29th Sunday in Ordinary Time / Year C 19th & 20th October 2019

Today's gospel begins with a reference to prayer, a favourite theme in Luke, and ends with a question about faith. If the parable were also about prayer, as the narrator suggests, then the unjust judge would image a God who has no respect for anyone and is slow to hear the cry of the poor! There are clearly problems with this, and scholars are divided on how to explain it. The most likely explanation is that, in the editorial process, the gospel writer has made three key additions to the story: the introductory statement that Jesus told them a parable "about the need to pray always"; the final instruction to pay attention to the judge's words; and the three questions at the end. The original parable was almost certainly told in another context and probably ended with the words of the judge. What difference might this make for us as century readers? The parable has acquired different meanings as it shifted from an oral to a written context. The Lukan author fits the parable rather awkwardly to the issues he wants to address with his communities.

The scene for the verses representing the original parable is "a certain city", possibly suggesting that it is a story for any and every city. There are two main human characters, the judge and the widow. There is another non-speaking character in the wings, namely the widow's opponent. The hearer or reader is invited to fill the gaps. Who is this opponent? What sort of injustice is the widow experiencing? Since the judge clearly recognises the validity of the widow's claim, why does he refuse to hear her plea? Is it because he is accepting bribes from the woman's adversary? What sort of judge would admit to having no respect for anyone, even to himself?

A vital clue to understanding the parable lies in the translation of the final words of the judge. It literally reads: "so that she won't finish up giving me a black eye". Translators have consistently softened the impact of this with a metaphorical reading. Is Jesus drawing attention to the plight of widows in that society who can only get justice from a corrupt judiciary if they resort to violence? The widow in this story is one feisty woman: without the support of a husband or the benefit of social security payments, she has only her own personal resources to rely upon. The judge operates from the assumption that she is prepared to use her fists. A system that provides no other recourse for the vulnerable of the human community and for those endeavouring to save our endangered planet simply has to change. Jesus tells his hearers to pay attention to what the "unjust judge" has to say. It is not at all clear what the reader is meant to take from this story. One possibility is that those who seem

to have little power can win out in the end if they have the courage persist in their struggles for justice.





SHANE MACKINLAY (PRIEST OF THE BALLARAT DIOCESE) ORDAINED BISHOP OF SANDHURST

Bishop Shane Mackinlay, the eighth Bishop of Sandhurst, was ordained to the episcopacy in Bendigo's Sacred Heart Cathedral yesterday.

Melbourne Archbishop Peter A. Comensoli was the principal consecrator, joined by Bishop Leslie Tomlinson, Bishop Emeritus of Sandhurst, and Ballarat Bishop Paul Bird CSsR as co-consecrators. More than 30 Bishops and 300 clergy were present at the ordination, including the Papal Nuncio to Australia, Archbishop Tito Adolfo Ylana, and Australian Catholic Bishops Conference president Archbishop Mark Coleridge.

Dignitaries, family, friends and parishioners numbered close to 2000 people, including those from as far as Ballarat, Echuca, Shepparton, Wangaratta and Wodonga. Bishop Mackinlay's brother, Jason, made the journey from Germany, while Victoria Jarvis, who was at the new bishop's ordination to the priesthood in Ballarat, drove nearly seven hours from Adelaide for the occasion.

The spiritual unity of the Church and the mission of bishops as Good Shepherds and successors to the Apostles was elucidated in Archbishop Comensoli's homily, drawing on musical imagery.

"It is for all of us – bishops, priests, deacons, religious and lay faithful – to join in the singing of Christ into this time and place. Yet, as Paul goes on to note, we each have a particular voice with which to proclaim the song of Jesus Christ," Archbishop Comensoli said.

"So, to a few, the apostolic voice is given as a definitive character. Bishops are those among us to whom the song of Christ's life takes on that particular shape and sound belonging to the Shepherd.

"The Christian songline the bishop sings is not something he makes up, but a pathway he himself has received to lay out for others to follow.

"Fidelity, therefore, is his chief task in singing it: fidelity to what he has received and fidelity in passing it on," he said. Bishop Mackinlay acknowledged the difficulty of being Catholic and building up the reign of God in contemporary Australia

"These are challenging times in which to do this, with many people feeling deeply hurt and disillusioned by the Church," he said.

"I take those challenges very seriously; responding to them must be integral to whatever we do.

"We can only be faithful to this by placing our trust in God, sharing our gifts generously with those around us, and valuing and celebrating the riches that are brought by each member of our community."

CANONISATION OF JOHN HENRY NEWMAN

Canonisations have less to do with rewarding the dead than with encouraging the living. The canonisation of John Henry Newman is an occasion for celebration particularly in educational institutions.



Many schools, university colleges and student associations have been named after him. Newman was an exceptional scholar who joined in public conversation and controversies about faith as well as leading a Catholic university in Ireland. The depth and breadth of Newman's faith and the way in which his faith and public life were woven together are exemplary for any Catholic educational institution.

Catholics with an interest in theology will also celebrate Newman's canonisation, perhaps for differing reasons. Some will find encouragement in the breadth of his faith and his insistence on the primacy of conscience. Others will be reassured by his insistence on the authority of Scripture and of Church Councils in Catholic reflection on faith. He held together strands of living faith that are often opposed to one another in uninformed Catholic debate.

Newman was a man who crossed boundaries of temperament and culture. He was a deeply private man who engaged fully in public life. He lived his faith in contact with the secularising trends that shaped politics and religious faith. He lost his faith at school after reading contemporary philosophical writing and returned to it through his contact with Evangelical teachers. He had to deal with liberal ideas about faith and the place of church in society in the debates that marked the Anglican Church in the first half of the nineteenth century. In his reading during these debates he refined his understanding that continuity with the Christian tradition was represented in the Catholic Church. When he became a Catholic he had to deal with the experience of exile in the culture and ethos of the Britain in which he was raised and the narrowness he often found in the Church to which he came.

Newman's writing and preaching, however, transcended the differences between church denominations and groups within them. His wide reading, scholarship and respect for the finding of right words meant that he wrote for the heart as well as for the head. The gift of finding good words is often treated as a decoration on the hard reasoning involved when we think and speak of faith. Newman stands as a reproach to that view. The rhythms, images and music of his words opened the hearts of his readers and hearers to attend to his argument, and carried them through the complexities of the reality that he unfolded. His famous sermon on the Second Spring of Catholicism in Great Britain encouraged an emboldened a small community to look beyond their poverty of resources to the great tradition that they represented. His care with words, too, was a reproach to simplistic, partisan, populist and polemical representations of Catholic life.

In addition at a time when debate often incited people to adopt simple and narrow positions without depth, his vision of faith was always organic. Like trees, it had deep roots and spreading branches, with all its parts related to and dependent on one another. He consistently commended the organic connections within the faith of the early church and with other churches, and argued against the simple slogans and alternatives offered both within and outside the Catholic Church. For him the health of the foliage and the depth of the roots were crucial in a healthy faith. As any saint should, John Henry Newman continues to challenge and encourage us in our very different age.
