Making Connections: 'To hear the teaching of the Father and learn from it is to come to me'. Are you coming closer to Jesus?

Exploring the Word: 'The Jews' are trapped in their earthly reality and cannot move beyond it into the mystery of God present among them. For 'the Jews' the gift which God gave is the Law. They cannot move into the new reality that Jesus has surpassed this and offers something greater —his flesh for the life of the world. It is through his death and resurrection that salvation will be won.

Daily Prayer: Guide your church, O God, on the paths of its earthly pilgrimage, and sustain with the food that does not perish so that, persevering in the faith to which Christ has called us, we may come at last to your holy mountain and gaze on the beauty of your face.

Marriage Tip: "Your life is more than your work and your work is more than your job." (From the song by the same name by Charlie King.) Is your 'job' getting in the way of your family relationships? Both are important, but as another song puts it, "Time is love."

Vocational View: To taste and see the goodness of the Lord means to be drawn closer to God. "Try, then, to imitate God as children of His that He loves, and follow Christ by loving as He loved you." Be a presence of God's love in the world today. Do what you can to bring to life God's love

The eConference last Wednesday was attended by 16 parishioners. We will make the Speaker's talks available when they are on line.

Archbishop Mark Coleridge talked about 'what is a synodal church?' It is the church on a journey, a teaching and learning church, listening to all the voices of people, and to listen to the Holy Spirit in the messiness of our journey together. Synodality is a word not much heard till Pope Francis started using it, and some people struggle to understand it. How new is it and how does it relate to Vatican II and Scripture? In a truly synodal Church who listens to whom? What have been your own experiences of faith, and of the Church which has shaped you? Who can you/your community encourage to join in a Listening and Dialogue Encounter to ensure their story is contributes to shaping the future of the Church in Australia? What needs to be done to make our church truly synodal?

Are bishops, clergy, laity, religious orders, youth acting on Francis' synodal call, in different ways? Do you feel you are listened to?

"Tradition" reminds us that we live our faith in history, which we receive from those who have passed on their faith to us. Have you experienced "tradition" as a positive force in the life of the Church? What might it contribute to the life and mission of the Church?

The Holy Spirit at the centre of the Church calls the Church to move to the future, to the fullness of life in Christ, without abandoning the faith we have received through history. What challenges do you face in being open to change and the "eternal newness" of God, while remaining connected to the past, to the history of faith?

The Holy Spirit "blows where it wills" (Jn 3:8). Where might the Spirit be blowing today?

What might the Spirit be asking of us as a Church? What skills/attitudes/practices enable us to listen for the Spirit in different points of view while also remaining united in our faith?

May these points and questions guide us in our reflections and personal responses.

gospel. It may seem strange, therefore, that John has the "Jews" complaining about Jesus. It is indeed strange, and it has caused many a reader to wonder. John seems to use the designation "Jew" as a code word for the opponents of Jesus. These opponents are almost exclusively Jewish leaders rather than the ordinary people who followed Jesus. The designation does not include all the Jewish leaders of course: Nicodemus and Joseph of Arimathea stand out as leaders who came to believe in Jesus as the Christ and to take risks on account of their faith. The complaint of the "Jews" relates to Jesus' claim, "I am the bread that came down from heaven". Jesus shares the world view: God is in

Look towards him and be radiant; let whoever eats this bread will live for your faces not be abashed. This poor man called; the Lord heard him and rescued him from all his distress.

Gospel: John 6:41-51

The Jews were complaining to each other about Jesus, because he had said, 'I am the bread that came down from heaven.' 'Surely this is Jesus son of Joseph' they said. 'We know his father and mother. How can he now say, "I have come down from heaven"?' Jesus said in reply, 'Stop complaining to each other. 'No one can come to me unless he is drawn by the Father who sent me, and I will raise him up at the last day. It is written in the prophets: They will all be taught by God, and to hear the teaching of the Father, and learn from it, is to come to me. Not that anybody has seen the Father, except the one who comes from God: he has seen the Father. I tell you most solemnly, everybody who believes has eternal life. I am the bread of life. Your fathers ate the manna in the desert and they are dead; but this is the bread that comes down from heaven, so that a man may eat it and not die. I am the living bread which has come down from heaven. Anyone who eats this bread will live for ever; and the bread that I shall give is my flesh, for the life of the world.

another level. The eucharistic overtones in today's reading are subtle but nonetheless present, as they were in the feeding story. John is writing some seventy years after the death of Jesus for communities that gathered every week for the breaking of the bread-in remembrance of him and of all that he enacted. Like the early Christians, we reflect on the meaning of eucharist. We recognise and honour the materiality of the bread and of the flesh that Jesus shares with all living creatures. At the same time we are invited to reflect on the symbolic or metaphorical resonances of both bread and flesh in the context of the claims of the Johannine Jesus. The question for us then becomes: "How do we live into this extraordinary mystery as we face the demands of our endangered planet?"
