31st Sunday in Ordinary Time / Year C 2nd & 3rd November 2019

In 2015, a little book came my way and proceeded to turn my world upside down. The author of that book was German forester Peter Wohlleben, its title *The Hidden Life of Trees: What They Feel, How They Communicate—Discoveries from a Secret World.* I have long mourned the destruction of trees, local and global, including the threatened trees of the Amazon. I grew up loving, valuing and sometimes climbing the trees of the Macedon Ranges. I now live among the trees on the outskirts of Ballarat. Wohlleben's book brought home to me how much I had still to learn about these precious gifts of life and love.

Luke's story of the toll-collector Zacchaeus provides me with yet another opportunity to give thanks for the wonder of trees, their intrinsic beauty and the life they sustain. A sycamore tree is at the heart of this story. Once I would have thought of this tree simply as one of the props in the human story that unfolds, providing as it does the platform for a height challenged would-be disciple of Jesus to "see". The human encounter with the holy is foregrounded in this story and is in no way to be discounted. But let us not relegate the tree to the status of prop. As I write this reflection, the Synod on the Amazon is underway in Rome and the tropical forests of northern Australia are threatened by fire. The planet cannot breathe without its trees. We might keep this in mind as we turn to the human elements in the story of Zacchaeus.

Zacchaeus is a wealthy man, a chief tax collector, possibly responsible for overseeing the activities of other tax collectors. He wants to see what Jesus is like and he lets nothing get in the way. He runs ahead and climbs the sycamore tree. Jesus looks up and tells him to come down quickly, "for I must stay at your house today." Zacchaeus offers hospitality "joyfully". Hospitality, joy, haste to respond to divine visitation: these are constant themes in Luke.

"All those who see" complain that Jesus chooses to stay with a sinner, no doubt considering themselves more worthy hosts for God's prophet. There are clues in the text that Zacchaeus has already changed his ways, however. The future tense in translations ('I will pay') obscures this important element. He gives half his property to the destitute and, if he has cheated anyone, he pays them back four times the amount. Jesus looks at Zacchaeus and assures him that salvation has come to his house. He then acts to restore honour to Zacchaeus in the eyes of those who hold him and his kind in contempt. Zacchaeus is affirmed as a true descendant of his forbears in faith. Salvation for our house, our "common home", will only come with comparable attention to what we have despoiled.



Dialogue and Reconciliation in the Near East

Words make a difference. Pope Francis' intention for October asked for reconciliation in the Near East. Iraq, Iran, Saudi Arabia, Syria and Egypt are to the East of Rome, and are close to Italy. That is why they are referred to as the Near East. What happens there has an immediate impact on Europe in the form of people who flee from conflict and seek protection. These neighbouring nations, too, have left their mark on Europe through the movement of peoples, through wars and through all the connections made by trade, culture and religion. Europeans, too, have left their mark for better and for worse on the countries of their Near East.

For Australians these nations are not near. We are not immediately affected by what happens there. Although we send soldiers and arms to support military adventures there, their wars are not our wars. When Pope Francis invites us to allow the people of the Middle East and their predicaments to touch us and to enter our prayers, he wants us to expand our minds and hearts to receive people and places distant from us.

The region has been riven by warfare in which local conflicts have been rocket fuelled by foreign powers including Australia. Extremist Muslim groups committed to unite the Arab world have launched offensives and met by counter armies. In these struggles, Sunni Muslims have been set again Shiite Muslims, and smaller religious groups such as Christians, Sufi Muslims and Mandaeans, have been persecuted and driven from their homes. Warfare has bred further hatred and misery and has displaced millions of people.

When seen against the scale of this intense conflict Pope Francis' prayer for a spirit of dialogue, encounter and reconciliation may seem Utopian. He urges us to pray for the seemingly unachievable. But those killed and displaced by conflict need the support of our prayers, as do the ordinary people who long for peace and reconciliation.

The Pope urges us to pray that people will share their life together. He evokes the Christian vision of society in which we are first of all human beings who depend on one another and whose happiness and prosperity are built by trusting and generous relationships. At the deepest level we are not defined by being Christians, Muslims or members of other religious and political groups to which we might belong, but by our membership of the human race. We are invited to live together and to make our differences a source of richness and of wonder, not of conflict. In the diverse world of Jesuit Social Services and those whom we serve this is central to our lives and work.

In reality there are many points of contact. In the Middle East where Christian and Muslim groups both take prayer seriously, the similarities between them can engender conflict or peace making. Churches and mosques have both often been destroyed out of hatred. Buildings that for one group of people are familiar places of nurture, of support and of encouragement are for other groups alien, fearsome and objectionable. They become symbols of division, not of coming together.

Prayer, however, can also help build bridges. The story of Abraham and respect for Jesus and Mary are shared by Jews, Christians and Muslims, as is generosity to the poor and stranger.

The path to healing and reconciliation must begin in praying for one another and for the healing of broken relationships. This can then lead people of different faiths talking together, taking an interest in how others pray and find encouragement in their own prayer. That is the beginning of a deeper sharing.

SYNODS A TOOL OF REFORM AND CONSENSUS

While synods may be Pope Francis' major tool for the reform of the Church, according to Sr Nathalie Becquart, he is also using them to gradually build consensus and preserve its unity.

Sr Nathalie was an auditor for last October's Synod of Bishops on Young People, Faith, and Vocational Discernment, and last May, the Pope named her, along with three other women, as consultors to the Synod's General Secretariat – marking a historic first for the Church.

While in Rome for the final days of the Synod on the Amazon, Sr Nathalie said she saw a strong link between the two synods. "During the synod on the youth, the main topic was a question of...the inculturation of the Gospel in the culture of the youth. And that was also the main topic for the Amazon people," she said.

Further, she said, inculturation necessitates another major aspect of synodality, which is vesting local churches with more decision-making power. "When you speak about inculturation, you speak about decentralisation and that's the main thing also for the reform of the Church nowadays," she added.

Sr Nathalie, who is a member of the Congregation of Xavières, was the first woman to serve as the Director of the National Service for Youth Evangelisation and Vocations in France, a post she completed just before arriving in Rome to participate in last year's synod.

She believes the Church is "now in the main stage for the reception of the synod, and it's a long process". "The synod of bishops is a tool of the reform of the Church. It's a school of conversion, transformation," she said.

She's convinced that synods are an effective means of moving the Church forward, even if cautiously – noting that the Pope has told the consultors to the General Secretariat that he is considering the topic of the next synod to be "synodality" itself.

"The Pope is very aware that his role is to work for communion in the Church," she said. "It's a question about an inclusive church and a synodal church rooted in the theology of the people of God."

RISING NUMBER OF OLDER HOMELESS 'A TIME BOMB'

There has been a 37 per cent increase in the number of older people using homelessness services since 2013, according to new research that has prompted calls for a boost to social housing investment. Source: *Pro Bono News*.

A report from the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare said 24,094 people over 55 needed homelessness services in 2018, with 11,963 people seeking support in Victoria alone.

Council to Homeless Persons chief executive Jenny Smith said homelessness among people over 55 was rising faster than any other age group. She said this highlighted that the country's older population were being locked out of the private rental market.

"The rise of homelessness for older people over the last five years is alarming and it's clear that more must be done to address this issue," Ms Smith said. "This problem isn't going away and in fact, it's getting worse."

Ms Smith said she was particularly concerned by the rise of homelessness in older women, which has increased 48 per cent in Victoria since 2013. She noted women were less visible in their homelessness, because they were less likely to be sleeping rough and were more likely to be sleeping in their car or couch surfing.

"This means that it's easier for them to go unnoticed," she said. "Governments have consistently ignored the fact that our rapidly ageing population, combined with the rising costs of rents, is creating a time bomb of older homelessness."

Housing and rental affordability has proven to be a key issue for older Australians, with ABS statistics showing a 42 per cent increase in people over 65 paying unaffordable rents in Australia since 2011.

Anglicare's 2019 Rental Affordability Snapshot found only 0.8 per cent of properties were suitable for a single person on the age pension, compared to 1.24 per cent of homes last year. Ms Smith said the federal government needed to take action on housing to reverse this trend.
