PRIESTS SHORTENING HOMILIES?

(From *The Catholic Herald*, 16/12/2019) A new analysis from the Pew Research Center shows that many Catholic priests are holding to Pope Francis' advice to keep their homilies on the shorter side, especially compared to Protestants.

An analysis of nearly 50,000 sermons, given across the US during Lent and Easter found that the median length of a sermon was 37 minutes, but for Catholic priests, the median length was just 14 minutes. Pew found that black Protestant sermons had the longest median length at 54 minutes, while mainline Protestant sermons were 25 minutes, with evangelical churches falling in between at 39 minutes.

The relatively shorter homilies by Catholic priests is in line with the pope's own recommendations. In February 2018 Pope Francis addressed priests and other Catholics and discussed the importance of having short, interesting homilies.

"Whoever gives the homily must be conscious that they are not doing their own thing, they are preaching, giving voice to Jesus, preaching the Word of Jesus," he said. Homilies "should be well prepared, and they must be brief!"

To drive the point home, Francis told a story about a priest who had told him that when visiting his home town, the priest's father had said *"I'm happy, because your mother and I have found a church which provides Mass without a homily!"*

"How many times have we seen people sleeping during a homily, or chatting among themselves, or outside smoking a cigarette?" the pope asked. When people laughed at the notion, Francis responded, "it's true, you all know it ... it's true!"

"Please," he said to priests, *"be brief ... no more than 10 minutes, please!"*

SCRIPTURE REFLECTION by Fr Francis Fernandez

HOPE ALWAYS Advent calls us to live closely with Our Lady during this time when she is carrying Jesus in her womb. We can think of the whole of our life as a somewhat longer advent, a time of waiting for that definitive moment when we will at last find ourselves with God forever. The Christian knows that he has to live this advent beside Our Lady every day of his life if he wants to be certain of attaining the only thing in the whole of his existence that is really important – finding Christ in this life, and afterwards being with him in eternity.

There is no better way of preparing for Christmas, which is now so close, than by keeping Mary company, getting to know her and deepening our love and trust in her. Mary imparts a great joy to our souls, because when we turn to her she leads us to Christ.

Mary teaches us to hope. *'All generations will call me blessed!'* she prophesied. Humanly speaking, how could she hope for such a thing? Who was she, in the eyes of her contemporaries? The great heroines of the Old Testament – Judith, Esther, Deborah – won a measure of human renown even here on earth. Mary's throne, by contrast, like that of her Son, is the Cross.

What a contrast between Our Lady's hope and our own impatience! We call so often upon God to reward us at once for any little good we may have done. No sooner does the very first difficulty appear than we begin to complain. Often we find ourselves incapable of sustaining our efforts, of keeping our hope alive. Why? Because we lack faith.

The ones who become discouraged are not those who undergo difficulties and feel pain. It is those, rather, who do not aspire to sanctity and eternal life, those who despair of ever reaching them, who buckle and give up. It is shaped by a lack of faith, by comfort seeking, lukewarmness and an excessive attachment to earthly goods, which they consider to be the only good things worth having. Discouragement, if it is not remedied, paralyses any

effort to do good and overcome difficulties. Sometimes discouragement over one's failure to advance in sanctity comes about through lack of will power, through fear of the effort required, and of having to give up comforts. Not even apparent failures in our spiritual life should be cause for dismay. Whoever does things for love of God and for His Glory never fails. In this context, St Josemaría counsels: "Convince yourself of this truth: your success – this time, in this matter – was to fail. Give thanks to our Lord ... and try again! You haven't failed; you have gained experience. On you go!"

In a few days' time we shall see Jesus in the Crib. The sight is proof of God's mercy and love. We can say: On this Christmas night everything inside me stops. I am face to face with Him; there is nothing but this Child in the whole of that huge white expanse. He does not say anything, but He is there ... He is God loving me. And if God becomes man and loves me, how can I refuse to seek Him? How can I give up hope of finding Him, if He is searching for me?

Let us rid ourselves of any hint of discouragement. Neither external difficulties nor our personal failings can do anything to quell the joy of the Christmas which is approaching.
