First Reading

Is 6:1-8

A reading from the prophet Isaiah In the year of King Uzziah's death I saw the Lord seated on a high throne; his train filled the sanctuary; above him stood seraphs, each one with six wings. And they cried out to one another in this way, 'Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts. His glory fills the whole earth.' The foundations of the threshold shook with the voice of the one who cried out, and the Temple was filled with smoke. I said: 'What a wretched state I am in! I am lost, for I am a man of unclean lips and I live among a people of unclean lips, and my eyes have looked at the King, the Lord of hosts.' Then one of the seraphs flew to me, holding in his hand a live coal which he had taken from the altar with a pair of tongs. With this he touched my mouth and said: 'See now, this has touched your lips, your sin is taken away, your iniquity is purged.' Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying: 'Whom shall I send? Who will be our messenger?' I answered, 'Here I am, send me.'

Gospel Lk 5:1-11

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke Jesus was standing one day by the lake of Gennesaret, with the crowd pressing round him listening to the word of God, when he caught sight of two boats close to the bank. The fishermen had gone out of them and were washing their nets. He got into one of the boats it was Simon's – and asked him to put out a little from the shore. Then he sat down and taught the crowds from the boat. When he had finished speaking he said to Simon, 'Put out into deep water and pay out your nets for a catch.' 'Master,' Simon replied 'we worked hard all night long and caught nothing, but if you say so, I will pay out the nets.' And when they had done this they netted such a huge number of fish that their nets began to tear, so they signalled to their companions in the other boat to come and help them; when these came, they filled the two boats to sinking point. When Simon Peter saw this he fell at the knees of Jesus saying, 'Leave me Lord; I am a sinful man.' For he and all his companions were completely overcome by the catch they had made; so also were James and John, sons of Zebedee, who were Simon's partners. But Jesus said to Simon, 'Do not be afraid; from now on it is men you will catch.' Then, bringing their boats back to land, they left everything and followed him.

New Testament Commentary by Mary Coloe PBVM

Both readings address the issue of being a genuine disciple. Neither Paul nor Peter could claim to be worthy of discipleship but both men trust that they have been called and therefore have some mission, that God has some purpose in calling them. The documents of Vatican II spoke with great force on the vocation of the lay people in the Church. These statements are just a sampling of the emphasis put on the role of the lay people in the Church.

- The faithful are by baptism made one body with Christ and are constituted among the People of God; they are in their own way made sharers in the priestly, prophetical, and kingly functions of Christ; and they carry out the mission of the whole Christian people in the Church and in the world. (*The Constitution on the Church* LG 31)
- The laity, by their very vocation, seek the kingdom of God by engaging in temporal affairs and by ordering them according to the plan of God. (LG 31)
- They live in the world, that is, in each and in all of the secular professions and occupations. They live in the ordinary circumstances of family and social life, from which the very web of their existence is woven. (LG 31)
- They are called there by God that by exercising their proper function and led by the spirit of the Gospel they may work for the sanctification of the world from within as a leaven. (LG 31)
- All are called to sanctity and have received an equal privilege of faith through the justice of God. (LG 32)
- Now, the laity are called in a special way to make the Church present and operative in those places and circumstances where only through them can she become the salt of the earth. (LG 32)
- For all their works, prayers and apostolic endeavours, their ordinary married and family life, their daily occupations, their physical and mental relaxation, if carried out in the Spirit, and even the hardships of life, if patiently borne all these become 'spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ.' (LG 34)
- Together with the offering of the Lord's body, they are most fittingly offered in the celebration of the Eucharist. (LG 34)
- Thus, the laity consecrate the world itself to God. (LG 34)

We worked hard all night long and caught nothing Reflection by Fr Andrew

Fair enough. The fisher people will have been exhausted and centuries of wisdom will have told them that, if they had caught nothing all night, they weren't going to catch anything now. Time to go home and rest weary bones. What Jesus asked of them was ridiculous according to accepted wisdom. Somebody needed to tell him... But Jesus saw things differently. If the conventional wisdom wasn't working (they'd caught nothing), then why dig in and keep following the same patterns? Maybe they did need new eyes and ears. Maybe they needed to do it Jesus' way for a bit. Simon's first reaction was "but ... no." His second thought was to follow the lead of Jesus into a whole new way of being in God's world. They nearly sank the boats there were so many fish. Should have taken Jesus' advice at the start of the night.

I'm well aware that for seven years I've been asking parishioners to put your nets out in ways that have seemed ridiculous to some of you. You told me that I was clueless and stupid. That's the printable ones. It took a while for some to see that Muslim people are holy people. That was a "put out into deep water" moment. It was for me too. I didn't know much about Muslims but it seemed wrong that we thought we could have a church but they couldn't.

Lately I've been asking parishioners to "put out into deep water" again, this time with regards to first nations people, those who have had their land stolen and been otherwise disrespected. I'm going to ask again for parishioners to be Simon for a moment. What Jesus asked seemed ridiculous, but that's when they nearly sank the boats with their record ever catch.

I also receive as many emails imploring me to continue to ask you all to cast your nets into deeper water. Two parishioners emailed me this week:

- 1. ... and with the 26th January celebrations, it remains a travesty of human decency and of justice that first nations people are not afforded at least recognition, let alone respect and understanding for what we have and continue to subject them to in so many diverse situations here in Australia. We are not young and free. we are hide-bound and lack empathy and understanding, we inflict appalling indignities and suffering on those who have lived here for hundreds of generations, and we incarcerate and torture refugees now, who like us in those 1800's, found ourselves here often from desperate circumstances, seeking new life and new possibilities in this country. I am so grateful you would not celebrate that invasion date.
- 2. I would like to throw another suggestion into the mix...the "Catholic Parish of Mary and Martha, Gariwerd". I think these two women symbolise and bring together beautifully, both the contemplative and the active aspects of living the Gospel in a vibrant Catholic Parish community. I also think it is important to return to Gospel figures who are at the heart of our Christian faith and to be inclusive of women in particular in the new name.

Last Sunday we used this Eucharistic Prayer (Various Needs IV) at all parish Masses. We'll use it again this week.

Open our eyes to the needs of our brothers and sisters;

inspire in us words and actions to comfort those who labour and are burdened.

Make us serve them truly, after the example of Christ and at his command.

And may your Church stand as a living witness

to truth and freedom,

to peace and justice,

that all people may be raised up to a new hope.

The last line interests me. It's our task to enable all people "to be raised up to a new hope." It's not enough to say that the dispossession and massacres were a hundred years ago, or that there are not aborigines in our area, or that there are not many Catholics among the first nations people (not true.) Recently I heard "it's always been called the Grampians." That's not true either.

I want to take a different tack now in asking that we cast out nets into deeper water. This line: "May your Church stand as a living witness to truth and freedom, to peace and justice, that all people may be raised up to a new hope." Regardless of history or blame or tyranny of time or any of that, our task in God is to enable people to be raised up to a new hope. That's our job. If giving our new parish a name that brings hope to people who have felt disrespected for two hundred years, then this is our moment, our time to listen to Jesus and to cast our nets into deeper water. This is our time to put out a statement that will stand for a hundred years, to be a parish that renames ourselves as a Church that stands as a living witness to truth and freedom, to peace and justice, that all people may be raised up to a new hope.
