Today's gospel story surprises us because, Jesus has no word for the desperate woman. Jesus who goes after the lost sheep, didn't say a word to the desperate woman. This is unexpected from Jesus who is close to sinners and outcasts. The Jewish people often speak of the gentiles as outcasts or unclean, since they worship idols, offer sacrifices to evil and reject the true God. Jesus was sent by God to first feed the children of Israel with the true bread of life that would bring healing and lasting union with God. His disciples pleaded him to help the woman. His answer seems intended to discourage her from asking. But she is not discouraged by the answer. Her love for her daughter is so great that she fights to the last, even whatever self-respect she has left. And this human love conquers Jesus' attention.

So, the woman's love towards her daughter and her faith earns her an immediate cure of her daughter. Let us ask ourselves: Is our relationship with God a wrestling one like the woman in the Gospel? It is not that God is kind sometimes and not at other times; it is simply that we cannot dictate to God. A prayer or our supplication must not be an automatic lip service, but it must come from the heart with a strong faith in God. God will not turn a deaf ear if a person is seeking a favour like the woman in the gospel. So let us ask God to strengthen our faith so that we may not merely do a lip service to God but from our hearts. -Neville



The gifts and call of God are irrevocable.

Let me tell you pagans this: I have been sent to the pagans as their apostle, and I am proud of being sent, but the purpose of it is to make my own people envious of you, and in this way save some of

them. Since their rejection meant the reconciliation of the world, do you know what their admission will mean? Nothing less than a resurrection from the dead! God never takes back his gifts or revokes his choice. Just as you changed from being disobedient to God, and now enjoy mercy because of their disobedience, so those who are disobedient now – and only because of the mercy shown to you – will also enjoy mercy eventually. God has imprisoned all men in their own disobedience only to show mercy to all mankind.

Gospel: Matthew 15:21-28

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Woman, you have great faith.

Jesus left Gennesaret and withdrew to the region of Tyre and Sidon. Then out came a Canaanite woman from that district and started shouting, 'Sir, Son of David, take pity on me. My daughter is tormented by a devil.' But he answered her not a word. And his disciples went and pleaded with him. 'Give her what she wants,' they said 'because she is shouting after us.' He said in reply, 'I was sent only to the lost sheep of the House of Israel.' But the woman had come up and was kneeling at his feet. 'Lord,' she said 'help me.' He replied, 'It is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the house-dogs.' She retorted, 'Ah yes, sir; but even house-dogs can eat the scraps that fall from their master's table.' Then Jesus answered her, 'Woman, you have great faith. Let your wish be granted.' And from that moment her daughter was well again.

The Gospel of the Lord. All: Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ

REFLECTION by Fr Michael Tate

A pagan woman approaches a Jewish man and she begs Jesus to heal her daughter.

Jesus gives a dismissive answer to the woman: 'It is not fair to take the children's bread and throw it to the house dogs.' The children are obviously the Jewish people.

This remarkable *pagan* woman stands her ground and engages in a verbal joust with Jesus! She argues: 'Yes, Lord, but even the house dogs get the crumbs that fall from their master's table.' Jesus recognises *her* faith and the daughter was healed. This story was put in the Gospels to show how Jesus extended his saving mission to non-Jews in Pagan territory.

That is Good News for billions of non-Jewish people over the course of history since then and into the future. That is why we are truly 'Catholic', which, as you know, is the Greek for 'world-wide'.

We could pause for a moment to celebrate this Canaanite woman as the first 'Catholic'!
