From the Parish Council Meeting June 18 10 attendees, 4 apologies. Coughlin Park: With a Business Plan presented to us, the Council approved the

presented to us, the Council approved the Project to proceed; there were 3 tenders, all close to the building budget of \$1.1million. No decision to date on a successful tender. On recommendation of the Finance Group, acknowledging that the Parish owns the land at Coughlin Park, and that many Parish families were/are involved in developing Coughlin Park to this day, the Parish will contribute \$150,000 from the Land Sales of 2011, to help complete the Project. User Groups are contributing \$200,000 between them, the Government Grant is \$905,000. Sr Jacinta is offering our Parish Programs that support our spiritual life, the timetable for these is in the rest of the Bulletin. Planned Giving Program: It is 4 years since the last Renewal. There will be a Renewal Program in October, details to come in next few months.

Gospel Reflection - Veronica Lawson Today's gospel story looks back to the parables that comprise the first part of the chapter and to the crowds that heard these parables: it is the evening of that same day. This story also looks forward as it marks the beginning of the second major section of Mark's gospel (4:35-8:21), a section that seems to be structured around a number of crossings of the lake, or Sea of Galilee. Jesus' decision to move with his disciples out of familiar territory is deliberate: "Let us go across...." The crossing itself is difficult, as is the challenge that confronts them on the other side of the lake. From the disciples' perspective, the seeming indifference of the sleeping Jesus is even more disturbing than the storm that I threatens their safe crossing: "Do you not care ...?" Jesus demonstrates that he does indeed care. From his perspective, the problem is with the fear in their

from their distress. He stilled the storm to a whisper: all the waves of the sea were hushed.

They rejoiced because of the calm and he led them to the haven they desired. Let them thank the Lord for his love, the wonders he does for men.

2nd Reading: 2 Corinthians 5:14-17 The love of Christ overwhelms us when we reflect that if one man has died for all, then all men should be dead: and the reason he died for all was so that living men should live no longer for themselves, but for him who died and was raised to life for them. From now onwards, therefore, we do not judge anyone by the standards of the flesh. Even if we did once know Christ in the flesh, that is not how we know him now. And for anyone who is in Christ, there is a new creation; the old creation has gone, and now the new one is here.

Acclamation: Luke 7:16 Alleluia, alleluia! A great prophet has appeared among us; God has visited his people. Alleluia!

Gospel: Mark 4:35-41

With the coming of evening, Jesus said to his disciples, 'Let us cross over to the other side.' And leaving the crowd behind they took him, just as he was, in the boat; and there were other boats with him. Then it began to blow a gale and the waves were breaking into the boat so that it was almost swamped. But he was in the stern, his head on the cushion, asleep. They woke him and said to him, 'Master, do vou not care? We are going down!' And he woke up and rebuked the wind and said to the sea. 'Quiet now! Be calm!' And the wind dropped, and all was calm again. Then he said to them, 'Why are you so frightened? How is it that you have no faith?' They were filled with awe and said to one another, 'Who can this be? Even the wind and the sea obey him.'

hearts, a fear that is grounded in their lack of faith: "Why are you afraid? Have you still no faith?"

In the context of this Markan story, Jesus is like the sower in the parable (4:27-28) who goes to sleep and trusts that the seed will sprout and grow and bear fruitwhich it does. Within a first-century Jewish context, Jesus' ability to "rebuke" the storm is a sign of divine power: in the Psalms, for instance, the God of Israel is the one who stills the roaring of the seas (Psalm 65:5) and controls the creatures that inhabit the waters (Psalm 89:9). Today's first reading has insisted that God commands the sea and all of its moods. God the Birthing Mother presents Job with a series of rhetorical questions, reminding him and us that, while the sea may be threatening, it is God's new born infant, wrapped in God's swaddling clothes of darkness and cloud.

And the source of the bleeding dried up instantly, and she felt in herself that she was cured of her complaint. Immediately aware that power had gone out of him, Jesus turned around in the crowd and said, 'Who touched my clothes?' His disciples said to him, 'You see how the crowd is pressing round you and yet you say, "Who touched me?"' But he continued to look all round to see who had done it. Then the woman came forward, frightened

We read Mark's little story against the backdrop of the Hebrew Scriptures. We might also read it in light of contemporary science and so find within it a call to consider how our species respects or fails to respect and to nurture the fruit of God's womb, the cosmos. This story of the storm at sea is not an invitation to be complacent about the extreme weather events on our planet, trusting in God that all will be well. Such terrifying events can derive from the movement of tectonic plates over which we have no control. They can also derive from or be exacerbated by excessive carbon emissions. We pollute the atmosphere and make the seas to rise at our peril. Trust in God may involve relinguishing vested interests and engaging the processes that are designed to reverse the effects of human-induced climate change.
