And Jesus said to them, 'A prophet is only despised in his own country among his own relations and in his own house'; and he could work no miracle there, though he cured a few sick people by laying his hands on them. 

CUPPA AFTER MASS TODAY

GOSPEL REFLECTION: In the Gospel, Jesus is not accepted in His own land. People he grew up with rejected Him. We all know what it's like to be rejected. In the past, some people would say to people, walk a mile in my shoes. Imagine walking in the shoes of your parents, or your grandparents, or your cousins or your next door neighbour. Our shoes, if they could talk, would tell lots of stories of where we have been, the people we have met, how fast we have travelled, what the road or footpath or the ground we travelled on was like. Today we think about Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people. What type of journey have they walked? How have they walked on this land?

Do we know what its like to walk in someone else's shoes? What kind of footprint do we leave behind? Is it one of respect, love, kindness or is it deep and destructive, heavy with hate?



1. These readings can hit home to us in two very different ways. In some circumstances, we might be the ones who are closed to the insights of others, insights that could open our lives to new and exciting possibilities. Why are we jealous of the gifts God may have given to others and not to us? Rejecting them is really our loss!

'In other circumstances, we might be the ones who feel unappreciated, overlooked or actually rejected because of some ability we genuinely possess or some service we wish to offer. At such times, we might act as did Paul, begging God to remedy the situation. But such prayers are seldom answered as we would like, and so we too must rely on the divine promise: "My grace is sufficient for you." If we accept that grace, we will discover the truth of that promise—God's grace is indeed sufficient.'

2. 'We see Jesus Christ, true God and true man, grappling with the limitations of his own humanity and that of others. He preaches in his home town, but does not succeed in convincing those whom he probably knew from when he was a boy. We are told: 'And he could do no mighty work there, except that he laid his hands upon a few sick people and healed them.' This may mean that Jesus, shocked and disappointed, felt that a miracle

would not be worthwhile because of their degree of unbelief, but did not wish the sick to suffer because of what was lacking in others.

'For Christians, to be mindful that we are limited creatures is not to put ourselves down, but is meant to be a source of comfort. In a world where profit and loss, efficiency and productivity, dominate, there is something truly wonderful in knowing that our relationship with God does not work like this.'
