Making Connections: Teaching was an essential aspect of Jesus' ministry. But his style was not to merely give his listeners the facts but to draw them into sharing his understanding and way of life. When these two disciples of John show interest in his way, Jesus invites them to 'come and see'; to experience his way first hand by being with him.

Did you Know?: Points of interest and Catholic lore. Part of the celebration of the Passover festival was the ritual sacrifice of many lambs so that the Jews could eat the Passover meal. In the story of Exodus, the blood of the lamb was shed so that it could be daubed on doorposts and thus enable the people to escape the angel of death. John recognises that Jesus will be the one to give life for the sake of all. 'Messiah' is a Hebrew word which means 'anointed one'. 'Christ' is the Greek word meaning the same thing.

Sharing the Tradition: Lay people play an increasing role in the Church as part of their vocation as baptised Christians.

Living the Word: Pray for each other as you respond to the call of Jesus. Pray for all those who are in the process of discerning their vocation as Christians.

Marriage Tip: Let your spouse know when you are proud of them and why. It is important to show that you recognize what they are doing for you, your family, and others. They will appreciate your recognition.

Mystery Of Faith

When we eat this Bread and drink this Cup, we proclaim your Death, O Lord, until you come again.

And a voice came from heaven, "You are my Son, the Beloved; my favour rests on you." MARK 1:11 As we come into a church, we dip our fingers in the Holy water font and bless ourselves. We do it by habit, often without reflecting on what we are doing. When I was growing up, it was not unusual for Catholic families to place a little Holy water font in the bedroom. Do you ever connect any of this with your Baptism?

The Holy water font is really a mini-baptismal font. We take the Holy water to remind us that, at our Baptism, we were initiated as a disciple of Jesus Christ, receiving the saving benefit of what Jesus did for the whole world on Calvary. Our Baptism was the first day of our individual salvation.

Even though John the Baptist felt uneasy baptising Jesus, the Baptism of Jesus was his public inauguration for his mission, defining him as God's Son, the Beloved, who enjoyed the Lord's favour. People are often defined by what official position they have in the community (eg, Prime Minister), or defined from history (eg, Alexander the Great, William the Conqueror, John the Baptist). So too, Jesus Christ, the "anointed one", received his office at his Baptism. This throws light on our own Baptism which defines us publicly in our relationship with God and with one another in the Church community. So, we pray "Our" Father, not "My" Father. We are defined as a child of God, adopted into God's family and sharing God's mission. Our Baptism enrols us in the public office of being a Catholic Christian. Think of this next time you take Holy water entering the church. Our Heavenly Father, as you adopted children reborn of water and the Holy Spirit, may we be always conscious of our public office as Catholic Christians sharing your mission. Amen.

"Open new horizons for Spreading Joy"



Our primary guide through the two parts of this year's **Ordinary Time** is the gospel writer **Mark**. Jesus' first words in Mark make it clear that from now on **time can never be considered 'ordinary'**: "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God **has come near**; repent, and believe in the good news," said Jesus (1:14). Every Sunday—indeed every day—is a "day of salvation" (2 Cor 6:2). Because Mark's is the shortest gospel we read supplementary material from the gospel of John on three occasions—on this Sunday, on Sundays17-21, and on the last Sunday of the year, the feast of Christ the King. On the Sundays of Ordinary Time we hear an Old Testament reading (accompanied by a psalm) that in some way relates to the gospel. This year the independent second reading will come from the apostle Paul's letters to the Corinthians and to the Ephesians, from James the apostle, and from the unknown author of the letter to the Hebrews. **A rich feast** of the word of God **lies before us**. (Break Open The Word)

Pope Francis sent a video message to the people of Chile and Peru in advance of his January 15-22 apostolic visit.

"I will visit you as a pilgrim of the joy of the Gospel. I want to meet you, to look into your eyes, see your faces and, he continues, be able to experience the closeness of God among all of you, His tenderness and mercy that embraces and comforts us".

The Pope praised the people, "Especially for the love you demonstrate towards those who are discarded by society."
