# POPE BEGINS RISKY TRIP TO EGYPT

Published: 28 April 2017 Although Pope Francis's trip to Egypt to-

day (Friday) will be brief, it will be among the riskiest outings of his papacy, writes John Allen Jr in Crux.

From security concerns to the labyrinthian politics awaiting him, Francis will face hard choices in Cairo from the moment he lands today until he leaves 27 hours later to return to Rome.

Although the aims of the trip may be relatively straight-forward, the path to achieving them seems far less clear.

While every papal outing generates concerns about the pontiff's safety, that's especially true for this visit, which unfolds in the wake of the bombing of two Coptic Orthodox churches on Palm Sunday by Islamic State, as well as the attack on security forces at a checkpoint near the famous St Catherine's Monastery in the Sinai desert last week.

As they always do, Vatican spokesmen

are playing down any risks during the trip, expressing confidence in the local security forces.

The risk may actually be less for Francis himself and more for Egypt's Christian minority, which ranges somewhere between 10 and 20 million people, depending on which demographic estimates one accepts.

Not only are Christians in Egypt a frequent target of Islamic militants for the mere fact of being a religious minority, but politically they're seen as solidly aligned behind the government of former army chief Abdel Fattah al-Sisi, who came to power in 2014 after the ousting of a Muslim Brotherhood-led government under Mohammed Morsi.

The overt purpose for Francis's trip to Egypt is a Friday visit to Cairo's Al-Azhar mosque and university, considered the most important centre of learning in the Sunni Muslim world and sometimes dubbed the "Islamic Vatican". While there, the Pope will address an international conference on peace being sponsored by Al-Azhar.

In recent years, the Vatican and Al-Azhar have in Egypt have taken in the direction of tolerance and understanding, without inadvertently sending the signal that no work is left to be done.

## SCRIPTURE REFLECTION

The Easter mystagogical instruction continues. Today we reflect on life as a journey. This theme expresses well the fact that life is not static, but is a movement from one point to another. Actually, we do not so much make the journey as we join one that is already in progress. Nor are we alone on it. We have companions who share their encouragement and support, their talents and insight. Like the two disciples travelling to Emmaus, we have certain expectations which Jesus does not seem to fulfil. They did not realise that through his death he had accomplished everything. They did not realise that the Risen Lord himself was their travelling companion.

As with them, so with us. We may not see the extraordinary in the ordinary. We may not see the hand of God in our lives. Perhaps we need someone to interpret for us both the tradition and the events of life. Despite appearances, something is happening beneath what we are able to observe. God is at work beneath and within our lives. Once we realise who this unique travelling companion really is, our hearts too will burn within us, our eyes too will be opened, and we too will look at life with the assurance of faith. Easter faith will transform our disillusionment into missionary zeal. Some of us may be called upon to give public witness, as did Peter. Most will preach with the example of our lives. All can enter this mystery as we recognise him in the breaking of the bread.

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
