1,000 vigilante killings a month in Philippines, missionary reports

January 05, 2017

The summary execution of suspected drug dealers in the Philippines is "the most cruel death penalty ever seen," a missionary priest told the Fides news service.

Father Shay Cullen, an Irish priest, reported that there have been about 1,000 people killed in the past month, merely on suspicion of involvement in the drug traffic. He described the vigilante killings as "a monstrous crime."

Father Cullen observed that lawmakers in the Philippines could reinstate the death penalty, and although the missionary priest made it clear that he would oppose that move, it would at least be "a legal way" to punish criminals. But the extra-judicial killings—which have been quietly encouraged by President Rodrigo Duterte—are a violation of the rule of law, he said. "The suspects are not given the opportunity to defend themselves against their accusers, which is their constitutional right."

"This violence must stop," Father Cullen insisted. Unfortunately, he said, the campaign of vigilante justice appears to have broad public support.

TO ENCOURAGE VOCATIONS, LEARN TO LISTEN TO YOUNG PEOPLE, POPE SUGGESTS

In a January 5 address to vocations directors from Italian dioceses, Pope Francis said that the work of encouraging vocations calls for "passion and a sense of gratitude."

In calling for passion, the Pope explained in his prepared remarks, he meant that "it is important to be convinced that 'I am on a mission,' and not simply that 'I have a mission.'" He said that this approach "requires courage, daring, imagination, and a desire to go beyond, to go further." This approach, he said, is attractive to young people.

"The youth of today are in need of a spring of fresh water to slake their thirst, so as to continue on their searching journey," the Holy Father said. He advised vocations officials to listen carefully to young people, to be prepared to "waste time" answering their questions and hearing their thoughts."

Pope Francis handed out his prepared remarks to the officials who had participated in a conference organized by the Office for Pastoral Care for Vocations of the Italian Episcopal Conference. He spoke off the cuff to the group; no

SCRIPTURE REFLECTION

The Christmas season reaches an apex with the Epiphany. In some liturgical traditions, it is the central celebration of Christmas. It commemorates not only the birth of Christ and the visit of the Magi, but also his baptism in the Jordan and the manifestation of his glory at the wedding feast of Cana. In the Roman Catholic tradition, the focus is on the visit of the Magi and the implications of that visit for the glorious manifestation of God to all the peoples of the world.

There is a wonderful summons to alertness and presence of mind and heart, a call for all the nations to witness the marvellous works of God that shine as light in the midst of the surrounding darkness. The light of God is known in the ways in which the most vulnerable in the city are cared for and acknowledged. In just action and righteousness, the city becomes the beacon of God, and all the nations are attracted by this light. The quality of the light leads the way through the darkness and sustains the world in goodness and peace.

The manifestation of God among us changes the ways in which we perceive each other. Christ's birth provides us with the light by which we see a new criterion for relating. The Magi represent the multi-ethnic and cultural diversity in civic and parish situations, as well as the many religions of the world. All people, regardless of race or ethnic origin, can be co-heirs with Christ.

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
