GOSPEL REFLECTION:Luke turned tradition on its head. Instead of the elderly woman receiving honour from the younger, the tables were turned; Mary was honoured (along with her Son).

Because of her age, Elizabeth should have been the one who received the attention of maternity. But Mary received praise because she believed in the new revelation. Now, Elizabeth (and her son), too, believed because the Spirit acted.

Notice the themes of exaltation and humility. Through the figure of Elizabeth, Luke humbled the old tradition in a time that honoured ancient revelation. Through the figure of Mary, he exalted the new revelation. Through the meeting, he bridged the old to the new. From this moment on, Luke would exalt Jesus and diminish John's role. For Luke, the time of Judaism had past; the time of Christianity had dawned.

This passing matched the historical events of the first century. With the destruction of Jerusalem and its Temple in 70 AD, and with the dispersion of the Jews from their homeland, Luke saw Judaism and its movements (ie, those who tried to keep John's ministry alive) on the wane. At the same time, Christianity was gaining strength in numbers. A time that honoured the unchanging was undergoing massive change.
