- "Formation" e.g. How might we better form leaders for mission – adults, children and families, couples and single people?
- "Structures" e.g. How might parishes better become local centres for the formation and animation of missionary disciples?
- "Governance" e.g. How might the People of God, lay and ordained, women and men, approach governance in the spirit of synodality and co-responsibility for more effective proclamation of the Gospel?
- "Institutions" e.g. How might we better see the future of Catholic social services, education, health and aged care?

# **GPBS Weekly Parables:**

# Poor in the World, Rich in Faith

A young man got up to speak at the local Newman Community Centre last week. At first, I thought he was speaking a language unknown to me; then gradually I realised he was speaking my language. But his ability to make himself understood was nearly strangled by an impediment that made him repeat himself in a loop, over and over, until he could complete a single sentence. I felt sad and frustrated for him. When he finished speaking, an attractive young woman translated his message for him, emphasising his main points. And the crowd of adolescent students cheered his name, over and over. I realised that this young man, though impaired, was practically a cult figure among his peers. They knew him, liked him, accepted him. Though his tongue was bound, his spirit was free. Many of us labour under impediments to love that seem insurmountable. They may be physical, mental, or spiritual in nature, grounded in past injury or present dysfunction. However impossible it seems that we may be freed from what holds us bound, the appearance is deceiving. Jesus cured a deaf mute with his spit. He holds the power to open hearts too. What part of your life is closed and bound? Embrace downward mobility in the world, upward mobility in the Kingdom. Find ways to share what you have with the materially and spiritually poor. Isn't it clear by now that God operates quite differently?

# The Commissioning

"Go from here as those who will widen their horizons.

We will not be bound by habitual thoughts and actions. We will listen for different voices. We will reflect on new approaches. We will try opening our hearts to other things. We will rejoice in unexpected experiences of justice. We will accept fresh leading of the Spirit. The God of Love will be your companion. We have nothing to fear."

# First Reading: Isaiah 35:4-7

Say to all faint hearts, 'Courage! Do not be afraid. 'Look, your God is coming, vengeance is coming, the retribution of God; he is coming to save you.' Then the eyes of the blind shall be opened, the ears of the deaf unsealed, then the lame shall leap like a deer and the tongues of the dumb sing for joy; for water gushes in the desert, streams in the wasteland, the scorched earth becomes a lake, the parched land springs of water.

# Responsorial Psalm: Ps 145:7-10

# Second Reading: James 2:1-5

My brothers, do not try to combine faith in Jesus Christ, our glorified Lord, with the making of distinctions between classes of people. Now suppose a man comes into your synagogue, beautifully dressed and with a gold ring on, and at the same time a poor man comes

in, in shabby clothes, and you take notice of the well-dressed man, and say, 'Come this way to the best seats;' then you tell the poor man, 'Stand over there' or 'You can sit on the floor by my foot-rest.' Can't you see that you have used two different standards in your mind, and turned yourselves into judges, and corrupt judges at that? Listen, my dear brothers: it was those who are poor according to the world that God chose, to be rich in faith and to be the heirs to the kingdom which he promised to those who love him.

# Gospel Acclamation: Matthew 4:23

Alleluia, alleluia! Jesus preached the Good News of the kingdom and healed all who were sick. Alleluia!

# Gospel: Mark 7:31-37

Returning from the district of Tyre, Jesus went by way of Sidon towards the Sea of Galilee, right through the Decapolis region. And they brought him a deaf man who had an impediment in his speech; and they asked him to lay his hand on him. He took him aside in private, away from the crowd, put his fingers into the man's ears and touched his tongue with spittle. Then looking up to heaven he sighed; and he said to him, 'Ephphatha,' that is, 'Be opened.' And his ears were opened, and the ligament of his tongue was loosened and he spoke clearly. And Jesus ordered them to tell no one about it, but the more he insisted, the more widely they published it. Their admiration was unbounded. 'He has done all things well,' they said 'he makes the deaf hear and the dumb speak.'

# Gospel Reflection from Loyola Press: (SunBOrd23)

Today we continue to hear the Gospel of Mark proclaimed. In today's reading, Jesus heals a man who was deaf and had a speech impediment. This is a story about Jesus' healing power, and in it we find clues about our understanding of sacrament. We are struck by the physical means used to heal the man, the use of spittle and touch. The Church continues to celebrate the sacraments using physical means. In the Sacrament of Baptism, water and oil are used to show the power of the Holy Spirit. In the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick, we are anointed with holy oil on the forehead and the hands. In the Eucharist, bread and wine become the Body and Blood of Christ. We are a sacramental people who believe that God's grace is given to us through these physical signs. Some, however, see in this Gospel an image of the proclamation of the good news of Jesus to the Gentiles. The geographic references tell us that Jesus is journeying through Gentile territory. Jesus had previously visited this region and healed a person possessed by a demon. Jesus was already famous there,

which explains why people brought the deaf man to him. The story that precedes this reading in Mark's Gospel sets the stage. Jesus encounters a Gentile, a Syrophoenician woman who asks him to heal her demon-possessed daughter. Jesus engages her in a dialogue about not feeding to dogs the food intended for children. Jesus is struck by the woman's great faith when she replies that even dogs eat the food that falls from the table, and he heals her daughter immediately. The faith of this Greek woman compels Jesus to respond to her plea. Mark shows that Jesus' own mission affirms the early Church's mission to the Gentiles. This was a significant issue to the early Christian community, which found that the good news of Jesus took root and spread quickly among the Gentiles. Yet there is an irony in the story of healing that Mark tells. Jesus gives the man the gift of speech, but then tells him not to use it. Jesus asks that the news of his healing power, which is evidence of his identity as the Messiah, not be spread. This is a recurring motif in Mark's Gospel and is sometimes called the "messianic secret."

**Making Connections**: In this gospel, physical deafness could be seen as a symbol of being closed off from the world around us. Are there voices you do not hear, or do not hear well enough, in your family or workplace; in our nation or our world? Are we always attentive enough to those who have something to say to us?

**Symbols & Images**: Jesus could have healed this man with words alone but he chose to use gestures as well. The actions are a sign of what is taking place. Ritual gestures continue to be a rich means of communication in the Church.

**Vocational View**: Has God not chosen the poor of the world to inherit the kingdom, to be rich in faith? Take heart, be not afraid, consider your part in God's Kingdom.

Living the Word: Pray for openness to the word and action of God in your life.

**Marriage Tip:** Psychologically, negative messages are more powerful than positive ones. If you've been hard on yourself lately, list three things you did well today - to help bring back some personal positivity and inner hope.

**Daily Prayer**: O strong and faithful God, open our eyes to your presence everywhere. Unstop our ears to hear the challenge of your word. Loose our tongues in songs of praise and fearless witness to your justice.
