First Reading

1 Samuel 3:3-10.19

A reading from the first book of Samuel

3:3 Samuel was lying down in the temple of the Lord, where the ark of God was. 4 Then the Lord called, 'Samuel! Samuel!' and he said, 'Here I am!' 5 and ran to Eli, and said, 'Here I am, for you called me.' But he said, 'I did not call; lie down again.' So he went and lay down. 6 The Lord called again, 'Samuel!' Samuel got up and went to Eli, and said, 'Here I am, for you called me.' But he said, 'I did not call, my son; lie down again.' 7 Now Samuel did not yet know the Lord, and the word of the Lord had not yet been revealed to him. 8 The Lord called Samuel again, a third time. 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Parish Insurances 2024-2025.

A part of the process to tender our insurances for the 2024 – 2025 year, the Diocese is needing to establish some of the various types of buildings that each Parish has. This process of valuations is being coordinated by our new Diocesan Insurance Broker "Lockton Insurance".

Eight properties across the Diocese; (including All Saints Parish Church) have been selected by the insurance brokers for an independent valuation. The valuations are being conducted by Asset Valuation and Risk Consulting (AVR), Risktech and CIRK.

We hope to have the valuation reports completed by 9th February. There will be no cost to any parish for the valuations.

Please note, the valuation step is a critical part to our overall insurance renewal options for the whole diocese. Once completed our broker will be able to go to market for insurance quotes with a degree of confidence.

Gospel Reflection by Greg Sunter:

Jesus' invitation to 'Come and See' is a powerful image in this week's gospel. It is not a simple reply to the question of where Jesus is living; in some ways it is a summary of his whole ministry – come and see what I am on about and become part of it. It is typical of the invitational nature of Jesus' ministry. Throughout the gospels, Jesus offers and invites, he does not force his ministry onto anyone. When he invites us to 'Come and See' it is an invitation to 'give it a go'; take a chance; let go of what we know.

To 'Come and See' is exactly what Jesus invited the apostles to do. In this week's reading, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, takes up the invitation and becomes a follower of Jesus. He is so impressed with what he sees in Jesus that he finds his brother and tells him that they've found the Messiah and that Simon should come and join them. Jesus immediately gives Simon a new nickname: the Rock (Peter). There are many instances throughout the Bible of people taking or being given new names. Abram became Abraham; Jacob became Israel; Saul became Paul. This change of name is used as a sign that they have encountered God in a special way and have taken on a new life – a new commitment to God. In this instance, Simon is becoming a disciple of Jesus, a trusted and influential one at that.

Unlike the call of Samuel in today's first reading, in which the call to discipleship is heard as a booming voice, Andrew and Simon experience the call through personal encounter with Jesus. A booming voice from the sky might be helpful, but for most of us the call comes in much more subtle ways through our prayer and reflection on interaction with others.

Living the Gospel – Vocation

These days, the word 'vocation' seems to be applied to whatever job someone happens to find themselves in. More traditionally, the word carries with it a sense of undertaking work that has a deliberate purpose about it and that is outwardly focused. Usually, there is a sense that there is 'importance' to the work and that it is linked to God's dream for the world. The Church has tended to use vocation in reference to religious life. The word comes from the Latin, vocare, meaning call or name. Realising to what it is we are called can be one of the great challenges of life.

Have you thought? Why disciples?

Why did Jesus call a group of people to follow him closely and share in his ministry? Certainly, it was not uncommon at the time that a charismatic leader might attract a group of followers and 'hangers-on' but Jesus appears to have deliberately called some people to travel with him and share in what he was about. So much of what Jesus spoke about was living in right relationships: with God; and with one another. Rather than simply being a 'back-up group' for Jesus, the disciples provided a lived example of trying to live in right relationships. They didn't always get it right, but they were on the way.

From the perspective of ... The Disciples

We'd been following John the Baptiser for nearly a year. He was a great man doing great work. He had called us to repent and baptised us in the river. We were so impressed with him that we began to follow him. There'd been plenty of other healers and preachers to follow but John seemed to be something special – some had talked about him being the messiah! Then all of a sudden John pointed out Jesus and called him the lamb of God. There was something different about this man and it just seemed right to leave John behind and go with Jesus.

Questions for your personal reflection:

- 1. Why do you think John the Baptist's role in this episode is important?
- 2. What role do you think the disciples play throughout the gospels?
- 3. In what ways is it harder/easier to be a disciple today?
- 4. How can you also invite others to 'Come and See'?

Learning moments:

Compare John's gospel account of the first disciples with the call of the disciples in the three synoptic gospels. How might we explain the similarities and differences?
