

When we hear the term, yoke, we tend to think about the yoke that is used to harness oxen together or the yoke that someone might carry on their shoulder to balance a heavy load. This yoke across the shoulder was adopted into tailoring and so the shoulder piece set into a shirt is also called a yoke. However, in the Jewish tradition there is a completely different meaning to the term. The yoke of a rabbi was his particular interpretation of Torah (the Law); his particular teaching. Disciples who followed a particular rabbi sought to take on his yoke; his particular interpretation. The yoke of any rabbi was best identified by asking him, 'Which is the greatest commandment?' A rabbi's answer to this question revealed his interpretation of Torah. When Jesus is asked that question, he answers, 'Love God and love your neighbour,' and goes on to say that all of the rest of the Law and the prophets flows on from these two commandments. This is the yoke – the interpretation of Torah – that Jesus taught.

In today's gospel, Jesus calls to him all those who labour and are overburdened. It is the Pharisaic interpretation of the Law that burdens these people. Trying to maintain the Law was burdensome and complicated for the everyday person. Jesus says, 'Shoulder my yoke and learn from me ... my yoke is easy.' The yoke of Jesus was easy: Love God and love your neighbour. Compared to the 613 mitzvot (commands) set out in the Torah and strictly maintained by the Pharisees, the yoke of Jesus was incredibly easy to understand and adopt. So simple, in fact, that it required a child-like simplicity to accept this yoke.

A message from Fr Robert McCulloch On 4 July 2020, I am celebrating the 50th anniversary of my ordination to the priesthood by Archbishop Knox in St Patrick's Cathedral Melbourne. I had planned to be in Australia in August and was going to celebrate Mass at St Columba's but the present pandemic has postponed that.

I made three major decisions about my life as a Columban missionary priest In 1964, to give up a Commonwealth government full university scholarship and go to the Columban seminary. In 1977, after three happy years of missionary work in the Philippines and completing liturgical studies in Rome and church history studies in Washington DC, to volunteer to go to one of the new missions the Columbans were opening in Pakistan and Taiwan. And in 2011, to accept the invitation of the Columban Superior-General to go to Rome as the Society's Procurator-General. They were all good decisions with no regrets.

When I volunteered in 1977 for one of the new missions, I hoped greatly and prayed intensely that I would be appointed to Pakistan. It happened, by the kind grace of God, and there I spent 34 years of my life as a priest and missionary. Firstly in the far north-east where Kashmir and Pakistan and India meet. And then from 1983 in the southern province of Sindh on the fringe of the Thar Desert for primary evangelization among Hindu semi-nomadic tribal people and in Karachi to teach Liturgy, Church History and Latin at the theology seminary. Hospital developments, home-based palliative care, health care for people who are incredibly poor and greatly oppressed, and several education centres to assist Catholic young men overcome religious and social discrimination continue to flourish under competent lay administration and management and through generous benefactor support. The translation of the Catechism of the Catholic Church into Urdu and the ongoing Urdu translation of the Roman Missal are another aspect of my missionary life in Pakistan.

Rome is Rome. Since 2011, I have been able to develop links with many religious congregations and Vatican and diplomatic sources for the benefit of the Columbans and our missionary work. Rome has also been an opportunity to develop fruitful working connections with the Anglican, Methodist and Presbyterian churches. This has been a rich harvest from the seeds of ecumenical friendship which I received from my parents while growing up in Victoria.
