HUMOUR:

When he finished and sat down, the chair of the stewardship committee leaned over and said: "Wonderful story! I dare you to do it again!"

NEWS:

Catholic students have been attacked by samesex marriage protesters at the University of Sydney after trying to engage students, one-onone, about why it was "ok to vote 'No", The Catholic Weekly reports.

Police yesterday had to restrain a protester who lunged at Catholic Chaplaincies team leader Tony Mattar in an attempt to tackle him to the ground.

Mr Mattar, a Lebanese Australian, was also smeared with hummus and condoms, while another Catholic was kicked in the shins as he resisted repeated attempts to steal his No vote sign.

Both men were among 15 people who manned an "It's ok to vote No" stall that was encircled by protesters around 12pm yesterday.

Mr Mattar was not injured during the fracas and managed to keep his composure throughout the three hour pro-same sex marriage protest.

"Today there was no possibility of dialogue; they didn't allow us to," Mr Mattar told The Catholic Weekly. "They overpowered us, so I thought I'm not going to stand down. I'm going to stand peacefully and bear witness."

Mainstream media reported that the Catholic Society was holding a rally, and that the protesters were in their hundreds – there were around 50.

Catholic Society volunteers spoke to many students, one-on-one, without incident before the protestors arrived with sound equipment. Chants of "bigots" were peppered with derogatory references.

Mr Mattar was also doused in a substance, containing glitter, which was poured on his head and down the back of his shirt.

Catholic Society member and President of the Australian Catholic Students Association, Madeline Gilbert, witnessed around an hour and a half of the protest. She said the intimidatory tactics were commonplace on campus, and that she was unsurprised by the events.

Police confirmed to The Catholic Weekly that they had been called to Camperdown at around 12.30 after reports of an altercation. No arrests were made.

IT IS SAD THAT THIS HAS BECOME A VERY "ONE SIDED DEBATE". The yes voters have become somewhat militant, and any one having an opposing view is subject to attack—physical and emotional.

SCRIPTURE REFLECTION:

A distinctive feature of the teachings of Jesus is his exhortation to forgive. Very explicit about this, Jesus left us his own example by forgiving his executioners while he hung dying on the cross. Until recently we thought that forgiveness begins with the offender repenting of the offence and then asking for pardon. Today many maintain that reconciliation must begin with the one offended offering forgiveness. This willingness to forgive transforms a victim into a survivor. Such magnanimity might then touch the heart of the offender, who may thus be transformed from being an offender to becoming a friend.

If God has been so generous in forgiving us, surely we should be generous in forgiving others. The process of becoming a forgiving person takes time. For some, it may take a lifetime. Only little by little are our pettiness and indignation reduced and our desire to strike back diminished. Still, as disciples, we are expected to give the forgiveness that we have been given.

Such forgiveness does not provide an easy way out for offenders, for ultimately justice will prevail. If we remain untransformed by God's forgiveness of us, we will be liable to judgment. Our unwillingness to forgive can eat away at us, and we can carry hurts from childhood far into adult years. Forgiving others, as difficult as that may be, is in the long run much easier than bearing the weight of resentfulness, vindictiveness and unresolved frustration. When we forgive we truly beain to be healed.

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
