Sunday June 26, 2022 The Thirteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time Year C

First Reading

<u>1 Kgs 19:16. 19-21</u>

A reading from the first book of the Kings The Lord said to Elijah: 'Go, you are to anoint Elisha son of Shaphat, of Abel Meholah, as prophet to succeed you.' Leaving there, Elijah came on Elisha son of Shaphat as he was ploughing behind twelve yoke of oxen, he himself being with the twelfth. Elijah passed near to him and threw his cloak over him. Elisha left his oxen and ran after Elijah. 'Let me kiss my father and mother, then I will follow you' he said. Elijah answered, 'Go, go back; for have I done anything to you?' Elisha turned away, took the pair of oxen and slaughtered them. He used the plough for cooking the oxen, then gave to his men, who ate. He then rose, and followed Elijah and became his servant.

Responsorial Psalm Ps 15:1-2. 5. 7-11. R. cf. v.5

(R.) You are my inheritance, O Lord. 1. Preserve me, God, I take refuge in you. I say to the Lord: 'You are my God.' O Lord, it is you who are my portion and cup; it is you yourself who are my prize. (R.) 2. I will bless the Lord who gives me counsel, who even at night directs my heart. I keep the Lord ever in my sight: since he is at my right hand, I shall stand firm. (R.) 3. And so my heart rejoices, my soul is glad; even my body shall rest in safety. For you will not leave my soul among the dead, nor let your beloved know decay. (R.) 4. You will show me the path of life, the fullness of joy in your presence, at your right hand happiness for ever. (R.)

Second Reading

<u>Gal 5:1. 13-18</u>

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Galatians When Christ freed us, he meant us to remain free. Stand firm, therefore, and do not submit again to the yoke of slavery. My brothers, you were called, as you know, to liberty; but be careful, or this liberty will provide an opening for self-indulgence. Serve one another, rather, in works of love, since the whole of the Law is summarised in a single command: Love your neighbour as yourself. If you go snapping at each other and tearing each other to pieces, you had better watch or you will destroy the whole community. Let me put it like this: if you are guided by the Spirit you will be in no danger of yielding to self-indulgence, since selfindulgence is the opposite of the Spirit, the Spirit is totally against such a thing, and it is precisely because the two are so opposed that you do not always carry out your good intentions. If you are led by the Spirit, no law can touch you.

<u>Lk 9:51-62</u>

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke As the time drew near for him to be taken up to heaven, Jesus resolutely took the road for Jerusalem and sent messengers ahead of him. These set out, and they went into a Samaritan village to make preparations for him, but the people would not receive him because he was making for Jerusalem. Seeing this, the disciples James and John said, 'Lord, do you want us to call down fire from heaven to burn them up?' But he turned and rebuked them, and they went off to another village. As they travelled along they met a man on the road who said to him, 'I will follow you wherever you go.' Jesus answered, 'Foxes have holes and the birds of the air have nests, but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head.' Another to whom he said, 'Follow me,' replied, 'Let me go and bury my father first.' But he answered, 'Leave the dead to bury their dead; your duty is to go and spread the news of the kingdom of God.' Another said, 'I will follow you, sir, but first let me go and say good-bye to my people at home.' Jesus said to him, 'Once the hand is laid on the plough, no one who looks back is fit for the kingdom of God.'

Ordinations to the Priesthood



Merged Parish

This being the last Sunday of our current arrangement of parishes, it seems a good time to look back and to be thankful for the many blessings given us by God over the many many years of the parishes, and to acknowledge the hurts. The early settlers and gold rush people clashed heads and civilisations with the people who had been here forever. They clashed heads and civilisations with the Chinese. Not long after the start the gold ran out and people left the district. Some stayed. They're still digging up gold. We're thankful for the rent paid to the parish by the mine today. All along people were running fast. Things kept going, sometimes in joy and sometimes in struggle. We looked after people in the struggle, thinking the jail and J Ward and Aradale. All along we've been highway towns. Joys and struggles.

One of the Vatican documents, Gaudium et Spes, opens with,

"The joys and hopes, the grief and anguish of the people of our time, especially of those who are poor or afflicted, are the joys and hopes, the grief and anguish of the followers of Christ as well."

Speaking on behalf of more than a century of priests, we have loved you. We have shared in the joys, the hopes, the grief and the anguish. Not for the first time I apologise that the priests caused grief and anguish. Every day I look out of my office window and there are ribbons on the fence, symbols of desperately sinful and criminal acts against your children in my house. It's a fair-enoughly horrible front fence to have at my front door. Grief and anguish.

This might be a time to wonder that the parish boundaries have forever been changing depending on the need. Churches have opened and closed. Parishes have opened and closed. We've built schools, and now the schools have a new more professional governance arrangement. One priest. We've nearly run out of nuns but they keep going, indestructible. All the while people have gathered to say our prayers, in the biting cold and the stifling heat, in times of joy and times of desperate tragedy and mostly times of just plodding along doing what we do in the daily normal. The sun comes up.

The parish anniversaries lists are being merged. It's taking time because the computer formatting isn't the same for each document. We'll display the anniversaries books in the churches. People will be welcome to take a pen and add names. From time to time we will update the books. This collating of the books of anniversaries is a good task to be doing in these final days of the parishes. These are the saints who came before us, who built our parishes and churches and handed their faith to us. The last thing we will do, on Thursday 30th, is bury Vin Hooper and write his name into the list. The first thing we will do on Friday morning is celebrate Masses in Stawell (9.30am) and Ararat (11am) because that's who we are and what we do. Come along and begin Holy Spirit Parish with Eucharist.

In the readings today the disciples are admonished not to look back once the hand is laid on the plough. Once we begin as a new parish, next Friday July 1, 2022, remember the date, we'll begin in earnest, saying our prayers and being the people of God who are again adapting to the changing times. There will be joys, hopes, grief and anguish in the days ahead. There is much for which we might be thankful.

I am enamoured with this prayer, by St Augustine of Canterbury, and it seems apt at this time as we form ourselves into Holy Spirit Parish, Gariwerd.

Breathe in me O Holy Spirit, that my thoughts may all be holy. Act in me O Holy Spirit, that my work, too, may be holy. Draw my heart O Holy Spirit, that I love only but what is holy. Strengthen me O Holy Spirit, to defend all that is holy. Guard me, then, O Holy Spirit, that I always may be holy. Amen.
