The Parish Pastoral Council met on Wednesday to discuss Bishop Paul Bird's request to our Parish if we would consider accommodating two Baptistine Sisters from the Philippines.

Bishop Paul has invited the Sisters to come to the Diocese, and, if our Parish agrees to this, they will live here, with costs shared with the Diocese.

One of the Sisters will be employed by the Diocese and travel from here.

The other Sister will work in our Parish and across the Wimmera Region.

The Parish Council responded *optimistically* to the Bishop's request, but said there were a number of issues to be considered before we could make a final decision.

Some of those issues are:

- ** To have a review of our Parish to assess our present and future needs (last review was 8 years ago).
- ** Do we want the Sisters to live here?
- ** What can we do for the Sisters?
- ** Costs involved.
- ** What is the Bishop's time frame for the Sisters .
- ** The Sisters approach to contemporary theology and spirituality as a help to enriching our Parish Life?
- ** Further information on the Sisters Ministry and work experience.
- ** The need for the Sisters to visit our Parish before we can make a decision.



1st Reading: Deuteronomy 30:10-14 Moses said to the people: 'Obey the voice of the Lord your God, keeping those commandments and laws of his that are written in the Book of this Law, and you shall return to the Lord your God with all your heart and soul. 'For this Law that I enjoin on you today is not beyond your strength or beyond your reach. It is not in heaven, so that you need to wonder, "Who will go up to heaven for us and bring it down to us, so that we may hear it and keep it?" Nor is it beyond the seas, so that you need to wonder, "Who will cross the seas for us and bring it back to us, so that we may hear it and keep it?" No, the Word is very near to you, it is in your mouth and in your heart for your observance.'

Responsorial Psalm: Ps 68:14. 17. 30-Turn to the Lord in your need, and you will live.

This is my prayer to you, my prayer for your favour. In your great love, answer me, O God, with your help that never fails: Lord, answer, for your love is kind; n your compassion, turn towards me.

As for me in my poverty and pain let your help, O God, lift me up. I will praise God's name with a song; I will glorify him with thanksgiving.

The poor when they see it will be glad and God-seeking hearts will revive; for the Lord listens to the needy and does not spurn his

servants in their chains.

For God will bring help to Zion and rebuild the cities of Judah and men shall dwell there in possession. The sons of his servants shall inherit it; those who love his name shall dwell

Turn to the Lord in your need, and you will live.

2nd Reading: Colossians 1:15-20

Christ Jesus is the image of the unseen God and the first-born of all creation, for in him were created all things in heaven and on earth: everything visible and everything invisible, Thrones, Powers, Dominations, Sovereignties, - all things were created through him and for him. Before anything was created, he existed, and he holds all things in unity. Now the Church is his body, he is its head. As he is the Beginning, he was first to be born from the dead, so that he should be first in every way; because God wanted all perfection to be found in him, all things to be reconciled through him and for him, everything in heaven and everything on earth, when he made peace by his death on the cross.

Acclamation: cf John 6:63, 68 Alleluia, alleluia! Your words, Lord, are spirit and life; you have the words of everlasting life. Alleluia!

Gospel: Luke 10:25-37

There was a lawyer who, to disconcert Jesus, stood up and said to him,

'Master, what must I do to inherit eternal life?' He said to him, 'What is written in the Law? What do you read there?' He replied, 'You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your strength, and with all your mind, and your neighbour as yourself.' 'You have answered right,' said Jesus. 'Do this and life is yours.' But the man was anxious to justify himself and said to Jesus, 'And who is my neighbour?' Jesus replied, 'A man was once on his way down from Jerusalem to Jericho and fell into the hands of brigands; they took all he had, beat him and then made off, leaving him half dead. Now a priest happened to be travelling down the same road, but when he saw the man, he passed by on the other side. In the same way a Levite who came to the place saw him, and passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan traveller who came upon him was moved with compassion when he saw him. He went up and bandaged his wounds, pouring oil and wine on them. He then lifted him on to his own mount, carried him to the inn and looked after him. Next day, he took out two denarii and handed them to the innkeeper. "Look after him," he said "and on my way back I will make good any extra expense you have." Which of these three, do you think, proved himself a neighbour to the man who fell into the brigands' hands?' 'The one who took pity on him' he replied. Jesus said to him, 'Go, and do the same yourself.'

Gospel Reflection - 15th Sunday Yr C. Sr Veronica Lawson rsm If we are to be neighbour in our times, we need to think cosmically as well as globally, and to act globally as well as locally. Thinking cosmically means embracing the entire story of our expanding and evolving universe. It means accepting our cosmic identity and our intimate connectedness to the whole of creation. Thinking cosmically elicits wonder and respect for all created being and especially for God who is Source and Sustainer of all Creation. Cosmic thinking provides a context for acting globally and locally, for being a neighbour in our local and global environments.

Today's Gospel story is about being neighbour. It foregrounds the human characters and their relationships with each other. The lawyer who questions

Jesus is trying to catch him out. Like Jesus' audience, this legal expert knows the Jewish law regarding love of God and of one's neighbour. He answers Jesus' first question correctly. This leads to another 'test' question: 'Who is my neighbour?' Jesus replies with a subversive story that ends in yet another the priest and the Levite who 'pass by'. question: 'Which of these three was neighbour...?' The lawyer cannot avoid the obvious answer, though it would cost a Jewish legal expert dearly to admit that a Samaritan could be neighbour to a Jew in need. Rather than utter the word 'Samaritan' he answers obliquely, 'the one who showed mercy'. The Samaritan is 'moved with compassion', literally 'moved in the depths of his being'. The Samaritan befriends the wounded traveller and draws on all his resources to care for him: wine and oil to dress the wounds.

his 'own animal' as transport, finance for accommodation, companionship at the inn, provision for ongoing care. The story offers the shocking suggestion that a Samaritan knows more about love of God and of neighbour than do those who officiate in Temple worship, namely If we substitute 'Al Qaeda' or 'Taliban operative' for 'Samaritan', we might begin to understand the power of this parable and the grace that it can offer. Cosmic thinking invites us to focus not just on people from different cultures and social strata in this story, but also on the neighbourly animal, the fruit of the vine and of the olive grove, and the silver coins formed of material extracted from the earth and engaged as signs of compassionate neighbourly love. It invites us to reverence all of creation and the Creator of all that is.

Next Week's Gospel - Luke 10:38-42

Jesus came to a village, and a woman named Martha welcomed him into her house. She had a sister called Mary, who sat down at the Lord's feet and listened to him speaking. Now Martha who was distracted with all the serving said, 'Lord, do you not care that my

sister is leaving me to do the serving all by myself? Please tell her to help me.' But the Lord answered: 'Martha, Martha,' he said, 'you worry and fret about so many things, and yet few are needed, indeed only one. It is Mary who has chosen the better part; it is not to be taken from her.'
