

ASIA BIBI'S DEATH SENTENCE OVERTURNED **PUBLISHED: 01 NOVEMBER 2018**



Asia Bibi, the Catholic woman condemned to death under Pakistan's blasphemy laws, has had her conviction overturned by the Supreme Court in Pakistan. Source: The Tablet.

The court in the capital, Islamabad, came to a decision on Ms Bibi's case on Monday, 8 October, but only announced the judgment yesterday. She was told by the judge she was free to go immediately.

Ms Bibi herself responded from prison in Lahore: "I can't believe what I am hearing, will I go out now? Will they let me out, really?" She was speaking to a journal-

John Pontifex of Aid to the Church in Need (UK), said: "I spoke [yesterday] to Asia's daughter, Eisham, who is just 18, and she was so happy; it was almost as if she was crying tears of joy down the phone."

He told The Tablet: "We have to salute the courage of the justices in reaching this decision in the face of huge opposition from powerful extremist mobs. This really is a victory for justice, a triumph of honesty and truth over tyranny and oppression."

"For so many thousands of people who have prayed for Asia, this is a long-awaited day. We need to continue praying because now is the most delicate time. So many extremists want her dead and as the process towards her release gets under way, security concerns will be acute. Her family – indeed everyone associated with her – is in danger."

In 2009 Bibi, who worked as a farmhand in Pakistan, was charged with blasphemy against Islam after she brought water from a well reserved for Muslims to a co -worker, who said Bibi had rendered the well "impure" because she was a Christian.

She was sentenced to death in 2010 during a trial at which the Muslim co-worker and her sister were the only direct witnesses.

The judgment of the three-man bench was read out by Chief Justice Sagib Nisarm.

It quotes the Prophet Muhammed: "Beware! Whoever is cruel and hard on a non-Muslim minority, or curtails their rights, or burdens them with more than they can bear, or takes anything from them against their free will; I, Prophet Muhammed, will complain against the person on the day of judgment."
