IF IT'S DOMESTIC WORK IT'S NOT 'PRODUCTIVE'

A significant policy challenge for Australia is the recognition of domestic labour and its contribution to social cohesion and wellbeing, writes Claire-Anne Willis for Catholic Social Services Victoria.

Domestic work, chiefly done by women, is not yet considered as productive work or economic participation.

This was one of the findings reported at the Good

Conversation forum, Economic Frameworks and Women's Human Rights on June 28. The forum was presented by Good Shepherd Australia New Zealand, which supports women and girls at vulnerable times in their life.

The forum brought policy makers, researchers and advocates to focus on the role and limits of economics in advancing the wellbeing of women and girls. Policy that supports women to thrive improves social cohesion and makes good economic sense was a recurrent theme.

Women have made gains in the areas of education and employment opportunity. However, there are still very few women in senior positions on Australian Stock Exchange listed company boards, and the sectors with the lowest paid workers are dominated by women. Analysis of the underlining assumptions that determine economic policy as well as an understanding of the impacts of those assumptions on women is needed.

Policies that help women to thrive and increase their economic security include those that focus on work arrangements, particularly those that increase the capacity of women and men to share domestic work more equitably, and social security policies.

At present, the lack of recognition of domestic work means that caring for children and maintaining a household are not seen as economically productive. This had led to punitive social security measures: mothers caring for children are considered unemployed, while Indigenous women have been further discriminated against with the introduction of conditional welfare (Basicscard) which increases women's economic insecurity.

Forum participants asserted that, despite the level of activity on women's issues, there is not a strong structure that enables political advocacy and influence. A strong, realistic political agenda is needed.

Good Shepherd will follow up the forum with planning proposed action around women's safety, economic security and representation.

SCRIPTURE REFLECTION

The readings for today engage us in a reflection on the nature of the Trinity, as well as the ways that we are enriched by each of the divine Persons. The gospel acknowledges the sovereignty of God. This is followed immediately by mention of the handing over of all things to Jesus, making him a kind of vice-regent of God. Paul speaks of the Spirit, clearly a divine reality, but different from Jesus and the one called God. According to Paul, this Spirit is the Spirit of Jesus and the Spirit of God, implying that somehow both Jesus and God claim the Spirit. It is this Spirit who raised Jesus from the dead, and it is this same Spirit who dwells in Christians.

The grace of this Triune God touches our lives in some ways that are tangible and other ways that demand faith. The most tangible manifestation of God is Jesus himself. God has been revealed to us through this Jesus. While Jesus was a tangible person, our accepting of him as the manifestation of God requires faith, and this faith is no easier today than it was at the time of Jesus himself.

The overriding disposition of these readings is humility. Jesus, the human manifestation of the divine, is meek and humble, and the true disciple is called to be humble. A second disposition is placed before us — grateful praise. In the psalm we praise and bless God; we extol God's holy name. In Jesus we have known the tender touch of God, and we are grateful.
