The door, however, bounced back open, and the woman shouted, “Get your foot out of my door!”



## BIBLE READING IS DEVOTING TIME TO A LOVED ONE, POPE SAYS

VATICAN CITY (CNS) -- The importance of the Bible in the life of Christians can be seen in the number of faithful around the world who risk prison and persecution just to possess and read the Bible, Pope Francis said.




"Many of our brothers and sisters are in prison on account of the word, and many more have shed their blood as a testimony to their faith in Jesus Christ," Pope Francis said Oct. 5 during a meeting with members of the church relations committee of the United Bible Societies.

Addressing members of the group, which translates, prints and distributes Bibles around the world, Pope Francis said that just as "we devote time to those we love," Christians must devote time to reading the word of God, "who desires to talk to us and offer us words of life eternal."

"It is vital that the church today go out to proclaim the Gospel to all, in all places, on all occasions, without delay, reluctance or fear," the pope said. "We do so in obedience to the Lord's missionary mandate, certain of his presence among us until the end of the world."

The power to share the Gospel effectively comes only when Christians "nourish ourselves at the table of the word," he said.

Pope Francis told the representatives of the United Bible Societies, a nondenominational organization, that Christians should work together to spread God's word and should pray together that God's will for the unity of Christians will be accomplished.



Archbishop Gallagher is a friendly, thoughtful, softly spoken Englishman, a former papal representative to Canberra and not remotely given to dramatic language. However, the reality he sketches is stark and undeniable: "The situation is pretty dire for Christians in the Middle East. It's pretty dire for many people but Christians are in a particularly vulnerable situation. They have been attacked by ISIS (Islamic State) and other Islamic fundamentalist groups. They are being challenged by numerical loss, the loss of places of worship, the loss of people's lives.

"We hope that Christians will return to their homes in Syria and Iraq. The Holy See has tried to add its voice to their defence, tried to mobilise agencies to help them and tried diplomatically and politically to defend their rights."

Archbishop Gallagher argues, somewhat optimistically I think, that the persecution of Christians is slowly gaining wider understanding: "In Europe the issue is gaining more attention, certainly in the European Parliament. There was the (US) congressional resolution on the genocide of Christians.


"But there are certainly places where it's difficult to add one's voice to the defence of Christians. Christianity is a part of the Middle East. It is the birthplace of Christianity. It was the cradle of the religion. A Middle East without Christianity is not really a Middle East we could recognise.

"Christians in many parts of the world are facing unprecedented challenges and threats, in the intolerance in the Middle East and some parts of Asia. And it is quite difficult in the political correctness of the West to be a Christian.

"The West is a very secularised society at the moment. But there are little chinks. Through immigration people are realising that religion does count for more. You see more understanding in diplomatic services that if you're going to understand people, you have to understand religion."

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### SCRIPTURE REFLECTION:



In the regions where Jesus was an itinerant preacher, three or four flocks could be kept in a communal sheepfold for safety. In the morning, the shepherds would come and, as each

called out, the sheep attuned to the sound of his voice would follow to life-giving pasture.

We are surrounded by hundreds of voices clamouring for our attention. We are bombarded by messages, social media incessantly chattering. Jesus invites us to get attuned to his voice, listening for the distinctive sound of it so that, even if it is faintly heard in a cacophony, we immediately turn toward it so that we can follow it in a life-giving direction.




How do we get attuned to that voice? By reading the gospels. A Chinese student once told me that the Chinese character for gospel is 'happy sounds'. I like the plural. Jesus' gospel voice is not a monotone but a polyphony sounding in different ways in different situations.

As disciples, we have to get onto the same wavelength as that voice so that we can echo it in our own lives. We become reverberations of Christ's voice in many different situations, helping him to lead others to life-giving pastures.

We could take a moment to pray for better listening so that we might recognise the gospel voice of Jesus Christ, especially at the moment of death. Then we may hear the one voice we need and long for: 'Today you will be with me in paradise.'



### An Anzac Day Prayer (From St Pat's School Bulletin)

Remember, O Lord, all those, the brave and the true, who have died the death of honour and are departed in the hope of the resurrection to eternal life. Rosemary is a small perennial shrub of the mint family. This compact evergreen, with clusters of small light blue flowers and leaves that yield a fragrant essential oil used in making perfume and to flavour food, is native to the Mediterranean region. Legend says that the Virgin Mary, while resting, spread her cloak over a white flowering rosemary bush. The flowers turned the blue of her cloak, and from then on the bush was referred to as the "Rose of Mary". This plant was, in ancient times, supposed to strengthen memory. Greek scholars wore rosemary in their hair to help remember their studies, and the association with remembrance has carried through to modern times. In literature and folklore it is an emblem of remembrance. On ANZAC Day, the wearing of small sprigs of rosemary in the coat lapel, pinned to the breast or held in place by medals is thus synonymous with remembrance and commemoration.

### Anzac Day Commemorations

On Wednesday 25th April Miss Bonnie, Mrs McIntyre and our school representatives will be attending the local RSL Commemoration for Anzac Day and laying a wreath. It is now 3 years since the Centenary of Gallipoli and 2018 marks the 100th anniversary of two significant events in WW1. Firstly the battle of Villers-Bretonneux which took place on the 24th April 1918. Two Australian brigades were decisive in recapturing the town which ended the German offensive and paved the way for the subsequent Armistice. Secondly, the 100th anniversary of the Armistice will be commemorated on 11th November.
