It's what might easily be called a God moment, a God of surprises, a God who is always close and connected with people, a God to whom we cry out in the refrain of the COVID song composed by Michael Joncas, "O shelter me, O shelter me: the way ahead is dark and difficult to see. O shelter me, O shelter me: all will be well if only you will shelter me." Let's also remember, Not everything is cancelled, Sun is not cancelled, Spring is not cancelled, Relationships are not cancelled, Kindness is not cancelled, Hope is not cancelled, AND God's love for GOD'S people is never cancelled. 
Readings for Twenty fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time A

First Reading Sir 27:30 – 28:7 A reading from the book of Ecclesiasticus

Resentment and anger, these are foul things, and both are found with the sinner. He who exacts vengeance will experience the vengeance of the Lord, who keeps strict account of sin. Forgive your neighbour the hurt he does you, and when you pray, your sins will be forgiven. If a man nurses anger against another, can he then demand compassion from the Lord?

Showing no pity for a man like himself, can he then plead for his own sins? Mere creature of flesh, he cherishes resentment; who will forgive him his sins? Remember the last things, and stop hating, remember dissolution and death, and live by the commandments.

Remember the commandments, and do not bear your neighbour ill-will; remember the covenant of the Most High, and overlook the offence.

Second Reading Rom 14:7-9 A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans

The life and death of each of us has its influence on others; if we live, we live for the Lord; and if we die, we die for the Lord, so that alive or dead we belong to the Lord. This explains why Christ both died and came to life, it was so that he might be Lord both of the dead and of the living.

Gospel Mt 18:21-35 A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Peter went up to Jesus and said, 'Lord, how often must I forgive my brother if he wrongs me? As often as seven times?' Jesus answered, 'Not seven, I tell you, but seventy-seven times.

'And so the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who decided to settle his accounts with his servants. When the reckoning began, they brought him a man who owed ten thousand talents; but he had no means of paying, so his master gave orders that he should be sold, together with his wife and children and all his possessions, to meet the debt. At this, the servant threw himself down at his master's feet. "Give me time," he said "and I will pay the whole sum." And the servant's master felt so sorry for him that he let him go and cancelled the debt. Now as this servant went out, he happened to meet a fellow servant who owed him one hundred denarii; and he seized him by the throat and began to throttle him. "Pay what you owe me", he said. His fellow servant fell at his feet and implored him, saying, "Give me time and I will pay you." But the other would not agree; on the contrary, he had him thrown into prison till he should pay the debt. His fellow servants were deeply distressed when they saw what had happened, and they went to their master and reported the whole affair to him. Then the master sent for him. "You wicked servant," he said. "I cancelled all that debt of yours when you appealed to me. Were you not bound, then, to have pity on your fellow servant just as I had pity on you?" And in his anger the master handed him over to the torturers till he should pay all his debt. And that is how my heavenly Father will deal with you unless you each forgive your brother from your heart.'

The Gospel of the Lord

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
