STUDENT ANXIETY AND DEPRESSION 'AT CRISIS POINT

Schools are struggling to cope with a sharp rise in anxiety, depression and self-harm among students as young Published: 28 November 2017as 10 years old, with one Catholic school principal saying Australia has reached a "crisis point", ABC News reports.

In April a Mission Australia report found nearly one in four Australian teenagers met the criteria for having a "probable serious mental illness" — a 20 per cent increase from five years ago.

The principal of Canberra's Merici College, Loretta Wholley, said those figures aligned with her experiences in secondary education, but mental health issues were also presenting in younger students.

"Anxiety and depression and self-harm is coming through from primary school," she said. "This used to be an issue for years nine,

10 and 11. Now it is an issue for grades four, five and six."

mental illness in children and teenagers would "cycle to a point where it gets out of control".

"It is at crisis point," she said.

"One in four, or 25 per cent, of our population is a huge number if you really think about that in terms of a family or any group in society."

It is an experience also shared at the ACT's public schools, with UC Kaleen High School principal Lana Read saying up to 30 per cent of students could be dealing with mental health concerns.

But she said there was now a change in attitudes where students also felt more comfortable to come forward.

"I think a school is very much a microcosm of broader society and we know that there has been a rise in mental health issues across the country and internationally," Ms Read said.

Ms Wholley said while her school was undertaking measures to help its students, the ACT government needed to commit to more than "band-aid solutions".

"At the moment I don't believe they know the solution," she said.

"[They] will give an extra \$400 to an agency and that will put in an extra three counsellors. That is actually not going to be a solution for 25 per cent of the population."

SCRIPTURE REFLECTION:

Today's readings contain several images: the faithfulness of those who suffer, even as they lament their predicament: the admonition to watch and wait; the expectation of the coming of the Day of the Lord. As trustees of the one who is coming, we live in the 'in between' time of ambiguity and hope. The placement of these readings at the beginning of Advent shapes the context for understanding the entire season. They fix our gaze on the world of human pain and then moves beyond it to the hope of a brighter future. Lamentation and expectation find fulfilment in the Day of the Lord.

Waiting is a prominent image this Sunday. Some people wait to be released from suffering, others await the second coming of Christ, Waiting saps our energies and stifles our enthusiasm. Yet wait we must, and as we wait, we wonder: 'What should I be doing?' The readings suggest that we should wait with patient expectation for the day of reconciliation and peace; we should wait in joyful hope that what is to come will come soon. While we wait, we should faithfully fulfil our responsibilities. We believe that we have a future worth waiting for, that there are promises that God will keep. And so we look expectantly to the Day of the Lord, that future day of ultimate fulfilment.
