POPE TO FOCUS ON PRISONERS, HOMEL ESS FOR END OF HOLY YEAR

Francis will devote special events in the last few months of the Year of Mercy to jubilee celebrations with prisoners and the homeless, sandwiched in between trips to Georgia, Azerbaijan, and Sweden, reports Crux.

According to his recently released schedule, in the next three months Pope Francis will travel to Georgia and Azerbaijan from September 30-October 2, and then to Sweden from October 31-November 1, to mark the 500 anniversary of the Reformation.

As is well known, however, if he sees fit the Argentine Pope might add a day trip to a place close to his heart, as he did earlier this year, with a visit to the Greek island of Lesbos, to bring the world's attention to the European refugee crisis.

One such "unscheduled" trip could be to the Italian town of Amatrice, recently hit by a devastating earthquake that left close to 300 people dead. During his weekly Angelus prayer after the quake, the Pontiff expressed his desire to go.

Francis will also preside over several Masses in Rome for the Jubilee of Mercy, and even though all the major events were carefully chosen by the Pontiff, some could argue he's leaving the ones closest to his heart for last.

On November 6, for instance, he will celebrate a Mass for prisoners and, a week later, with the homeless.

SCRIPTURE REFLECTION

We are creatures of this world. We are made of it and we are totally dependent upon it for our very existence. We require its air, its water, its food, its heat. We need it for covering and for shelter; we need it to stimulate our minds and our spirits. Therefore, our use of its phenomenal resources cannot in itself be immoral. What is questionable is the character of our use.

There are many circumstances that contribute to the complexity of these matters. The merchant in the passage from Amos is not faulted because he was prosperous. Nor is the steward in the gospel criticised for putting resources aside for future use. But how much does a person need when there are others who are really needy?

We live our lives on the horns of a dilemma. We have the right to use and to enjoy the marvels of our world, but we cannot do this free of responsibility to each other and to the world itself. We are not called to disown the world. It is impossible for us to do that, because of our total dependence upon it. But we are called to live in it gently, using what we need and sharing what we can. We must make decisions as trustworthy stewards of the household of God, not like the man in the gospel who was only concerned with his own well being. We must serve God, not mammon.

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
