FIRST READING 2 Kings 4:8-11,13-16

He is a holy man of God; let him rest here.

One day as Elisha was on his way to Shunem, a woman of rank who lived there pressed him to stay and eat there. After this he always broke his journey for a meal when he passed that way. She said to her husband, 'Look, I am sure the man who is constantly passing our way must be a holy man of God. Let us build him a small room on the roof, and put him a bed in it, and a table and chair and lamp; whenever he comes to us he can rest there.' One day when he came, he retired to the upper room and lay down. He said to his servant Gehazi, 'Call our Shunammitess. Tell her this: "Look, you have gone to all this trouble for us, what can we do for you? Is there anything you would like said for you to the king or to the commander of the army?" But she replied, 'I live with my own people about me.' 'What can be done for her then?' he asked. Gehazi answered. 'Well, she has no son and her husband is old.' Elisha said, 'Call her.' The servant called her and she stood at the door. This time next year,' he said 'you will hold a son in your arms.'

When we were baptised in Christ Jesus we were baptised in his death; in other words, when we were baptised we went into the tomb with him and joined him in death, so that as Christ was raised from the dead by the Father's glory, we too might live a new life.

But we believe that having died with Christ we shall return to life with him: Christ, as we know, having been raised from the dead will never die again. Death has no power over him any more. When he died, he died, once for all, to sin, so his life now is life with God; and in that way, you too must consider yourselves to be dead to sin but alive for God in Christ Jesus.

FROM FR JOHN FITZGERALD

We are preparing to return to our Sunday

Eucharist but the experience will be somewhat different. We are required to limit the number of people at Mass. There is the cleaning of the whole church between Masses. We have to observe the one person per 4 sq metre rule. Names and phone numbers of attendees must be recorded (for contact tracing). Parishioners to call the Parish Office to register for Mass as there will probably be more people desiring to attend than there are places. We desire to ensure equity and a 'fair go' to enable as many people as possible the opportunity to participate in the celebration of the Eucharist. Collection plates may be a thing of the past. Hymn books may also be a thing of the past. We will need to find alternate ways in sharing the 'Sign of Peace.' Communion to be given in the hand only and no drinking from the chalice. Hands to be sanitised on entering the church.

Reflection on this Sunday's Gospel

GOD ALONE MUST BE LOVED ABSOLUTELY

Over and over again Jesus teaches us that God has to be the principal object of our love. We must love creatures in a secondary, subordinate way. In today's Gospel he tells us in words that leave no room for doubt: whomever loves father or mother more than me is not worthy of me; and whomever loves son or daughter more than me is not worthy of me.

Our Lord teaches us true love. He asks us to love family and neighbour, but not even these loves should we put before the love of God, which must always be given an overriding priority. All other earthly loves are enriched, purified and encouraged to grow when we love God. Our heart expands and our capacity for loving increases. We find ourselves able to overcome all the obstacles and limitations of self-centredness that are present in all creatures. The pure loves of this life are raised and ennobled still more when we love God first and most of all.

To love God the way He wants us to love Him, we have to go so far as to lose our own life, that of "the old man." We have to die to those disordered tendencies which incline and induce us to sin. God wants us to preserve all that is healthy and upright and truly human in our nature, all that is good and humanly characteristic in each unique individual. Nothing genuinely human, of the positive, of the perfectible, will be lost. The life of grace will permeate the whole of man's nature and elevate it. In this way the personality of the

Christian who loves God is richly enhanced. The more we die to our selfish ego, the more truly human we become, and so much the better are we prepared for supernatural life.

The Christian who is struggling in the battle of self-denial finds he or she is living this new life: the life of Jesus. Grace respects what is characteristic in each one of us at the same time as it transforms us. so that we come to have the same attitudes and sentiments that Christ himself has concerning our neighbours and concerning events. Seeing things as He does, we begin to imitate his deeds. In this way a new, simple, natural behaviour is born in us, encouraging us to be better. We are filled with the same desires as Christ: our one objective becomes that of fulfilling the will of the Father. That, then, is the real expression of love and its clearest manifestation. Remaining what he or she is, by the help of grace, the Christian becomes identified with Jesus insofar, paradoxically, as he or she divests himself or herself of their very self. "For through the law I died to the law, that I might live to God," says St Paul. "I have been crucified with Christ; it is no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me." (Gal 2:19-20)

Love of God cannot be taken for granted. If we do not nurture and take care of it, it dies. On the other hand, difficulties can set it ablaze and confirm us in it if our will holds steadfastly in God. Love of God is nourished in prayer and in the reception of the sacraments, in the constant struggle against our defects, in the unceasing effort to maintain a living presence of God throughout the whole of our working day, in our relations with others, in our times of rest ... The Eucharist above all must be the spring at which our love of God is perpetually refreshed and strengthened. In a way, to love thus is already to possess Heaven on earth.


