#### Reflection

Jesus confronts his disciples with two big questions in this Sunday's St Matthew Gospel.

'Who do people say the Son of Man is?' And they said, 'Some say he is John the Baptist, some Elijah, and others Jeremiah or one of the prophets.'

'But you,' he said 'who do you say I am?'

Peter's simple response?, 'You are the Christ, the Son of the living God.'
Finally, for the disciples, the penny has dropped. And so begins a new journey for them as Jesus starts to prepare them to take the reins of the Church.

We know Peter's answer, but to fully embrace the truth of that answer, we cannot just let it sit there. As Sir Gerard Brennan, former Chief Justice of Australia so eloquently put it in 1999:

The Australian Church is our Church, our responsibility, our beloved home. In that context, egalitarianism means that, while Bishops, Priests and People have different functions to perform, each has an equal responsibility for, and an equal right to, performance of those functions. Tolerance requires that we understand that the Church, Divine in origin, depends on humans to perform their several functions and we must accept the failures and the shortcomings of ourselves and others, keeping our minds and hearts on Him who is our end and purpose.

# World Refugees & Migration Day 2017

The Holy See sets aside this Sunday as a special commemoration for Refugees and Migrants. "Whoever receives one such child in my name receives me; and whoever receives me, receives not me but him who sent me" (*Mk*9:37;

cf. Mt 18:5; Lk 9:48; Jn 13:20) For this reason, on the occasion of the annual World Day of Migrants and Refugees, I feel compelled to draw attention to the reality of child migrants, especially the ones who are alone. In doing so I ask everyone to take care of the young, who in a threefold way are defenceless: they are children, they are foreigners, and they have no means to protect themselves. I ask everyone to help those who, for various reasons, are forced to live far from their homeland and are separated from their families. (Pope Francis)

## Fr James O'Regan -100th anniversary of his Death August 2017

In 1880, at the age of 24,Fr O'Regan arrived in Melbourne from Dublin He was appointed as curate to Monsignor O'Dowd, succeeding him as Parish Priest. During his charge of the Port Fairy parish he was instrumental in establishing the sisters of St Joseph de Cluny in the town. When the sisters were recalled to France Fr James was again successful in securing the services of the Sisters of the Good Samaritan and a new convent was built. The Catholic School at Yambuk

The Catholic School at Yambuk owes it existence to Father O'Regan who met its equipment and a great portion of he teachers' salary from his own private means.

It is said that nowhere will he be held in more abiding and grateful remembrance than at the hospital where his cheery presence was always most warmly welcomed. When he became ill he travelled to Melbourne for treatment but soon returned to Port Fairy and received the visits of his parishioners. Upon his death he lay in state in St Patrick's church until his requiem and burial at the Port Fairy Cemetery. Over 600 people attended his Requiem Mass and funeral.
