#### Dear friends,

In the gospel we are going to reflect on the story of the transfiguration of Jesus. Here Matthew points out the change in Jesus' face or his whole appearance and focuses on his final glorification. The scene in the transfiguration follows the prediction of the passion that he was to undergo. During his ministry, Jesus has gained not only friends but enemies as well. He resolutely determines to go to Jerusalem where prophets have been persecuted. An experience like the transfiguration sets Jesus' mind at ease or comfort, in comparing the tragedy that is to come. Conversing with Moses and Elijah, Jesus is being confirmed in his mission.

The transfiguration is also a "mystical experience" for the disciples. Although they do not fully comprehend its meaning they experience the glorification of the Lord. The disciples also need this enlightenment because Jesus had told them about his suffering of carrying the cross, death and also their denial. The memories of what they had experienced on the mountain, only a few weeks before the tragedy of the cross could still keep it alive in them and a flicker of their faith. A hope could still linger in their hearts that perhaps all was not over. That maybe their master whom they had seen in his glory could still turn the tragedy of the cross into a triumph. May our celebration of this feast of the transfiguration of the Lord strengthens our faith as we go through the passion of Christ closely during this season of Lent. -Neville

# A reading from the second letter of St Paul to Timothy

purpose and by his own grace. This grace had already been granted to us, in Christ Jesus, before the beginning of time, but it has only been revealed by the Appearing of our saviour Christ Jesus. He abolished death, and he has proclaimed life and immortality through the Good News.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

His face shone like the sun.

Jesus took with him Peter and James and his brother John and led them up a high mountain where they could be alone. There in their presence he was transfigured; his face shone like the sun and his clothes became as white as the light. Suddenly Moses and Elijah appeared to them; they were talking with him. Then Peter spoke to Jesus. 'Lord,' he said 'it is wonderful for us to be here; if you wish, I will make three tents here, one for you, one for Moses and one for Elijah.' He was still speaking when suddenly a bright cloud covered them with shadow, and from the cloud there came a voice which said, 'This is my Son, the Beloved; he enjoys my favour. Listen to him.' When they heard this, the disciples fell on their faces, overcome with fear. But Jesus came up and touched them. 'Stand up,' he said 'do not be afraid.' And when they raised their eyes they saw no one but only Jesus.

As they came down from the mountain Jesus gave them this order. 'Tell no one about the vision until the Son of Man has risen from the dead.'

# **REFLECTION by Fr. Michael Tate**

The Jewish people worshipped at the Temple in Jerusalem. The Samaritans to the north worshipped on Mount Gerizem. But Jesus says to the woman of Samaria: 'Believe me, woman, the hour is coming when you will worship the Father neither on this mountain nor in Jerusalem . . . true worshippers will worship the Father in spirit and truth.'

We do this by acknowledging Jesus Christ as *our* sacred site. Jesus is where God is to be found. In his earthly ministry this was around places like the well in Samaria. As Risen Lord, he is to be found in those in dire need, and in the Heavenly Bread. In both cases we need to incline the body as an act of worship: in the case of the needy, by doing something practical; in the case of the Heavenly Bread, by genuflecting, bowing, before the Blessed Sacrament.

We could pause for a moment to reorientate ourselves to the Sacred Site who is the Risen Christ, acknowledging him as indeed the 'Saviour of the World'.
