

Plenary session will be 'safe and inclusive'

The Church in Melbourne has invited "all LGBTIQA+ Catholics, Christians and the broader LGBTIQA+ community, family, friends and supporters" to a "safe and inclusive" Plenary Council conversation this week. Source: The Australian.

The gathering will be held on Wednesday night, in partnership with the Andrews Government and Acceptance Melbourne, which describes itself as "open and affirming community" supporting "Catholics who identify as lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, intersex and queer".

The meeting will be part of an ongoing national consultation process being undertaken by the Church across Australia, known as "Plenary Council 2020".

Melbourne Auxiliary Bishop Mark Edwards, who will attend, said the gathering was "a bit sensitive" following recent disagreements over issues such as same-sex marriage. But he said contrary to concerns raised in some Church circles, Catholic teachings on morality were not up for grabs.

"Similar meetings have been held throughout the country, including in jails and in schools," Bishop Edwards said.

He said the main role of Acceptance and the Victorian Government in the exercise was to encourage participants to attend. He said attendees would be divided into small groups, to discuss one main question: "What do you think God is asking of us at this time?"

Bishop Edwards said he would be interested to hear whether attendees felt well accepted in Church communities or "a bit marginalised", at a time when Pope Francis was urging the Church "to reach out to all". Discussions could also focus issues such as a greater role for women in the Church and religious education, he said.

More than 40,000 individuals and groups have made submissions or participated in the Plenary Council process so far, with submissions due to close on Ash Wednesday, March 6.

The three-year process would culminate in national Plenary Council meetings next year and in 2021, where delegates, including bishops, will vote on possible changes to church life and practices. The Church's last Plenary Council in Australia was in 1937.

Liturgy of the Word

First Reading 1 Sm 26:2. 7-9. 12-13. 22-23

A reading from the first book of Samuel

The Lord has put you in my power, but I will not raise my hand against you.

Saul set off and went down to the wilderness of Ziph, accompanied by three thousand men chosen from Israel to search for David in the wilderness of Ziph.

So in the dark David and Abishai made their way towards the force, where they found Saul asleep inside the camp, his spear stuck in the ground beside his head, with Abner and the troops lying round him.

Then Abishai said to David, 'Today God has put your enemy in your power; so now let me pin him to the ground with his own spear. Just one stroke! I will not need to strike him twice. David answered Abishai, Do not kill him, for who can lift his hand against the Lord's anointed and be without guilt?' David took the spear and the pitcher of water from beside Saul's head, and they made off. To the man who slaps you on one cheek, present the other cheek too; to the man who takes your cloak from you, do not refuse your tunic. Give to everyone who asks you, and do not ask for your property back from the man who robs you. Treat others as you would like them to treat you. If you love those who love you, what thanks can you expect? Even sinners love those who love them. And if you do good to those who do good to you, what thanks can you expect? For even sinners do that much. And if you lend to those from whom you hope to receive, what thanks can you expect? Even sinners lend to sinners to get back the same amount. Instead, love your enemies and do good, and lend without any hope of return. You will have a great reward, and you will be sons of the Most High, for he himself is kind to the ungrateful and the wicked.

Scriptural context - Compassion

The compassion of God is a very strong theme that runs through the Gospel of Luke. Throughout the gospel, the compassion and mercy of God is emphasised and a defining feature of the gospel is the number of healings and parables that relate to people who were regarded as the outcasts of society. In this gospel, Jesus is the embodiment of God's compassion. Jesus wants all people to experience first hand the abundant love God holds for them. Today's gospel passage is a reminder that when we experience God's compassion we are also called to show it to others
