# "Jesus resolutely took the road to Jerusalem."

Today's gospel marks the beginning of Jesus' journey to Jerusalem, accompanied by the disciples.. Jesus is their teacher. It is a journey to the resurrection - a journey to God. It is the prototype journey of every Christian. As nomads on the iourney, we are invited not to look back once we have thrown in our lot with Jesus. But we are invited to look around. The needs of our fellow travellers should not be neglected - the struggling poor and the lonely rich, the forgotten elderly and the alienated youth. The journey is long and hard and there are many obstacles.

Hope is sustained by the belief that the end of the journey is life with God.

The journey that Luke maps out for Jesus from here on in his Gospel cannot be found on a map. It is a literary device that Luke uses, a way of organising his material so that we centre on the death/resurrection of Jesus at Jerusalem and read everything in this light. We are continually on the road to Jerusalem and follow Jesus on the way to his Passover and ours. This difficult road is entered on "resolutely" at Jesus' side.

#### **Gospel Reflection**


This passage marks a turning point in the gospel of Luke. It is the commencement of Jesus' journey towards Jerusalem and we are told that he resolutely takes that road (or in some translations, he resolutely 'sets' his face' towards Jerusalem). Earlier in this chapter, we have heard Peter's confession of faith. seen the Transfiguration and heard Jesus predict his death. Today's passage begins the second half of the gospel of Luke and it is clear from this point forward that there is no turning back for lesus.

This passage is a difficult one on first reading; the second half of it seems to paint a picture of an unsympathetic and uncompromising Jesus. However, in the light of its positioning as the beginning of the second half of the gospel the beginning of the end – it takes on more significance. Firstly, the incident of rejection in Samaria allows Jesus to make very clear that he will never resort to violence as a solution to any problem. The reaction of the disciples seems a bit extreme as a response to an inhospitable action! Jesus' rebuke to them reminds us that what he has offered all along is an invitation that was open to all – if some don't accept the invitation you can't call fire down on them from above!

The three vignettes make plain the urgency and demanding

nature of Jesus' mission. He and his followers are constantly on the move and have no room for comforts and cosy beds. The second and third pieces contrast directly with the story from today's first reading. The message of Jesus is that the work of the Kingdom is even more important than duty to family and duty to the dead. Once he has set his face towards Jerusalem and his own death, there is no turning back – he is absolutely committed to his mission.
