Pope Francis: Faith allows Christians to live transition into the new year 'differently'

"No, it was the joy that overflows from the heart when one tangibly touches the nearness of Jesus, the tenderness of God, who does not leave us alone but consoles us." At the end of the general audience the pope repeated his refrain that war is always "a defeat," adding "only the weapons manufacturers earn." "And let's think about children at war, the things they see. Let's go to the Nativity scene and ask Jesus for peace. "I am close with affection and prayer to the suffering populations. I encourage the rescue services and I invoke the blessing of the Almighty upon everyone, to bring comfort and relief in pain,".

The Epiphany of the Lord: The earliest Christmas feast, originating in the East in the third century and passing to the West in the fourth century. Celebrates the divine 'manifestation' or 'coming'. In the East it commemorates the baptism of the Lord and in the West the visit of the Magi. The mystery of the incarnation is now revealed to everyone in the world, represented by these wise men from foreign lands.

Pope Francis first Nativity scene established by St. Francis of Assisi provides an important example for Catholics today. This year marks the 800th anniversary of the first living Nativity established by St. Francis in the central Italian town of Greccio. "[St.] Francis doesn't desire to create a beautiful work of art," the pope said, "but through the Nativity scene to provoke amazement at the extreme humility of the Lord, at the hardships he suffered,

for love of us, in the poor grotto of Bethlehem." The Holy Father emphasized that "the Nativity scene was created to bring us back to what matters: to God who comes to dwell among us." It "helps us understand what matters and also the social relationships of Jesus in that moment, the family, Joseph and Mary, and loved ones, the shepherds," he said. The pope noted that it is "fine" to give presents "Let us look at the crib: that awe before the crib. Sometimes there is no inner space for astonishment, The pope emphasized that the very essence of the Christmas season cannot be reduced to a mere historical moment or viewed as "a beautiful thing," adding: "We need this religious attitude of amazement." "If I, in the face of the mysteries, do not come to this amazement, my faith is simply superficial," the pope said. The Holy Father also reflected that the Nativity scene of St. Francis was conceived by a spirit of "sobriety" and that in this way it can be seen as a repudiation of the rampant consumerism that has come to define the Christmas season for many families.

Pope at Mass: Let us entrust the New Year to the Mother of God In his homily at

the New Year's Day Mass celebrating the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God, Pope Francis calls on us to "entrust this coming year to the Mother of God" and consecrate our lives to her. With her "tender love...she will lead us to Jesus." The words "Mother of God," the Pope explained, "express the joyful certainty that the Lord, a tiny Child in his Mamma's arms, has united himself forever to our humanity, to the point that it is no longer only ours, but his as well," The Church also needs to rediscover in Mary, Virgin and Mother, how to be "generative" with pastoral ministry distinguished by "concern and care, patience and maternal courage," said the Pope. And the world could also look to mothers and women for ways to find peace and "see things with genuinely human eyes and hearts." "Every society needs to accept the gift that is woman, every woman: to respect, defend and esteem women, in the knowledge that whosoever harms a single woman profanes God, who was "born of a woman".

The Pope said we can "seek refuge" in Mary, especially in times of loneliness, when dealing with our shortcomings, "whenever we are no longer able to untie the knots in our lives." And may we turn to Mary for help in becoming "artisans of unity" in our times "bereft of peace" so that we can do so "with her maternal creativity and concern for her children." We should entrust the New Year to the Mother of God, consecrating our lives to her, as "she will lead us to Jesus, who is himself 'the fullness of time,' of every time, of our own time."
