Afghan Catholic released from detention

After eight months in detention, Afghan Catholic Mohammed Mahdi Rafee has been granted a bridging visa and allowed to return to his Adelaide home. Source: The Southern Cross.

His release on August 16 from the Kilburn immigration detention facility, where he had been detained since December 13 last year, was met with a collective sigh of relief from members of the Adelaide Cathedral parish.

As reported previously in The Southern Cross, Mr Rafee believed his life would be in danger if he was forced to return to Afghanistan following an unsuccessful request for a ministerial intervention into his application for a visa.

Of Hazara origin, the former Shiite Muslim was baptised a Catholic in 2017 after completing the Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults program in the Cathedral parish. He said his changed religious beliefs would have placed him in real danger of persecution at the hands of the Taliban and Islamic State.

During his detention, many in the parish wrote to then immigration minister Peter Dutton and MPs expressing their grave fears for Mr Rafee's safety if he was forced to return to his homeland.

Coordinating the push for Mr Rafee to be able to re-apply for a visa was Br Martyn Paxton, who said he was relieved that Mr Rafee's detention was finally over.

"We sat and had a glass of tea together today and he spoke of how grateful he was to all those who have supported him with letters to the minister or other politicians, and to those parishioners who have visited him," Br Martyn said.

"I am grateful especially to the many Religious brothers and sisters who have been a key element in our campaign and to the stalwarts of the Catholic Women's League."

Mr Rafee's bridging visa is for six months.

We pray for the many refugees so badly treated by then Australian Government.

SCRIPTURE REFLECTION:

Many religious leaders have thought that some foods or some people are such a threat to the holiness of their followers that contact with 'unclean', 'defiling' foods or people must be avoided. Our Lord was totally opposed to the idea that holiness was something secured or gained by being quarantined or separated from any-thing or any-person.

On the contrary, he could touch a leper or have a meal with a prostitute. Rather than defilement flowing from the leper or prostitute to Jesus, his life flowed into them repairing their broken humanity, healing them bodymindspirit, holistically, making them holy.

The fact is that God, embodied in Jesus Christ, is contagious. The contagion of Divine Life is meant to flow into the inner depths of personality, into the heart. When this occurs, the Divine Life in the human person causes 'holiness'.

We have to strive to put ourselves in the way of this contagion. We become holy when we allow ourselves to be touched by our Lord Jesus Christ. How do we do this?

By hearing of His life in the Gospel, by being nourished by His life in Holy Communion, by being touched by the plight of those in whom He is to be found. St James in the second reading describes some who are particularly vulnerable in a patriarchal society with no social security system: the widows and orphans. No doubt, we can identify equivalent groups in our own society and overseas.

We could take a moment to pray that we might be more conscious of the Holy Spirit germinating something in our hearts, making us holy from the inside out, that our holiness be authenticated by good works so that we may be holy as the Lord our God is holy.

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
