NEWS:

A MAN WITH KNIFE AND BOMB ATTACKS INDONESIAN PRIEST DURING SERVICE.

A man wielding a knife and axe, and carrying home-made explosives, attacked an Indonesian



priest during a service yesterday in Sumatra, causing minor injuries before being subdued by parishioners, reports The Australian. Police told local media that the man was carrying items marked with an Islamic State insignia, The Washington Post reported.

Indonesian national police spokesman Agus Rianto told The Australian the attack happened at 8.30am as Father Pandiangan held Mass.

They said the 18-year-old had disguised himself as a member of the congregation of St Joseph's Catholic Church in Medan but leaped up to attack Father Albert Pandiangan midway through the service after a home-made pipe bomb in his backpack detonated without -exploding.

"The priest was cut on his left arm," Brigadier General Rianto said. "Churchgoers stopped [the attacker] from doing more harm and pinned him to the ground.

"The churchgoers noticed that the man had left his bag and that smoke was coming out of his backpack. There was a loud bang, like the sound of a firecracker; however, no one was hurt."

Police say they found a pipe connected to a few wires inside his bag, which eyewitnesses said detonated with a bang similar to that of a fire-cracker, emitting a small amount of smoke and sparks during the service but causing no damage.

Similar pipes, which police said they believed to have contained explosives, were also found in the churchyard and inside a gutter in front of the church.

General Rianto said police had recovered an identity card for an 18-year-old Muslim man named Ivan Armadi Hasugian, with police later confirming that as the name of the suspect.

A spokeswoman for the local Medan police, Rina Sari Ginting, said they were treating the incident as a "terrorism attack" and had found wires in his house identical to those used in his homemade bombs. "We are still interrogating him," Ms Ginting said.

SCRIPTURE REFLECTION

The wisdom tradition from which the first reading is taken is rooted in the fact that life is a series of choices. The epistle and the gospel reading provide us with examples of the way Christians should choose. Finally, the psalm's description of the fleeting nature of life sets the context and tone of our decision-making.

Discipleship demands that, in the face of all the choices available to us, we keep our priorities straight. In the gospel. Jesus insists that we must be single minded. We must cling to the one thing necessary, and that one thing is authentic discipleship. In choosing Jesus, we choose other things as well. We choose new relationships with the very people to whom we have already been committed. Those who were slaves, or lower class, or employees, or providers of service are now regarded as sisters and brothers in Christ. In choosing Jesus, we also choose the cross. We choose to live in a way that calls us to travel the high road: to forgive offences committed against us; to live simply so that others can simply live; to take responsibility for the moral character of society.

The fleeting nature of life as characterised in the psalm forces us to look at the meaning of life. When the day dawns for us to return to dust, what will we have gained from life? The realisation of our finiteness and the transitory nature of life should help us to set our priorities right and should give us the courage to remain faithful to them.
