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



1st Reading: Daniel 7:9-10. 13-14

As I watched: Thrones were set in place and one of great age took his seat. His robe was white as snow, the hair of his head as pure as wool. His throne was a blaze of flames, its wheels were a burning fire. A stream of fire poured out, issuing from his presence. A thousand thousand waited on him, ten thousand times ten thousand stood before him. A court was held and the books were opened. I gazed into the visions of the night. And I saw, coming on the clouds of heaven, one like a son of man. He came to the one of great age and was led into his presence. On him was conferred sovereignty, glory and kingship, and men of all peoples, nations and languages became his servants. His sovereignty is an eternal sovereignty which shall never pass away, nor will his empire ever be destroyed.

Responsorial Psalm: Ps 96:1-2. 5-6. 9

The Lord is king, the most high over all the earth.

The Lord is king, let earth rejoice, let all the coastlands be glad. Cloud and darkness are his raiment; his throne, justice and right.

The mountains melt like wax before the Lord of all the earth. The skies

proclaim his justice; all peoples see he glory.

For you indeed are the Lord most high above all the earth exalted far above all spirits.

The Lord is king, the most high over all the earth.

2nd Reading: 2 Peter 1:16-19

It was not any cleverly invented myths that we were repeating when we brought you the knowledge of the power and the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ; we had seen his majesty for ourselves. He was honoured and glorified by God the Father, when the Sublime Glory itself spoke to him and said, 'This is my Son, the Beloved; he enjoys my favour.' We heard this ourselves, spoken from heaven, when we were with him on the holy mountain. So we have confirmation of what was said in prophecies; and you will be right to depend on prophecy and take it as a lamp for lighting a way through the dark until the dawn comes and the morning star rises in your minds.

Acclamation Matthew 17:5

Alleluia, alleluia!

This is my Son, my beloved, in whom is all my delight: listen to him. Alleluia!

Gospel: Matthew 17:1-9

Jesus took with him Peter and James and his brother John and led them up a high mountain where they could be alone. There in their presence he was transfigured: his face shone like the sun and his clothes became as white as the light. Suddenly Moses and Elijah appeared to them; they were talking with him. Then Peter spoke to Jesus. 'Lord,' he said 'it is wonderful for us to be here; if you wish, I will make three tents here, one for you, one for Moses and one for Elijah.' He was still speaking when suddenly a bright cloud covered them with shadow, and from the cloud there came a voice which said, 'This is my Son, the Beloved; he enjoys my favour. Listen to him.' When they heard this, the disciples fell on their faces, overcome with fear. But Jesus came up and touched them. 'Stand up,' he said 'do not be afraid.' And when they raised their eyes they saw no one but only Jesus. As they came down from the mountain Jesus gave them this order, 'Tell no one about the vision until the Son of Man has risen from the dead.'

Gospel Reflection –Dianne Bergant CCS

Visions and dreams were considered avenues of divine revelation. The scene (Daniel 7:9-10, 13-14) depicts the courts of heaven at the end of the ages. The major figures are the Ancient One and the one I like a Son of Man. "Ancient One" implies both eternity and great wisdom. The one who comes on the clouds is described as one like the Son of Man. This mysterious I figure is installed by God as ruler over the entire universe. He will be an everlasting kingdom, granted by God, not attained by means of conquest or political alliance. This figure may have been in heaven when he received his commission, he may even rule from some exalted place in the heavens, but his kingdom belongs to the learth. The psalm (96:1-2,5-6,9) opens with the traditional enthronement declaration. 'The Lord is king!' Behind this exclamation is the theme of divine kingship. It is appropriately followed by an exhortation: 'Let the earth rejoice!" God's rule is

constructed in the permanence of justice and judgment. It is impregnable and immutable. The universal kingship of the Lord is beyond question. The response with a proclamation of praise is addressed directly to the Lord. It captures the essence of the preceding verses. God is exalted above both heaven and earth. There is no threat of future upheaval or rebellion. God has no rivals. The divine king has been enthroned and the rule of this God will last forever. A defensive tone seems to surface in the second reading (2 Peter 1:16-19). The authenticity of the gospel message preached by the author appears to have come under attack. He witnessed the transfiguration of Jesus. If Jesus could have been so transformed during his lifetime, surely he could return in the same glory. Furthermore, there is the prophetic message that foretold the coming of the messiah. Two very powerful metaphors are used to describe the Parousia of the Lord; both characterise it as the coming of light out of darkness: the dawning of the

eschatological day of fulfilment; and the rising of the morning star. The Scriptures themselves bear witness to the truth of the gospel message. The gospel narrative (Matthew 17:1-9) recounts a theophany, a self-revelation of God.. The once popular interpretation of this as a post-resurrection story read back into the time of the public ministry of Jesus has been challenged by most commentators today. Rather, they believe that it describes an insight into the identity that was his during his public life. Thus the transformation was a change that took place when Jesus' inner reality shone forth and transfigured his outer appearance. Moses and Elijah, the representatives of the law and the prophets, confirm Jesus' authority and the legitimacy of his teaching. While these men converse with Jesus, the voice from the cloud speaks to the apostles. They are the ones who seem to need the identification of Jesus and the directive from God.

Next Sundays Gospel: Matthew 14:22-33

Jesus made the disciples get into the boat and go on ahead to the other side while he would send the crowds away. After sending the crowds away he went up into the hills by himself to pray. When evening came, he was there alone, while the boat, by now far out on the lake, was battling with a heavy sea, for there was a head-wind. In the fourth watch of the night he went towards them, walking on the lake, and when the disciples

saw him walking on the lake they were terrified. 'It is a ghost' they said, and cried out in fear. But at once Jesus called out to them, saying 'Courage! It is I! Do not be afraid.' It was Peter who answered. 'Lord', he said 'if it is you, tell me to come to you across the water.' 'Come' said Jesus. Then Peter got out of the boat and started walking towards Jesus across the water, but as soon as he felt the force of the wind, he took fright and began to sink. 'Lord! Save me!' he cried. Jesus put out his hand at once

and held him. 'Man of little faith,' he said 'why did you doubt?' And as they got into the boat the wind dropped. The men in the boat bowed down before him and said, 'Truly, you are the Son of God.'
