FRANCIS: TERESA ALWAYS A MOTHER - AND NOW A SAINT

September 5, 2016



Pope Francis has declared Mother Teresa a saint, honouring the nun who cared for the world's most destitute, and put his words into action after the ceremony by giving lunch to 1500 of Italy's poor in the Vatican, according to AP and The Tablet.

Applause erupted in St Peter's Square even before Francis finished pronouncing the rite of canonisation at the start of the Mass.

In his homily, Pope Francis praised Mother Teresa as the merciful saint who defended the lives of the unborn, sick, and abandoned — and who shamed world leaders for the "crimes of poverty

they themselves created."

Pope Francis held Mother Teresa up as a model for today's Christians during his homily for the nun who cared for the "poorest of the poor."

Speaking from the steps of St Peter's Basilica, Francis said the saint spent her life "bowing down before those who were spent, left to die on the side of the road, seeing in them their God-given dignity."

He added: "She made her voice heard before the powers of the world, so that they might recognise their guilt for the crimes of poverty they themselves created."

As if to emphasise the point, Francis repeated the words "crimes of poverty they themselves created."

In an unscripted remark, the Pope said that for some it would be be difficult to refer to her as "St Teresa" and that she will still be referred to as "Mother Teresa" by many people. "We'll keep on calling her Mother," he said.

Tens of thousands of pilgrims filled the square for the canonisation.

Some 100,000 tickets were issued for the Mass and the crowd included nuns, priests, volunteers, pilgrims, and tourists.

Hundreds of Missionaries of Charity Sisters in their trademark blue-trimmed saris had frontrow seats at the Mass, while one group of 40 Indian nationals travelled from Macerata, Italy, to honour a woman given India's highest civilian and humanitarian awards for her work in the slums of Calcutta. Another group of 100 drove from Kosovo holding up a banner that read: "Mother Teresa: Pray for Us."

In addition, 13 heads of state and governmentled official delegations attended while 1500 homeless people invited by Pope Francis had VIP seats and were later treated by to a Neapolitan pizza lunch in the Vatican auditorium.

SCRIPTURE REFLECTION

The God who spoke to Moses is pained by the depravity of the people yet moved to show them mercy. Who could ever have imagined such a God? The God depicted in the gospel actually searches for what is lost. He seems to abandon the safe ones for the sake of the one who has strayed. She goes to great lengths to find one coin. As a spurned yet loving father, God patiently waits until we come to our senses. Who could ever have conceived of such a God?

Our God seems consumed with an insatiable desire to reestablish a relationship with us after we have turned our backs on God, have chosen to commit our loyalties elsewhere, have thoughtlessly wandered off into danger that threatens our well being, not God's. What is it about us that makes us so desirable? The answer has less to do with us than with the magnanimous character of God. It is almost as if unconditional love is not simply a characteristic of God, but God's very essence and no human frailty or depravity can change this.

Paul insists that it is through Christ that all of this is accomplished. It is through the sacrifice of Christ that the deprayed are forgiven, that sinners are saved, that the lost are found. It is through Christ that we are sought by God, and Christ is the very gift of mercy, the forgiveness of our sins, the celebration of our return.

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
