

#### Dear friends,

Simon Peter is shocked to hear Jesus is predicting that he would suffer and die in Jerusalem. Peter has just confessed Jesus as the Messiah of God and Jesus has called him "Rock" because of that confession. How then, can Jesus speak of the cross when a crucified man is cursed by God? The Messiah is meant to be a glorious figure, not a man of suffering. The message is just as shocking when preached to the gentile world. A crucified Messiah as God's means of reconciling a lost world is a bizarre message, not at all the good news. The cross can be "good news" only if its meaning is completely overturned. This was shown in the resurrection of Jesus. God was pleased with Jesus' obedience (unto death). That means Jesus was successful in fulfilling the will of God. Because Jesus fulfilled the will of God, God raised him from the dead. According to Paul, the cross is the initiative of God and the demonstration of his great love. God proves his love for us in that, while we were still sinners, Christ died for us. Paul comes to this realization not on reflection but through a dramatic encounter with the risen Christ. On the way to Damascus, Christ apprehends him and shows him that Christ is in fact what the disciples preach him to be. Paul is struck by the power of God through lighting. Through this conversion Paul then preaches to both Jewish and Gentiles. They understand the paradox of the cross and become believers, ready to lose their lives so that they may find it in Jesus. -Neville

#### (R.) My soul is thirsting for you, O Lord my God.

your new mind. This is the only way to discover the will of God and know what is good, what it is that God wants, what is the perfect thing to do.

Gospel Acclamation: (Please stand for the Gospel Acclamation) See Ephesians 1:17-18

Alleluia, alleluia! May the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ enlighten the eyes of our heart, that we might see how great is the hope to which we are called. Alleluia!

Gospel: Matthew 16:21-27

#### A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself.

Jesus began to make it clear to his disciples that he was destined to go to Jerusalem and suffer grievously at the hands of the elders and chief priests and scribes, to be put to death and to be raised up on the third day. Then, taking him aside, Peter started to remonstrate with him. 'Heaven preserve you, Lord,' he said. 'This must not happen to you.' But he turned and said to Peter, 'Get behind me, Satan! You are an obstacle in my path, because the way you think is not God's way but man's.' Then Jesus said to his disciples, 'If anyone wants to be a follower of mine, let him renounce himself and take up his cross and follow me. For anyone who wants to save his life will lose it; but anyone who loses his life for my sake will find it. What, then, will a man gain if he wins the whole world and ruins his life? Or what has a man to offer in exchange for his life? 'For the Son of Man is going to come in the glory of his Father with his angels, and, when he does, he will reward each one according to his behaviour.'

This is the Gospel of the Lord. All: Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ

## **REFLECTION** by Fr Michael Tate

We have to get one terrible thought out of our heads, i.e. that the Heavenly Father of Jesus *wanted* him to suffer a tortured, agonising death. Yet we do say: 'It was necessary that Jesus suffer and die.' What can this mean? I believe this refers to the necessity of divine mission and the necessity of divine love.

First, it was the Father's will that Jesus remain true to the mission to preach and embody the gospel of mercy and forgiveness. It was inevitable that powerful elites would find this intolerable and have Jesus eliminated. Secondly, God so loved the world where death ravages human beings, that God determined to absorb the suffering and pangs of death.

The temptation to avoid that dread-full necessity lead Jesus to rebuke Peter: 'Get *behind* me, Satan', a terrible variation of the initial call: 'Come, *follow* me.' We could pause for a moment to very consciously make the sign of the Cross, the consequence of Jesus' mission and love for us.
