

> This week's Story: SHIRLEY FROM **THE PHILIPPINES**

Shirley, 36, is an indigenous Manide woman living in a remote province of the Philippines. She is a mother of four and the sole breadwinner of the family, as her husband is sick. Shirley was struggling

to support the whole family and keep her children in school. Indigenous minorities in the Philippines face regular discrimination and disadvantage, limiting their access to education, employment and healthcare. Thanks to Caritas Australia, Shirley's life has transformed. She is now leading her community to take a stand against discrimination, improve health and education, and pave the way for a better future. Unequal access to health services means that many indigenous children and families cannot access basic medical care. Preventable diseases - tuberculosis, dengue fever, measles - are common among their community, and there is a high maternal and new-born mortality rate. Shirley trained to become an indigenous health worker and a leader in her community. The program has also helped Shirley's children with school fees, uniforms and supplies. There's still a long way to go to fight for better employment opportunities for the Manide tribe, to reduce discrimination, but together they'll get there.

Pope Francis: Lent is a new beginning, a path leading to the certain goal of Easter, Christ's victory over death. Lent calls us to conversion, to return to God "with all our hearts" (Joel 2:12), to refuse to settle for mediocrity and to grow in friendship with the Lord.

Pope Francis has a surprisingly modern suggestion, asking us to "disconnect from cell phones and connect to the Gospel," for Lent, can be a time to turn off the television and open the Bible. Keep the chatter to a minimum and connect with and hear the word of God. The internet makes this difficult, as it can amplify the "offensive and harmful words" people throw around, creating an environment that is "polluted by too much verbal violence." If you find yourself furiously typing angry comments into YouTube, Twitter, Instagram, Reddit or whatever your preferred platform to spew is, consider taking a moment to pause. For us, Lent is a period of abstinence, fasting, repentance and reflection, and it is common to give up something for the 40-days. Typical sacrifices include excessive spending, unhealthy foods or bad habits, but Pope Francis suggests holding your tongue, or in this case, fingers, could be a good option.

Jesus is the faithful friend who never abandons us. Even when we sin, he patiently awaits our return; by that patient expectation, he shows his readiness to forgive. Lent is a favorable season for deepening our spiritual life through fasting, prayer and almsgiving. Central to everything is the word of God, which we are invited to hear and ponder more deeply, to renew our encounter with Christ, live in his word, in the sacraments and in our neighbour.

The Lord, who overcame the deceptions of the Tempter in today's Gospel, shows us the path we must take. Let us pray for one another that the Holy Spirit lead us on a journey of conversion, that we can rediscover the gift of God's word, be purified of the sin that blinds us, serve Christ in each other's needs, and experience and share to the full, the joy of Easter.

LENTEN REGULATIONS 2020

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of Fasting and Abstinence from meat.

On all other Fridays, the law of the common practice of penance is fulfilled through any one of the following: (a)Prayer: for example, Mass attendance; family prayer, a visit to a church or chapel, reading the Bible, making the Stations of the Cross, praying the rosary. (b)Self-denial: for example, not eating meat, not eating sweets or desserts, reducing time for watching TV or other entertainments.

(c)Helping others- for example, taking the family to visit the elderly in old people's home or in the parish, visiting the sick or someone who is lonely.

- ◆All who have completed their 18th year and have not yet begun their 60th year should fast. (Canon 1252)
- ♦All who have completed their 14th year are bound to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday.
- ♦On Good Friday and on Holy Saturday until the Easter vigil, try to fast on these days.

Frist Reading: Genesis 2,7-9, 3,1-7

The Lord God fashioned man of dust from the soil. Then he breathed into his nostrils a breath of life, and thus man became a living being. The Lord God planted a garden in Eden which is in the east, and there he put the man he had fashioned. The Lord God caused to spring up from the soil every kind of tree, enticing to look at and good to eat, with the tree of life and the tree of the knowledge of good and evil in the middle of the garden. The serpent was the most subtle of all the wild beasts that the Lord God had made. It asked the woman, 'Did God really say you were not to eat from any of the trees in the garden?' The woman answered the serpent, 'We may eat the fruit of the trees in the garden. But of the fruit of the tree in the middle of the garden God said, "You must not eat it, nor touch it, under pain of death".' Then the serpent said to the woman, 'No! You will not die! God knows in fact that on the day you eat it your eyes will be opened and you will be like gods, knowing good and evil.' The woman saw that the tree was good to eat and pleasing to the eye, and that it was desirable for the knowledge that it could give. So she took some of its fruit and ate it. She gave some also to her husband who was with her, and he ate it. Then the eyes of both of them were opened and they realised that they were naked. So they sewed fig-leaves together to make themselves loin-cloths.

Reflection 1st Sunday of Lent. Veronica Lawson RSM

Lent is a time of preparation for Easter. It is also a time to enter into the "wilderness" and grapple with the mysteries of life in Christ. It presents us with a challenge to take stock of our lives, to see more clearly what is in our hearts and to discover what might be calling us out of our comfort zones. Today's liturgy invites us to reflect on Jesus' forty-day experience in the wilderness. Jesus is "filled with the Holy Spirit" and, like so many humans before and since, is "led by the Spirit" into the wilderness of life to be "tested" there. ["Tested" is a more accurate translation of than is "tempted"]. Forty is a significant number in Israel's story: the great flood lasts forty days and forty nights; Moses spends forty days and forty nights on the mountain of God; Israel wanders for forty years in the wilderness; King David reigns for forty years; the prophet Elijah travels forty days and forty nights in the wilderness on his way to the mountain of God. Explanations of its significance vary: a round number suggesting a long period of time; a time of testing or trial; totality or fullness. In Israel's story, the wilderness is the place

Second Reading: Romans 5, 12-

Sin entered the world through one man, and through sin death, and thus death has spread through the whole human race because everyone has sinned. If it is certain that death reigned over everyone as the consequence of one man's fall, it is even more certain that one man, Jesus Christ, will cause everyone to reign in life who receives the free gift that he does not deserve, of being made righteous. Again, as one man's fall brought condemnation on everyone, so the good act of one man brings everyone life and makes them justified. As by one man's disobedience many were made sinners, so by one man's obedience many will be made righteous.

Gospel: Matthew 4:1-11

Jesus was led by the Spirit out into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. He fasted for forty days and forty nights, after which he was very hungry, and the tempter came and said to him, 'If you are the Son of God, tell these stones to turn into loaves.' But he replied, 'Scripture says: Man does not live on bread alone but on every word that comes from the mouth of God.' The devil then took him to the holy city and made him stand on the parapet of the Temple. 'If you are the Son of God,' he said, 'throw yourself down; for scripture says: He will put you in his angels' charge, and they will support you on their hands in case you hurt your foot against a stone.' Jesus said to him, 'Scripture also says: You must not put the Lord your God to the test.' Next, taking him to a very high mountain, the devil showed him all the kingdoms of the world and their splendour. 'I will give you all these', he said, 'if you fall at my feet and worship me.' Then Jesus replied, 'Be off, Satan! For scripture says: You must worship the Lord your God, and serve him alone.' Then the devil left him, and angels appeared and looked after him.

of testing for God's people. In Matthew's account, the "devil" is the "tester", the instrument of God's testing. In each instance, the test is expressed in terms of Jesus' relationship to God: "If you are the son of God...." The Matthean Jesus passes the tests that the people of Israel have failed in the wilderness of Sinai. He refuses the way of special favour from God, the way of status. He is prepared to suffer whatever it takes to bring healing and wholeness to a broken world. Jesus chooses the way of God's empire rather than the brutality of the Roman Empire. Jesus demonstrates that he is indeed "of God". This testing in the wilderness foreshadows later events in the gospel such as Peter's attempt at Caesarea Philippi to deflect Jesus from his mission and the bystanders' challenge in 27:40 to prove he is "son of God" by coming down from the cross. Being "of God" right now has to do with the way we relate to all of Earth's human and its resources, the value and the respect we show for life through our responsible use of these. Lent calls us to reject the path of domination or greed or status so that, like Jesus, we may truly be "of God".

Next week's Gospel Matthew 17,1-9

Jesus took with him Peter and James and his brother John and led them up a high mountain where they could be alone. There in their presence he was transfigured; his face shone like the sun and his clothes became as white as the light. Suddenly Moses and Elijah appeared to them; they were talking with him. Then Peter spoke to Jesus. 'Lord,' he said 'it is wonderful for us to be here; if you wish, I will make three tents here, one for you, one for Moses and one for Elijah.' He was still speaking when suddenly a bright cloud covered them with shadow, and from the cloud there came a voice

which said, 'This is my Son, the Beloved; he enjoys my favour. Listen to him'. When they heard this, the disciples fell on their faces, overcome with fear. But Jesus came up and touched them. 'Stand up,' he said 'do not be afraid.' And when they raised their eyes they saw no one but only Jesus. As they came down from the mountain Jesus gave them this order. 'Tell no one about the vision until the Son of Man has risen from the dead.'
