Parish members Alastair Hurst, Loretta Kaval, Phonse Liddle, Don McMahon, Irene Martin, Aileen Preston and the ex officio members Fr Justin and Jess Reynolds (Parish School) met on Friday September 1st at 11.30am. Aileen Preston was welcomed as a new member and all were reminded of the safeguarding requirements of all members.

Jess spoke of the relocation of the children from the MacKillop hub (the former presbytery) to the main body of the school building. The school will continue to use the MacKillop hub with the possibility of meetings and morning teas being able to be held there in the future. Thanks was expressed to the school for the invitation to the Feast Day Mass and lunch for St Augustine's.

We recommit to cultural change that will help the Church be a place that builds and supports safe communities for all people.

Fr Andrew Hamilton SJ writes:

Conversations about child protection are generally serious. When we speak of protection we often think of emergencies and perhaps of military or police operations in response to serious and immediate danger. That of course is part of protection. But mostly protection is less about responding to emergencies than about ensuring they don't happen. Protection involves careful planning, training, rules of behaviour and vigilance. That is also true of child protection. Our commitment to protect children must look to the past and to the future. We must remember past failures with shame and look to the future in hope and determination. And both our memories and our hopes must focus with respect on the children who are entrusted to our care.
