CHRISTIANITY UNDER THREAT: ARCH-BISHOP FISHER

Christianity is under attack by powerful interests who are battling to exclude religious believers from public life, says Sydney Archbishop Anthony Fisher OP. Source: The Australian.

Archbishop Fisher has used his Easter Sunday homily to make a renewed call for Catholics to stand strong in the face of persecution, and to look to the sacraments as a way of making sense of Jesus' death and

Resurrection in modern life.

"We may not always be as free as we are now to evangelise and baptise as Jesus mandated at the first Easter," he told thousands in a packed St Mary's Cathedral in Sydney on Sunday. "Powerful interests now seek to marginalise religious believers and beliefs, especially Christian ones, and exclude them from public life. They would end funding to faith-based schools, hospitals and welfare agencies, strip us of charitable status and protections, cast us as 'Public Enemy No. 1'."

Archbishop Fisher said submissions made to the Ruddock Inquiry into Protection of Religious Freedom in Australia – an expert panel appointed to examine whether Australian law adequately protects the human right to freedom of religion – reveal the extent of the marginalisation of Christians.

Confession – one of the seven sacraments – is under specific attack, he said. The Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse recommended an overhaul of confession and celibacy in its final report last year.

"This precious sacrament (confession), too, is threatened today both by neglect and attack," he said.

"But priests will, we know, suffer punishment, even martyrdom, rather than break the seal of confession. For confession is a privileged encounter between penitent and God; here the Christian enters the silence and secrecy of the tomb, to be re-Eastered; and no earthly authority may enter there."

Thousands of submissions to the inquiry's review panel, led by former Liberal attorney-general Philip Ruddock, were released Friday after its reporting deadline was deferred until May to accommodate more than 16,000 responses from churches, faith groups, lawyers, -individuals and LGBTI bodies.

SCRIPTURE REFLECTION:



The true believers in the Risen Christ kept Thomas the Doubter within their circle, rather than expelling him. This gave him a further opportunity to experience the very

Real Presence of the Risen Lord and his gift of peace. Companionable patience is our best response to those struggling with belief in even fundamental tenets of the faith.

Thomas saw that the wounds of Christ were still present, not obliterated. Does this suggest that our redeemed bodies will bear the marks of the wounds unjustly inflicted on us? However, they will not be disabling to our personality because they will be incorporated into the resurrection life of Christ. Incredibly, our self-inflicted wounds, i.e. our sins, will be obliterated in the mercy of God.

Pope Francis emphasises that it was in responding to the invitation to touch the wounds of Christ that Thomas understood Christ's true identity, exclaiming: 'My Lord and my God'. It is only by touching the wounds of Christ in many different people in many different situations that we can authentically make the same act of faith.

We could take a moment to pray for the strength to touch the wounds of Christ in others, 'the least'. And we could pray that, wounded as we may be by the vagaries and injustices of life, we may be liberated from their evil effects as the Risen Lord adopts our wounds as his own.

Fr Michael Tate
