<u>Lk 16:19-31</u>

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke Jesus said to the Pharisees: 'There was a rich man who used to dress in purple and fine linen and feast magnificently every day. And at his gate there lay a poor man called Lazarus, covered with sores, who longed to fill himself with the scraps that fell from the rich man's table. Dogs even came and licked his sores. Now the poor man died and was carried away by angels to the bosom of Abraham. The rich man also died and was buried. 'In his torment in Hades he looked up and saw Abraham a long way off with Lazarus in his bosom. So he cried out, "Father Abraham, pity me and send Lazarus to dip the tip of his finger in water and cool my tongue, for I am in agony in these flames." "My son," Abraham replied "remember that during your life good things come your way, just as bad things came the way of Lazarus. Now he is being comforted here while you are in agony. But that is not all: between us and you a great gulf has been fixed, to stop anyone, if he wanted to, crossing from our side to yours, and to stop any crossing from your side to ours." 'The rich man replied, "Father, I beg you then to send Lazarus to my father's house, since I have five brothers, to give them warning, so that they do not come to this place of torment too." "They have Moses and the prophets," said Abraham "let them listen to them." "Ah no, father Abraham," said the rich man "but if someone comes to them from the dead, they will repent." Then Abraham said to him, "If they will not listen either to Moses or to the prophets, they will not be convinced even if someone should rise from the dead.""

Gospel Focus – Rising from the dead

At the end of the passage, Abraham says that if the people of Israel have not been convinced to change their ways by the great prophets throughout time, then 'they will not be convinced even if someone should rise from the dead'. This is obviously a reference to the fact that by the time of the writing of this gospel – some 50+ years after Jesus – most of the Jews remained unconvinced by the message of Jesus, despite his rising from the dead. It is an indication of the rising tension between Jews and Christians at the time of writing.

Mary Coloe PBVM They won't listen! 1 Timothy 6:11-16; Luke 16:19-31

Parents will certainly understand the point of the parable in today's Gospel. You can almost hear the exasperation in Jesus' voice, 'You've been told over and over again...' But still people refuse to listen. In the parable, the rich man insists that if only the message was dramatic enough, if only Lazarus could return then surely his brothers would listen. 'No,' says Jesus, 'they won't listen, even if someone were to rise from the dead.' And someone has risen from the dead, and has the listening improved? Is kindness a value for us? Generosity? Are we willing to share with others? Or like the rich man, do we block our ears and close our eyes to the needy at our gates, to the refugees on our doorsteps. As I write this reflection, men, women and children are locked up in 'Detention' centres, their crime being a desire to live, and see their families live, with some hope. They want a chance for their children to be educated, a chance to live without fear of arrest and torture, a chance to live alongside us and be given a fair go. Apart from these asylum seekers, there are other examples you can think of where Lazarus lies starving on our doorsteps. What more will it take for us to listen, really listen to the words of Jesus? If you look carefully at the parable and the description of the rich man, it does not describe him as a thief, or a swindler; it is not as if he is the one who caused Lazarus to become poor; in this sense he has done nothing wrong. But this is the point. He has done nothing! Lazarus has been at his gate and he has not reached out to him; he has not seen that he has any responsibility for him – it's not his fault – it's just the way it is. But Jesus holds him accountable for doing nothing. The letter to Timothy speaks of the person dedicated to God, calling this person to be holy and religious. My question is, how can anyone know she/he is holy or religious? What are the signs to look for? Within Christianity, holiness is not measured in the number of prayers, or our life-choices, but is measured in how we act. Remember when the young man came to Jesus asking about the greatest commandment? Jesus' response was to tell a story about a Priest, a Levite and a Samaritan, with the last one being upheld as the one who truly kept the commandment because he acted to care for the stranger. It was not his fault that the Jewish man was battered and robbed and lying by the side of the road. No one would have been surprised if he, like the Priest and Levite, had just walked past. But the Samaritan saw a fellow human in need; not one of his own race, but one with him in his neediness. So he acted. Perhaps he thought that it could have been himself by the side of the road – we don't really know his motives, but he did act. Which is what the rich man in the parable did not do. May our ears and hearts be opened to feel the discomfort of the Gospel; may the Risen One in our midst goad us to act in his name for those like Lazarus in our midst.

St Bernard's, Lake Bolac

Today is a very special day for St Bernard's, Lake Bolac. We celebrate 150 years of the first Catholic Church in Lake Bolac and 60 years of the present St Bernard's Church. The Catholic community had gathered for Mass for some years before the building of the first church, so it's closer to 160 years of gathering as a Catholic community. Mass will be celebrated by Bishop Paul Bird at 11am and we are pleased to have former parish priests able to be with us. Lunch will follow at the Lake Bolac Memorial Hall.

We are pleased to now have at St Bernard's the oil lamp used in the first church. This we will place with our Book of Anniversaries on a new table built specially for the purpose. The new table has a cross that echoes the cross on the front of our altar. The Book of Anniversaries holds names and memories of people who prayed under the light of this lamp. These people built a church and then another. All the while they built a community of faithful people. They taught their faith to their children, and they to theirs. They celebrated good times in faith, marriages and the births of children. They commended loved ones home to God, deaths that were sometimes expected and celebrated, and sometimes sudden and tragic. They gathered through the seasons of Australian life, through fires and floods and droughts, and glorious weather and beautiful days to be farming.

We recall the disgraceful behaviour of some priests and the pain that endures for individuals and for families. We remember those who lost their lives in this pain. Never again.

In 2022, we continue to live our Christian lives. As well as remembering the past, today is also about us, the St Bernard's community who gather in these times. Something that marks the times in which we live as Church is the closure of neighbouring churches and the movement of parishes. We can travel further now, and so we gather with faithful people from Willaura and Streatham, and from Glenthompson when they don't have Mass at St Thomas'. We have moved from Terang Parish to Mortlake to Ararat and now to Holy Spirit. We are two dozen faithful people who live our Christian lives in the Catholic Tradition. We think we're doing a good job, and that God would be pleased.
