
18th Sunday in Ordinary Time / Year C 3rd & 4th August 2019

Our tradition tells us that "the earth and all that is in it belongs to God" (Psalm 24). That does not stop people from arguing over possessions and even killing for them. It never has. The Iraq war should have been a lesson to the world. There were no weapons of mass destruction. There was much coveted oil and that seems to have been the covert justification for an unconscionable invasion that cost countless lives. There seems to be something deep within the human psyche that continually seeks for more. Those who seek to be "rich toward God" or "rich in God" find life. Those who seek to be rich in material possessions will simply be left, at life's end, with a question: "To whom will this hoard belong?" The question is rhetorical and expects the answer of Psalm 24: "the earth and all that is in it belongs to God".

Jesus is addressed as "teacher", and is asked to force a decision in an inheritance debate. He demonstrates that he is "teacher" rather than "divider". He tells a hard hitting story. He knows that story-telling is more effective in bringing people to life-giving decisions than is any attempt to bring down a definitive ruling, especially for those who surely know the law. His story is about a landowner who is blessed by an abundant harvest. The estate manager as well as the peasant workers and their families might reasonably expect a share in the profits, even a remission of the debts they inevitably carry. In this instance, the blessing of abundance turns the land-owner inwards rather than out towards others and so "toward God". First person singular pronouns predominate: "What am / to do? / have no place..../ will do this..../ will / will / will / will gor senselessness of stockpiling for personal gain is highlighted by the shift to second person singular, "You fool...", and by the divine judgment on the landowner's self-focus and greed. Greed appears in today's reading from the letter to the community at Colossae. For the author of that letter, greed is simply idolatry, worship of a false god (Col 3:5)

In these times of planetary vulnerability, there is some urgency about the call to place our trust in the goodness of a generous God, to reduce our ecological footprint and to acknowledge that the good things of the earth belong to God and to all of God's people, not just to the privileged few. In refusing to "store up treasure" for our own selfish ends, we become forever "rich toward God". This applies to nation-states as well as to individuals. We have some responsibility for what is done in our name, for the size and deployment of our foreign aid budget for instance. The command to "be on your guard, be ever vigilant" in this respect is a demand for gospel justice.

It is especially good for the younger women, many of whom are single mothers." So you can be assured that your financial support makes a real difference to the families and members of Fr Mick's former parish on the outskirts of Lima.

AUGUST 6: TRANSFIGURATION; HIROSHIMA

The Feast of the Transfiguration of Jesus on August 6 celebrates a story of possibility. The glory of Jesus as the Son of God was revealed to his disciples on the mountain. The glory of the humanity that he had taken on was also revealed, and with it the unique value and the destiny of each human being.

This feast of possibility is now indelibly linked to another event of negation. On August 6, 1945 the atomic bomb was dropped on Hiroshima in 1945, an event of hitherto inconceivable darkness. It marked the worthlessness and expendability of each human being in modern warfare.

The conjunction of the two commemorations is rightly challenging. It marks a choice between humanity and barbarism, between a vision of human beings as disposable cogs in someone else's machine and as persons to be respected because of their inalienable value. The respectful choice has been embodied in the fragile cooperation between states to protect people seeking asylum, to build their relationships on trust and negotiation, to negotiate mutual disarmament and to make care for the world and for people who are disadvantaged a shared commitment. The brutal choice has been embodied in the insistence on self-interest as determinative of relationships between nations, the exclusion and punishment of people who seek protection and contempt for the environment and people who are disadvantaged.

In societies the choice between humanity and brutality is cyclical. The commemoration of Hiroshima, however, indicates the heavy risk attached to cycles. The devastation there covered a radius of fourteen kilometers. The strongest thermonuclear weapon tested since destroyed the earth for 100 kilometers around the explosion, an area greater than that of any Australian city. If in international relationships there is no space for the restraint that respect for persons and the claim of harmony place on the actions of individual states, the long-term proliferation of nuclear weapons will be irresistible. The likelihood of them being used by inadequate and unprincipled national leaders against putative enemies will grow correspondingly.



The terrible light of Hiroshima is a warning. The joyful light of the Mount of the Transfiguration is an invitation. On the mountain Jesus gathered with representatives of Israel's history and with his disciples who saw his glory. They were then invited to go down the mountain in hostile times to follow him in recognizing the reflected glory of each human being and inviting them into Jesus' company. This was a way of community, courage and love.



The groups might choose to meet only once, or they may decide that more than one meeting is necessary – that will be the decision of each group. 
THANK YOU COIN RAFFLE FOR OUR ALTAR **SERVERS**

I didn't buy them. In 2001, for the centenary of the Commonwealth of Australia, the Royal Australian Mint issued a total of 19 commemorative coins. There was also a 20 cent coin issued to mark 50 years of the United Nations, a 50 cent coin featuring the tall ships to mark the bi-centenary of white settlement and a 50 cent coin featuring the ram's head (as on the old shilling coins) to mark 25 years of decimal currency.
