COMMISSIONING MASSES

On Pentecost Sunday, the Parish will commission new and recommission existing liturgical ministers, including readers, extraordinary ministers of the Eucharist, PowerPoint operators, musicians, sacristans, and welcomers. Information on how to sign up to continue or start volunteering in one or more of these ministries, and what the tasks involve, will be provided over coming weeks. This week we share with you a brief summary of the role of extraordinary ministers of the Eucharist.

LAY MINISTER OF COMMUNION

In the early days of the church, sharing in the Eucharist was an important part of their liturgies, but the practice fell away over the centuries until it became rare for the people attending mass to receive communion. Pope Pius X was instrumental in returning the rite of receiving communion to be a central part of our celebration of mass, which was further promoted after Vatican II, where receiving the Lord's body and blood was described as "that more perfect form of participation." In his 1973 document, Boundless Love, Pope Paul VI provided measures for non-ordained Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion to distribute communion, including at mass and taken to the sick. Communion ministers commit to ongoing formation and liturgical, spiritual, and practical training. They are usually commissioned for a fixed term and only for their specific community. Communion ministers should have qualities of humility, hospitality, gratitude, and reverence.

SOCIAL GATHERING

You are invited to join us after the 6pm mass on Saturday March 16th for a bbq. Meat will be supplied and salads are welcome if you would like to bring one. BYO drinks. We hope to be able to gather on the lawn between the church and presbytery, but can adjourn to the hall if the weather is not appropriate. On this evening, leading up Easter, we will have a project compassion box available and encourage those attending the BBQ to drop a few coins in to it. We hope to see many parishioners gathering on this night.

PALM SUNDAY PEACE WALK

The focus of the Palm Sunday Walk for Justice and Peace this year is on the impact of war where people have been forced to flee to seek places of refuge within their own country (internally displaced) or as refugees and asylum seekers to other countries. The program will commence at 10:30 AM at the Parliament Gardens, Spring Street/Albert Street, Melbourne, with an interfaith segment and prayers for peace, followed by speeches/presentations from 11:00 AM and the Palm Sunday 'Walk for Refugees' concluding by noon.

SAFEGUARDING OF CHILDREN AND VULNERABLE ADULTS

Michael Myers, Professional Standards Coordinator for our diocese, is asking parishes to have their employees and volunteers complete an online training course for Safeguarding Children and Vulnerable Adults. Some members of our parish community were called on to complete this last year, but found it to be difficult to work with. For this reason the course has been updated. The aim of this course is to increase awareness of those in our parishes who are vulnerable for one reason or another. The course would possibly take an hour of your time and if need be, support will be provided by the parish office to enable completion. Anyone who is required to have a WWCC or a police check within the parish will be asked to do this course, so the list will be extensive. The diocese have asked us to provide a list of workers/volunteers' email addresses for the purpose of provided the link and password to all who will be doing the course. If for some reason you don't want to the parish office to pass on your email address to the diocese, please contact us ASAP. If we don't hear from you, you will receive an email from the diocese at some point in the coming weeks. We urge parishioners who fall into this category to do what they can to complete this course as safeguarding the vulnerable must be a top priority for us. Keeping Everything in Balance

3rd Sunday in Lent: John 2:13-25

Today's gospel passage foreshadows the death of Jesus.

As a devout Jew, Jesus goes up to Jerusalem at Passover. His final going-up will be the occasion of his death and resurrection.

The Jerusalem Temple, Judaism's most holy place, is the site of a dramatic incident, an event that is recounted in all four gospels. The Synoptic gospels (Matthew, Mark, and Luke) locate it towards the end of the gospel. They present it as a catalyst for the intensification of hostility between the temple authorities and Jesus.

John's gospel, in contrast, places it at the beginning of Jesus' ministry. The tension between Jesus and the temple authorities that is to culminate in his death in all four gospels is thus present from the outset in John.

Jesus acts decisively, even violently, to draw attention to the primary function of God's "house".

He creates an effective weapon, a whip of cords, and comprehensively clears the temple precinct of merchants, sheep, and cattle.

He overturns the tables of the moneychangers, orders the dove-sellers out and tells them all, in words that evoke the prophecy of Zechariah (14:21), to stop making God's house "a marketplace". Zechariah had declared that, in the end times, there would no longer be traders in God's house.

There was legitimate commercial activity associated with temple worship, such as the purchase of animals and doves for sacrifice, a practice we might now critique, and the changing of money to pay the Temple tax.

The traders seem to have forgotten that this activity was a means to an end and not an end in itself.

Jesus acts decisively

In John's account, the disciples understand" partially: they interpret Jesus' actions in the light of Psalm 69:9: "It is zeal for your house that has consumed me".

"The Jews" request a "sign ... for doing this". In other words, they ask Jesus to demonstrate the source of his authority for his actions.

His response is a challenge: "Destroy this temple, and in three days, I will raise it up".

"The Jews" misunderstand. This provides Jesus with the opportunity to play on the word "temple": the temple is not only a material edifice that took forty-six years to build. It is also, metaphorically, his body that will be



destroyed and raised up "in three days".

The narrator provides the explanation and indicates that the disciples will eventually understand and come to believe.

It is important to note that John writes with the wisdom of hindsight. It is also important to note that the designation "the Jews" is neither a reference to the people of Judaea nor to the dispersed Jewish people. In John's gospel, it refers to those who reject Jesus as the Anointed One of God, the Christ.

As we travel the journey to Jerusalem this Lent, we are invited to keep everything in balance and to remember that God, and not the opponents of Jesus, will have the final word in this drama.
