Dear Friends, In today's gospel we are going to meditate on the parable of "The Good Samaritan". Jesus narrates this parable in answering a question he is asked by a scholar of the law. The scholar of the law knows what he must do to inherit eternal life. He quotes the law correctly. But that is not enough. The way of life is not primarily through knowing, it is through doing. Jesus tells him, "Do this and you will live". Again, after Jesus gets the scholar of the law to answer which of the three who saw the wounded man was a neighbour to the robbers' victim. He answered, "The one who treated him with mercy". Jesus tells him, "Go and do likewise".

The deeds that we are asked to do to have life are deeds of compassion and love. Being a chosen people or children of God does not qualify us for eternal life. What qualifies us are deeds of love and mercy. It is when we love that we show the love of God, through our actions. The first two characters in the parable sidestepped life when they avoided the robbers' victim. The Samaritan, who did not even belong to the chosen people, found life when he picked up the victim and helped him. When we help people those in need, we find eternal life. It is more important than being religious It is having a heart for those in need. In our celebration let us ask the Lord to give us the heart and mind of Jesus, so that we may be able to show mercy to those in need like Jesus. -Neville.

A reading from the book of Deuteronomy

Let the instruction of the Lord God be near you.

Moses said to the people: 'Obey the voice of the Lord your God, keeping those commandments and laws of his that are written in the Book of this Law, and you shall return to the Lord your God with all your heart and soul.

Gospel: Lk 10:25-37

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

Who is my neighbour?

There was a lawyer who, to disconcert Jesus, stood up and said to him, 'Master, what must I do to inherit eternal life?' He said to him, 'What is written in the Law? What do you read there?' He replied, 'You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your strength, and with all your mind, and your neighbour as yourself.' 'You have answered right,' said Jesus, 'do this and life is yours.'

But the man was anxious to justify himself and said to Jesus, 'And who is my neighbour?' Jesus replied, 'A man was once on his way down from Jerusalem to Jericho and fell into the hands of brigands; they took all he had, beat him and then made off, leaving him half dead. Now a priest happened to be travelling down the same road, but when he saw the man, he passed by on the other side. In the same way a Levite who came to the place saw him and passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan traveller who came upon him was moved with compassion when he saw him. He went up and bandaged his wounds, pouring oil and wine on them. He then lifted him on to his own mount, carried him to the inn and looked after him. Next day, he took out two denarii and handed them to the innkeeper. "Look after him," he said, "and on my way back I will make good any extra expense you have." Which of these three, do you think, proved himself a neighbour to the man who fell into the brigands' hands?' 'The one who took pity on him,' he replied. Jesus said to him, 'Go and do the same yourself.

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

REFLECTION by Fr Michael Tate

The lawyer asked a self-serving question: 'Who is my neighbour?' He could then set the limits, the boundaries of those close enough to merit his concern. Jesus replies with a story to show that the better question is: 'To whom should I be neighbourly?'

The answer is: To any person who is wounded in any way – physically, psychologically, socially, economically. And we have to do so overcoming the labelling, even bigotry, which can conveniently put a person outside the range of our concern. When we act like the Samaritan, we deserve the title 'Catholic' which means universal.

Pope Francis says that Christ is constantly inviting us, as he invited Thomas, to touch His wounds which are to be found in the wounded of our own time. We could pause for a moment to thank God that we live in an age of technology which can enable us to be truly Catholic global citizens practising Mercy Without Borders. 'Do this and you will live.'
