



Making Connections: At first reading, we may be tempted to think that Jesus is separating religious behaviour from political or economic behaviour. While Jesus gives due weight to civic and political duties, his instruction to 'Give to God what is God's' tells us that no aspect of human life or activity can be considered apart from God.

Points of Catholic interest. The Herodians are mentioned only three times in the New Testament as a group within Jewish society (Mk 3:6; Mk 12:13; Mt 22:16). They are aligned with the Pharisees trying to entrap Jesus. They were supporters on the rule and of Herod Antipas, son of Herod the Great, ruler of Galilee during Jesus' lifetime. **Marriage Tip**: Parents, don't get too busy caring, that you forget the love that brought your child into being.

Daily Prayer: You alone, O God, are Lord, and there is no other. Formed in your image, we bear the imprint of your face and your Name is engraved on our hearts. In a world loyal to other powers, let our lifestyle be governed by the standard of the gospel. As we render to others the freedom of conscience that is their right, we may freely render to you the allegiance you alone deserve.

A Vocation View: We do not choose a vocation completely on our own. We must prayerfully reflect on how we can best give to God what is God's, and then live as though everything depends on God. Take fresh courage (MMcK 1877). Keep us participating in the gospel for the good of all and serving with Christ. Holy Spirit strengthen us.

Pope Francis says that we are asked to be personally willing to be sent, because he himself is Love, love that is always "on mission", always reaching out in order to give life.





First Reading: Isaiah 45:1, 4-6

Thus says the Lord to his anointed, to Cyrus, whom he has taken by his right hand to subdue nations before him and strip the loins of kings, to force gateways before him that their gates be closed no more: It is for the sake of my servant Jacob, of Israel my chosen one, that I have called you by your name, conferring a title though you do not know me. I am the Lord, unrivalled; there is no other God besides me. Though you do not know me, I arm you that men may know from the rising to the setting of the sun that, apart from me, all is nothing.

Responsorial Psalm: Ps 95:1, 3-5, 7-10

Give the Lord glory and honour.

O sing a new song to the Lord, sing to the Lord all the earth. Tell among the nations his glory and his wonders among all the peoples. The Lord is great and worthy of praise, to be feared above all gods; the gods of the heathens are naught. It was the Lord who made the heavens. Give the Lord, you families of peoples, give the Lord glory and power, give the Lord the glory of his name. Bring an offering and enter his courts. Worship the Lord in his temple, O earth, tremble before him. Proclaim to the nations: 'God is king,' He will judge the peoples in fairness.

Second Reading: 1 Thessalonians 1:1-5

Gospel Reflection: SunAOrd29 Veronica Lawson rsm:

The emergence of a common enemy is often the catalyst for sworn enemies to unite. In first century Palestine, Pharisees were the religious teachers of the law, Herodians represented secular Jewish power and wealth. They despised each other on both religious and political grounds. When faced with a perceived threat to their authority, they united in opposition to Jesus of Nazareth who becomes the threat that unites them. His teaching and healing draw the crowds and threaten their authority. They come together and try to set a trap for him. In attempting to set him up, they ironically pay him the greatest of tributes: addressing him as "teacher", they acknowledge his sincerity and admit that he teaches the way of God in accordance with the truth. They witness to his lack of concern with status and hierarchical division. The question of these traditional enemies is intended to put Jesus in a "no win" position: "Is it lawful to pay tribute to the emperor or not?" Jesus turns the question back upon them. He lets them know that he is aware of their malicious intent and asks them to produce the coin used for the tax. He thus makes the issue one of images, a sensitive issue for all Jews, rather than of tribute. The Roman denarius that they produce bears the bust of the Roman emperor and the Latin inscription, "Tiberius

When the Pharisees heard that Jesus had silenced the
Sadducees they got together and, to disconcert him, one of
them put a question, 'Master, which is the greatest
commandment of the Law?' Jesus said, 'You must love the
Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with
all your mind. This is the greatest and the first
commandment. The second resembles it: You must love your
neighbour as yourself. On these two commandments hang
the whole Law, and the Prophets also.'

Loving God, Help us to focus on what we have, not on what is removed or changed. Strengthen us when we feel discouraged or overwhelmed. Embrace us so that we know your loving presence within us and among us. Walk with us as we bring your love, and carry your light, into our world.

We wish the Horsham Cup our best wishes today without people present.

From Paul, Silvanus and Timothy, to the Church in Thessalonika which is in God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ; wishing you grace and peace from God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. We always mention you in our prayers and thank God for you all, and constantly remember before God our Father how you have shown your faith in action, worked for love and persevered through hope, in our Lord Jesus Christ. We know, brothers, that God loves you and that you have been chosen, because when we brought the Good News to you, it came to you not only as words, but as power and as the Holy Spirit and as utter conviction.

Gospel Acclamation: Philippians 2:15-16

Alleluia, alleluia! Shine on the world like bright stars; you are offering it the word of life. Alleluia!

Gospel: Matthew 22:15-21

The Pharisees went away to work out between them how to trap Jesus in what he said. And they sent their disciples to him, together with the Herodians, to say, 'Master, we know that you are an honest man and teach the way of God in an honest way, and that you are not afraid of anyone, because a man's rank means nothing to you. Tell us your opinion then. Is it permissible to pay taxes to Caesar or not?' But Jesus was aware of their malice and replied, 'You hypocrites! Why do you set this trap for me? Let me see the money you pay the tax with.' They handed him a denarius, and he replied, 'Whose head is this? Whose name?' 'Caesar's,' they replied. He then said to them, 'Very well, give back to Caesar what belongs to Caesar - and to God what belongs to God.'

Caesar, son of the divine Augustus, High Priest'. Jesus' response, "Give to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God", can be interpreted in several ways. Is Jesus simply exposing their hypocrisy as bearers of images? From a Jewish perspective, everything belongs to God, the earth and all its riches, Pharisees and the Herodians are Jews, even if the sympathies of the latter lean towards the Roman occupiers. Is he telling them to pay the tax while still recognising God's prior claim? Is he telling them not to pay the tax precisely because the emperor has no claim on what belongs to God? Is he critiquing the Roman occupation or legitimizing it? Or is he saying something else? They are left to interpret his response as they wish. One thing is clear: Jesus' words have nothing to do with the modern distinction between Church and secular state. There are good reasons for paying taxes in a secular state and for contributing financially to the life of the Church, something we may need to revisit in the light of pandemic and the closing of our places of worship. It is anachronistic to invoke this text in support of paying state taxes or of supporting the Church financially. The story is more about sincerity, truth in our relationships with each other and with the God of all truth. That is the key criterion for any personal or global alliance.
